Streetscape could start in fall



The long-awaited and delayed streetscape project for downtown Plymouth could get going in September. The state House has approved legislation that would clear the way for the bonds needed to raise money for the project.

The long-awaited start of construction on the \$2.4 million downtown street-sidewalk renovation plan could happen in September, if the Legislature acts as expected this week on downtown development project funding.

A bill has passed the state House that calls for the state to pay bond debt incurred by such projects already planned. Plymouth's streetscape plan would qualify, if the Senate acts as expected this week to pass the legislation.

"Assuming that the Senate does what the House has done, if they

passed it next week, it has to go to the governor for signing. It might take a couple of weeks beyond that," City Manager Steve Walters said Friday.

The commission then could choose to vote July 5 to authorize the sale of project bonds. "Then it would be a two- to three-week process selling the bonds and there would be a certain amount of time the bids would be out before construction," Walters said.

The city Downtown Development Authority would then plan what could be accomplished this year, and construction could start in September at the earliest, Walters said.

The bid specifications from the project have been on hold since last June. Right after the city commission then authorized the sale of project bonds, DDA funding became uncertain as legislators scrapped the old property tax system that funded DDAs and DDA projects.

By the plan approved by the House, a DDA's existing debt — and that incurred by already planned projects — would be assumed by the state. The Plymouth DDA would continue to raise money for business recruitment and other projects by cap-

Peace Corps volunteer eager to serve

Kristy Brugar is off to Africa for Peace Corps training on Wednesday, so she's been spending time visiting with friends and family before leaving on the two and a half-year assignment.

"I'm going to miss Diet Coke and talk shows," said Brugar, 22, laughing.

She could have left for Peace Corps training in Senegal on May

15. But since she'd just graduated from the University of Michigan, the Plymouth Township resident thought it best to take a little time to see friends and family and pack.

"I joined the Peace Corps because I want to serve the world around me after I have been given so much," Brugar said. "In particular, I support the goal for people to eventually stand independently of aid and want to help in those efforts."

Brugar, who majored in history

and classical studies at U-M, first became interested in the Peace Corps while attending Plymouth Canton High School.

Noting that President John Kennedy first proposed the Peace Corps while speaking at U-M, Brugar said she met professors and others there who'd either served in or talked highly of the program.

With her senior year about to start, "I thought I didn't want to go right from undergraduate school to a

graduate degree, I wanted time to assess," she said.

Brugar said she was also interested in working for the federal government, and in traveling.

"So last summer I decided to give it a try."

She called the Peace Corps and was sent an application. Much of the application process — which included a three-hour in-person inter-

Local man sues Unisys for age discrimination

A Plymouth man fired by Unisys in December is suing the firm, claiming age discrimination.

Paul Stolis, who was 59 and had worked 29 years for the company at the time of his firing, filed suit June 6 in Wayne County Circuit Court.

In the suit, Stolis said he was told of his termination Dec. 3 and four days later was instructed to teach a man in his 30s everything he knew about his job in Unisys' image technology department.

Stolis protested his firing in a Dec. 6 letter to the company's vice president of human resources:

"I understand that Unisys has an obligation to the stockholders and sometimes, as unpleasant as they are, cuts are necessary.

"I would also think that Unisys has a moral obligation to the older employees that have contributed to the successes the company has enjoyed, especially the ones that are able to satisfactorily perform the tasks required of them," he wrote.

"I have always received excellent

performance reviews. I have received several achievement awards and have two patents applied for. I have made significant contributions to Unisys," Stolis continued.

He is seeking damages stemming from economic and emotional harm, according to the complaint.

Joe Barrett, a Unisys spokesman, said it was company policy not to comment on such litigation.

In a second count in the complaint, attorneys for Stolis wrote that Unisys "always maintained a policy of termination for cause . . . that employees

would be given a warning of their deficiencies and a chance to improve prior to discharge."

The policy, they maintain, was modified in 1991 to say layoff decisions would be based on performance and ability to perform work. Stolis said he was equally or better qualified to perform work in his department than the man he was instructed to train.

In the suit, Stolis asks that if his request for damages is denied, that he be reinstated in the job.

Election day

A one-year term is open, as are two four-year terms.

Vying for the one-year seat are Valerie Greene, Trustee Susan Feiten and Carolyn Bradley.

Running for the four-year seats being vacated by incumbents Les Walker and Carl Battishill are Carol Bollman, Susan Davis, Mark Horvath, Peggy Kalis and Steve Kiljanczyk.

The one-year seat is the remainder of Trustee Dean Swartzwelter's term. Feiten was appointed last November when Swartzwelter resigned for health reasons.

Breast cancer survivor reaches out to help other women cope

Anna Wise knows there are plenty of other women who have walked in her shoes. "I've seen women in their 20s die because they were so overwhelmed. They didn't know where the money would come from," said the Canton resident, a member of That's What Friends Are For, which assists women seeking nonconventional treatments for breast cancer.

When Wise was diagnosed with breast cancer at 33, she went through conventional radiation and chemotherapy. The cancer was in 22 lymph nodes and her bones. With the decision to have a bone marrow transplant at Duke University Medical Center,

Wise like many other women discovered insurance wouldn't cover the cost of treatment.

Faced with exorbitant costs, Wise and her husband, Charles, were forced to sell their dream house on three acres in Milford. "One week before the transplant, insurance said they would pay," Wise said.

That wasn't luck. That was the work and knowledge made available through That's What Friends Are For, represented by the National Breast Cancer Coalition. "I didn't need an attorney. They made it easier for me," said Wise, an occupational therapist.

That's What Friends Are For provides fund-raising, education and legal assistance when women with breast cancer are faced with

a choice their lives or money to pay for treatment, such as bone marrow transplants, which many insurance companies continue to view as experimental.

This year proceeds from the second annual Andrea McClure Center for Cancer at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 25, will go directly to That's What Friends Are For. Anyone and everyone is invited to participate in the 5K walk/run, sanctioned by the Motor City Striders, beginning at the Lathrup Village Municipal Building, Southfield Road, four blocks north of I-696. You may register at the race with a \$15 entry fee.

"This will help women pay for

bone marrow transplants or provide them with legal help with their insurance companies," Wise said. "We can help figure out the system for women. Right now insurance companies still take it case by case."

The not-for-profit group was formed by Detroit resident Rosalyn Grace-Hughes when she learned her friend Andrea McClure of Lathrup Village needed \$120,000 for a bone marrow transplant. "They got an attorney and Ford Motor Blue Cross/Blue Shield settled out of court."

While insurance companies may consider bone marrow transplants experimental, success is

realized. "I'm a survivor," Wise said. "I've never been happier. It's an attitude. I was told I would have one year to live. With young women the cancers are more aggressive. I changed my priorities. I changed my diet, my stress."

The results of a Duke University study show that of 85 women with 10 more more cancerous lymph nodes who had bone marrow transplants, 72 percent are alive and disease-free six years after treatment, including high-dose chemotherapy. With standard chemotherapy, only 30-35 percent with cancer at the same stage are alive and disease-free after six years of treatment, according

to the university.

"Women are no longer sitting back and being passive about this," said Wise, who credits her husband with helping her and other women who are faced with cancer or abnormal mammogram results.

Wise and other women in That's What Friends Are For work to encourage women with breast cancer to interview doctors and hospitals for treatment. "If a doctor is offended by that you don't need that doctor," she said. "We need to educate women. My attitude is that if I can help other women, I'm doing something good."

Bishop voices his concerns on poverty

Liberal Detroit Bishop Thomas Gumbleton told a group of well-dressed Plymouth businessmen and women Friday that some "may find it difficult to hear what I'm saying."

"We consume excessively," Gumbleton said. He added that violence is a problem all over the world partly because too many resources flow from the poor to rich nations.

"We need to change our attitude, we can solve our problems," said Gumbleton, who gained national attention when he visited the American hostages held in Iran in the late '70s.

"We have to give our hearts over to forgiveness, reconciliation and love," Gumbleton said. The occasion was a Community Prayer Breakfast sponsored by Plymouth's three Kiwanis clubs. Nearly 100 Kiwanians and guests showed for the morning event at the Mayflower Hotel's Colony Room.

Gumbleton's generally conservative audience listened intently

to his address.

Rick Grinrod said the speech recalled a theme of reconciliation he heard in a recent address by Detroit Mayor Dennis Archer.

"I think his talk was sobering and insightful," added Thomas Okasinski, a Plymouth engineer. "It was long on explaining the problems but short on proposing solutions."

The theme of Gumbleton's address was "Violence: From Third World Countries to the Streets of our Cities."

To illustrate what breeds violence in the world, Gumbleton recalled his talk with a peasant in El Salvador. "I used to feed the (landowner's) dogs bowls of meat," the man told Gumbleton, adding that his children meanwhile were starving.

"My own children died (from starvation) without even a nod of sympathy from him," the man told Gumbleton, who said, "Violence is done to the human spirit to watch one of your own children die of hunger."

He said the U.S. military encourages this system to continue.

when we go to war to keep a flow of cheap goods coming here.

For example, he said, women and kids sometimes work as long as 36 hours a stretch in garment factories in Bangladesh - for a

top wage of \$10 a day. Women in Haiti make 14 cents an hour sewing baseballs for the United States market, he added.

"We have some responsibility for what is happening there,"

Gumbleton said.

During a question and answer period, state Sen. Bob Geake, R-Northville, asked Gumbleton if he thought the North American Free Trade Agreement helped

Third World poor.

A Mexican bishop, Gumbleton said, told him it will make things worse because poor farmers will be forced off their land and driven to crowded Mexico City slums.

Dedication of historic Sheldon School a proud moment

Norman Simons remembers getting a good number of old-fashioned whippings when he was a little boy at Sheldon School. His brother George remembers the teacher testing each student individually in the one-room schoolhouse.

"You had to study all the time you were here," George Simons said, during the dedication of the restored schoolhouse on Michigan near Sheldon Thursday.

Norman and George and their families returned to the school-

house - they lived immediately east of it as children - as did other former students and teachers. Norman and George also remember a frame school on the property. That's where the children in grades K-4 studied. "The year I was in fourth grade we went into the big school," Norman said.

Their late father William, who came to Canton from Canada in the late 1890s, owned a well-known car repair shop on Michigan next to the schoolhouse, where auto king Preston Tucker would stop for repairs, knowledge and help.

"It was all farms out here - very few active subdivisions," George Simons said, recalling his boyhood on Michigan Avenue.

Township officials joined members of the Canton Historical Society and Canton Historic District Society to dedicate the 120-year-old school that is now leased and used by Child and Family Services for adult day care.

"That warms my heart and makes my face smile," said Terri Bennett, historic district commission chair, referring to the building's current use.

Joan Palmer, local historian and historical society chair, spoke of the school's history and the families long-associated with the farming community such as the Truesdells and Robbs who attended the school.

"I had never been in a one-room schoolhouse," said Glenn Fitzgerald, who was 22 years old when he taught grades 5-8 at the school in 1950 and earned \$3,000. "It was one of the best experiences of my life."

Canton Supervisor Tom Yack lauded the historical society and commission's efforts with the

restoration. "Too often in America we are into bulldozing and building new. This is a step in the right direction."

Yet comment was made about the unexpected costs and hard work in restoring the brick Victorian-style building in the historic Sheldon Corners district. "How many times have you been at a dedication and someone says it's on time and on budget. Not this one," Yack said. "We thought we had on our hands a money pit."

The restoration, at approximately \$350,000, was beset with

unexpected problems such as a basement that was full of water, said Mike Ager, township resource development coordinator. The township bought the schoolhouse for \$70,000 in 1987. Federal Community Development Block Grant and township money paid for the restoration.

Work on the schoolhouse included a new roof, some asbestos removal, as well as restoring the interior and exterior. A separate building on the property, known as the auction house and later used as the Sheldon Dance Hall, was demolished.

Catholic Central student has formula for success

Thanks to Canton resident Francis Ko, Catholic Central High School was well-represented at last month's weeklong international science competition in Birmingham, Ala.

Ko, who'll be a junior, earned the right to compete by being named one of eight grand award winners last March at the Science and Engineering Fair of Metropolitan Detroit. The event was sponsored by the Engineering Society of Detroit and The Detroit News.

Ninth through 12th graders from Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties submitted more than 3,500 projects in four categories, judged by 200 scientists from industry and academia.

Winners receive four-year scholarships to universities, including Wayne State, Oakland, Lawrence Tech and the University of Detroit Mercy.

Ko's experiment, which topped the competition in the environmental science category, was titled, "Can Fertilizers Counteract the Effects of Acid Rain on Plants?"

Kathy Kitzman, Ko's honors chemistry teacher, has served as a Science and Engineering Fair director and judge.

"Francis had a very controlled experiment and controlled data. He had to record data over days, weeks, and months and analyze it. That's what we look for in a good project," said Kitzman. "I'd say Francis has an excellent future and lots of potential. He pays attention to detail and is very meticulous in his work."

Ko wasn't a winner at the international competition, however. "One of the judges left him a note, saying that he showed excellent research abilities. The judge urged him to continue to work hard," said Kitzman.

Ko said the idea for his project came to him when it was raining one day. "I wanted to do a hands-on experiment, and I was think-

ing about doing something to help the environment," said Ko. "It just came together." The idea of the experiment was "to help take away the deadly effects of acid rain in places like gardens and flower beds."

Acid rain in metro Detroit comes from auto exhaust and factories that run on coal, said Ko. "They deposit nitric acid and sulfuric acid in water vapor."

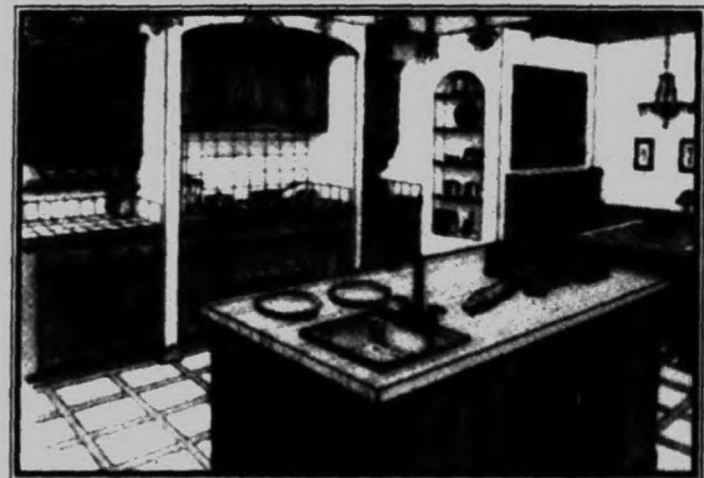

The results of Ko's experiment surprised him. "Fertilizers not only counteract the effects of acid rain, but they also made seeds and plants grow faster and healthier. This conclusion was extremely surprising, because I thought that fertilizer wouldn't be able to help a plant fed with acid rain," he said.

Entering the science fair was well worth it, said Ko, 16. "We got extra points, and time off school, too."

Ko is pondering parlaying his skills into a medical career. "I'm still thinking about it. I enjoy helping other people, but I really don't like to think that if someone dies, it would be your fault. It might be too emotional. I'm thinking about being a pediatrician. Working with kids would be fun," Ko said.

An A- student who competes on CC's regional champion varsity tennis team, Ko hails from an accomplished family. His father, George, is a mechanical engineer at Ford Motor Co. His mother, Jane, teaches science at Henry

Ford, Schoolcraft and Washtenaw community colleges. His brother Karl, 21, graduated from the University of Michigan in electrical engineering and is entering graduate school at the University of Southern California.

Jane Ko said credit goes to "all the teachers at Plymouth Christian Academy and CC who've given Francis a chance to open his eyes and see. Going to the competition enabled him to see so many good students from all over the world. It was a very good exhibit."

CC has participated in the fair since its inception in the 1950s, said Kitzman, who's participated since 1982. "We have first-place winners every year."

work at the Peace Corps office in Detroit involved assessing how she would be about serving.

"They want to see how committed you are," Brugler said.

She's been told that if a Peace Corps volunteer survives a feeling of homesickness that often sets in in the first months into his or her assignment, the volunteer usually takes it out until the end.

Peace Corps training includes instruction in dialects of the area where she'll serve. With a group of four or five other volunteers, Brugler is slated to teach women and children's health in a village in Guinea in northwest Africa on the Atlantic coast.

"It's 72 to 85 degrees year round. I'll be getting there right at the beginning of the rainy season," she said.

Brugler, who likes to swim and exercise, said she may not be able to pursue those activities as freely because Guinea is 78 percent Muslim and customs pertaining to women may restrict this.

She is one of more than 6,000 state residents to become Peace Corps volunteers since the program started in 1961.

SC increases tuition, sets new fee

A tuition increase and a new fee for some classes will greet students for the fall semester at Schoolcraft College.

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees voted 7-0 last month to increase tuition from \$43 to \$45 per credit hour and establish a new fee affecting students in science, technology and culinary arts programs.

Trustees also raised non-resident tuition from \$64.50 to \$68 and out-of-state tuition from \$94 to \$99.

Schoolcraft trustees are Mary Breen of Plymouth Township, Harry Greenleaf of Livonia, Steve Ragan of Plymouth, John Walsh of Livonia, Patricia Watson of Northville, Richard DeVries of Livonia and Carol Strom of Livonia.

"It's not an easy decision to

make, but we thought it was absolutely necessary," Walsh said.

In the 30 years since Schoolcraft was founded in 1964, trustees have raised tuition 18 times. Fifteen of those increases have come in the 16 years since 1978.

However, Schoolcraft tuition still compares favorably with other suburban community colleges. Next fall, in-district students at Henry Ford, Oakland and Wayne County community colleges will pay \$42, \$46 and \$54 per credit hour, respectively.

The reason tuition has risen so dramatically, Schoolcraft officials say, is that the state government's annual subsidies to all community colleges haven't kept pace with inflation. Years ago, the state subsidy accounted for roughly one-third of Schoolcraft's budget. Property tax revenue and tuition comprised the rest.

In Schoolcraft's \$34.5 million

budget for 1994-95 the state subsidy accounts for 26 percent, property taxes 39 percent and tuition 34 percent.

"The college has been very conscientious in keeping the tuition increases to a minimum," Strom said. "We've made every attempt to be as fiscally responsible as we can."

Trustees also approved a new "contact" fee that is expected to raise an additional \$275,000 a year, said Adelard "Butch" Raby, vice president of business.

The fee affects students in courses with non-classroom instruction time. For example, students in some four-credit science courses spend one hour in lab for every four hours in the classroom. Essentially, they've been getting a five credit class for the cost of four credits.

The new fee will cost a student \$10 per additional "contact" hour

above and beyond the number of academic credits given for the course. A \$40 cap was placed on this fee so nursing students wouldn't be charged \$120 extra for some of their courses.

DeVries said he "had to swallow hard" to vote for the contact fee, but it's the "most logical way" to make the students who get additional instruction pay for it.

Schoolcraft levies a property tax of 1.8521 mills and a debt levy of 0.023 mill on property in the Northville, Livonia, Plymouth-Canton, and Garden City school districts, plus the Wayne County portion of the Clarenceville district.

The Redford Union, South Redford and Wayne-Westland school districts are part of the Wayne County Community College district.

Canton's gang remedy told to others

The way to minimize or eliminate youth gang activity is for police, social service agencies, schools, businesses and parents to work together, Canton Township Police Chief John Santomauro told the Conference of Western Wayne on Friday.

Santomauro served as chairman of a group called the Community Gang Task Force for Canton-Plymouth, which sought to find an antidote for gang activity last year at the Canton Commons low income, subsidized apartment complex on Haggerty Road.

"The residents there said they were plagued by fights and assaults, gunfire, weapons, vandalism, and threats by teens and young adults, some of whom were purported to be wearing gang colors," according to a report written by Canton Township official Ken Voyles.

The task force, comprised of 17 representatives from local government, police departments, social-service agencies, and schools, has worked out a system for dealing with gang activity.

The Conference of Western Wayne, a consortium of mayors and supervisors from 18 cities and townships in Wayne County, was interested in how the three Observer communities (city of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township) attacked their gang problem.

Santomauro said that it was interesting to learn that police, social-service agencies and the schools all had information on gangs, but seldom shared it.

Now a common data base has been established with access for police, social workers and school officials. Files are kept on suspected gang members.

Santomauro said that the government and its police depart-

ment can't raise anyone's children.

"The parents have got to start being held accountable for the actions of their children," he said. "It's nice to stand up there (at a meeting) and say, 'Raise your own children.'"

"I love it, I love it," said Garden City Councilman Raymond Wiacek of Santomauro's statement. "I think John hit it right on the head."

Also speaking to the mayors and supervisors were task force members Brenda Plecha of Family Service Detroit & Wayne County, and Sue Davis of Growth Works in Plymouth.

Plecha said part of the difficulty in defusing suburban gangs is that many community residents, whose support is essential, think of gang activity as a Detroit problem. Even when people admit there are gangs in their community, "they still want to pigeonhole

it in one spot," Plecha said.

Furthermore, Plecha believes we harm society by not straining mightily to accommodate and understand the problems of teenagers the way we do for senior citizens.

"They're part of the community, and the community needs to respond that way," she said.

Davis said she was "really impressed" with the way all aspects of the Plymouth/Canton community worked together on the gang task force. She emphasized educating parents on gang activity as a means of prevention. "The attitude of the kid is, 'How much can I do that my parents don't know about?'" she said.

Santomauro also noted that new ordinances regarding the possession of pagers and spray paint by minors are having a beneficial effect. "A 12-, 13-, 14-year-old has no business running around with a pager," he said.

Metro Airport to improve lighting, signs

Wayne County is embarking on a \$21 million program to upgrade airfield lighting and signage at Metro Airport.

"This program is only possible because of the outstanding cooperation we have received from the airlines and the Federal Aviation Administration," said county Executive Edward H. McNamara in a press release.

Project funding sources are the FAA and general revenue bonds, supported by the airlines.

Metro's hub carrier, Northwest Airlines, which handles 70 percent of Metro passengers, endorses the plan.

The project will revise and replace, where necessary, airfield lighting and signage, making Metro's older runways and taxi-

ways meet the same standards as required in new construction.

Circuiting, regulators and signage on four Metro runways will be reworked to match standards incorporated into the construction of the airport's new runway, which opened last November.

"Among the most important elements of this project is the replacement of electrical regulators

for airfield lighting for which it is becoming increasingly difficult to find parts," said airport director Robert Braun.

Included will be revisions to taxiway lighting, runway centerline lighting, edge lighting and the replacement of 350 signs.

Construction will begin this summer and is expected to last two years.

Athletic club gets down to business

Fun and fitness is their product and honesty is their promise to members of the new Park Place Athletic Club, located in the Laurel Park Place mall.

It was a rocky start for the new management company that took over the defunct United Health Spa, but management there is pleased with the response from new members and from members of the old facility they wooed with discounted entrance fees.

The new Park Place Athletic Club is being managed by Club Management Consultants, owners of the Beverly Hills Racquet and Health Club with 20 years experience in the health club industry. They took over in April, just a few days after United closed doors at its Livonia and Rochester locations. Former United club members were left in a lurch, having invested in lifetime memberships to a spa that no longer existed.

"We had a lot of irate people at first," said Tom McCarthy, vice president and general manager for the Beverly Hills club. "When we started, our membership was less than zero because former members of United were so upset."

There were picketers posted outside the club for days. They said their memberships should be honored by the new club.

"We are two different businesses," McCarthy said. "When people buy a lifetime membership to something, they need to understand that is the lifetime of the business not necessarily the individual's lifetime. But, we are over the hump now and people have been happy with the changes."

Club Management Consultants were called in just a few days after United closed at the request of investors in the former club. McCarthy's firm entered into a long-term agreement with the investors to manage the business.

The new Park Place Athletic Club opened its doors for the first time April 21 after investing \$100,000 in renovations.

"We've made a lot of changes to make the club more airy and to make best use of the space," said Dawn Koehler, club manager.

Free weights have been moved downstairs so members can use the mirrors to ensure proper use of the equipment. Workout areas are co-ed, with men and women working side by side on rowing machines, treadmills, Stairmasters and many other pieces of equipment.

The upstairs space is designated for cardio-vascular workouts, with treadmills and a large aerobics room. Classes in step aerobics and traditional aerobic classes are offered.

Women's and men's locker rooms have been completely renovated as well as steam rooms for men and women and the club's pool.

Koehler said all staff trainers have degrees in related fields and work closely to set up a workout program for members.

"We do initial screening as part of the initiation," she said. "After that private sessions with trainers are available at an additional fee."

"This place was a mess when we came in to look at it," McCarthy said. "When you offer these lifetime memberships (like the former club) you're gambling with your future and they just didn't have the money to keep things going."

McCarthy said the biggest difference in their new operation is that it is designed to be more like a country club. Members pay a one-time initiation fee and then they pay monthly membership dues. For their money, they use the club as much as they want.

"There's no risk that way. We ask for a one-year commitment at first, but after that they can quit with just 60 days notice," he said.

The club has already built up a membership of a little more than 400 people.

Koehler considers the club to be a new business in Livonia and she is anxious to become a part of the community. They are already sponsoring a Little League team and are teaming up with Botsford Hospital for some programs. They also hope to participate in some special fitness programs with the other Laurel Park Place merchants.

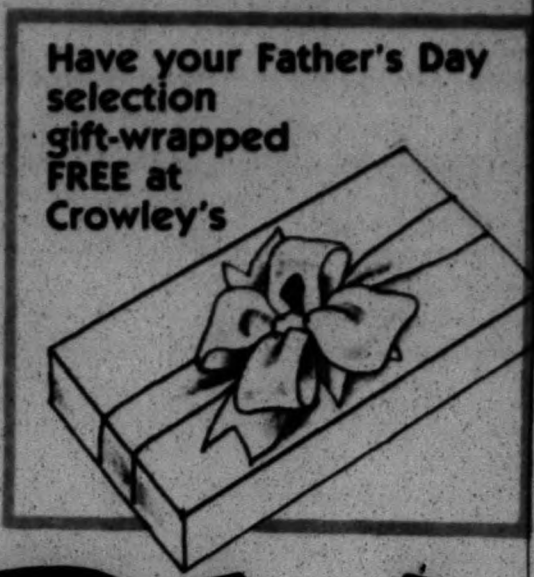

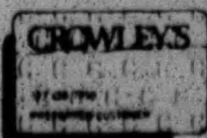

Self-exploration shows in his art

A dramatic installation by artist Dennis Jones deals with the search for identity and the ability to define and change self-destructive behavioral patterns. Cathartic in nature, the exhibit presents a sea of images to taunt, tease and tempt viewers with a psychological house of mirrors.

Take a look for yourself. Jones' untitled one-man show runs June 24 to July 15 at the Willis Gallery, 422 W. Willis and Cass, Detroit. Upon entering the gallery an 11-foot-long niche begins the journey. On the wall to the right five file drawers, covered with plaster, feature lone porcelain figures sealed in wax. To the left, five steel coated muslin dolls use the irony of the materials as a response to the unnatural role men are forced to assume in our society.

As you enter the primary space, directly in front of you 10 7-foot tall panels spanning 30 feet across line the wall, each with a faceless life-size figure painted in a palette of black and white. As if lost in a foggy inner world, the 10 figures alternately emerge and recede in repetition.

"These paintings are about looking back; the figures have to do with opening up and expressing my emotions clearly and a tendency to withdraw," said Jones in an interview in his Westland apartment. "Some of them just have an outline form. I wanted to emphasize this emerging from the background, a freeze-thaw, a freezing of emotions, a thawing of emotions."

"The figure has a fragile quality, and the fact that there's no features, it's as if it's looking for an identity."

Jones juggles multiple mediums and issues in the installation. To the right of the paintings, 100 3-by-5 black-and-white photographs of singular figures are aligned horizontally in rows of 20. To the left, drawings on mylar quiz the mind. Working through a divorce that became final in January, Jones reflects on the past and what went wrong.

"The identity issue relates specifically to my divorce, trying to start anew," he said. "How do you respond to the notion, you've been married for nine years and then all of a sudden the relationship has changed drastically."

Jones' work has come a long way since receiving his master of fine arts in painting from Wayne State University in 1990, and a two-man show at Swidler Gallery in 1992. From darkness to light, Jones' search for self has paid off big time, and as always, the work is confrontational.

In the 1992 show at Swidler, Jones' paintings were dark and heavy incorporating iron, steel, dirt and bone into the rough but flat surfaces. He used a power sander, torch and wide spackler to work the medium.

As part of a group show at the Detroit Artist's Market in 1993, Jones, colors became vivid and bright. Gone was the roughness and zealous working of the medium. His newest work emerges the overall winner, a struggle with emotions that proves everything isn't always black and white.

The installation at the Willis combines Jones' talents as architect and artist. A graduate of the University of Detroit School of Architecture, Jones opened his own studio, providing architectural and design/rendering services in 1992. Previously, he had worked for a variety of architecture/design companies, including Peterhansra Design.

In 1989, he won the City of Troy Beautification Award for Design of a Michigan National Bank branch, and in 1984 was awarded the second-place Design Award and \$5,000 cash prize in the International New York Vietnam Veteran's Memorial competition.

Jones, who has served on the drawing faculty of Wayne State University and Macomb Community College, is presently teaching at UD's, School of Architecture. This strong architectural background-surfaces in his use of space in the installation.

"My architectural background has had an effect on how I respond to space; I really take into account the space," he said. "There's a certain regularity of size with a piece. I like to establish a rhythm as you walk around the space."

Plans for the installation began last fall after Jones submitted slides to the gallery for consideration. A muslin doll bought at a craft shop served as a jumping-off point.

"I hope people take time to connect. It has to do with fear. It has to do with trust, being aware of yourself, how they might respond to a person they're involved with in a relationship. I hope it helps someone else become aware of themselves."

The opening of Jones installation will be 6-10 p.m. Friday, June 24, at the gallery. For information call (313) 831-0136.

Kids come first for Biohazard

■ Don't expect gangsta rap or gut-wrenchingly violent lyrics from Biohazard. In "State of the World Address" they just tell it like they've seen it.

Don't call Biohazard "a sellout" for jumping from independent label Roadrunner Records to the giant Warner Bros.

Records. They just followed their hearts.

"A sellout is someone who isn't true to themselves, who prostitutes themselves for somebody else's gain," said bassist/vocalist Evan Seinfeld in a phone interview from London, England. "What we're doing is for us. Whoever puts out (our) record is always going to make more money than we do on it so we want to make sure whoever does it does the best job they can do."

Most of the time, guitarist Bobby Hamel said, those who slap that label on Biohazard are being hypocritical anyway.

"There's a lot of kids that talk about sellout, as if they know what the word means. Meanwhile, they wake up every day, go to a job that they know is going to pay them at the end of the week that they hate," he said. "Now who's the sellout?"

Late last month, the band released its first effort for Warner Bros., "State of the World Address." Produced by Ed Stasium (Living Colour), the album tells the hard rock band's view of the world in 14 songs.

"We try to confront a lot of social issues, not just because anyone else does or doesn't... because it's important to us," he added.

For example, "Love Denied" is a song about dysfunctional families that suggests "a notion of forgiveness." The song is especially important to Seinfeld, who found out a month ago that he's going to be a father. It has made him think about how he is going to treat his baby.

"I'm very conscious already; I'm thinking about every little thing," he said. "There's so many kinds of abuse — physical, mental, intellectual, spiritual, emotional. So many people don't realize they're abusing their kids."

Inner-city lifestyles, Vietnam veterans and anger are some of the other topics touched upon in "State

of the World Address." By voicing their opinions about issues like these, Biohazard hopes to turn around the lives of troubled kids. Having grown up in Brooklyn, the band can relate.

"We're just four regular (guys) out of the streets (whose) lives were saved by this band. We were all headed on self-destruction courses," Seinfeld said.

They deem this mission so important that the band has chosen to visit youth homes in lieu of signing autographs at record stores. Biohazard wants to be these kids' one positive role model.

"That's why we don't have any qualms about doing public service announcements," Seinfeld said. "Our record company wanted us to do all these in-stores (appearances). We told the record company, 'All the time you guys have allotted for us to do a record signing, we're gonna go to youth homes and group homes

where kids who are under 21 are incarcerated."

Most of these kids have heard the rap-laden hard rock of Biohazard so they're apt to listen to what the band says, he added.

It's been a way of life for the quartet — which also includes vocalist/guitarist Billy Graziadei and drummer Danny Schuler — since they formed in 1988. Their near-obsessive self-promotion early in their career is part of the reason Biohazard has gotten this far, Seinfeld said. Part of their deal with Warner Bros. is that they get total creative freedom.

"We've always done all the work ourselves. Back when we first started the band in '88, we'd go out every other night putting up posters with the Biohazard symbol and just 'Biohazard' underneath. We just kind of forced it on everybody," he said.

They played small clubs "until people started coming back." A year later, the band signed with Mace Records and sold more than 40,000 copies of their self-titled debut. In 1992 Roadrunner Records inked a

deal with Biohazard. Following suit, the album "Urban Discipline" sold 300,000 copies worldwide. The video for the single "Punishment" has since become one of the most played videos on MTV's "Headbanger's Ball."

The massive distribution capabilities of Warner Bros. Records has made "State of the World Address" readily available to Biohazard fans. After rocky relationships with the two independent labels, that makes Biohazard feel more at ease.

They also finally nabbed the opening spot with Pantera that they've been vying for for two years. The tour, which includes Sepultura, marks Biohazard's first time in arenas.

"We're totally flabbergasted; we've never played in places this big."

Biohazard performs with Pantera and Sepultura at The Palace of Auburn Hills, I-75 and Lapeer Road, at 7 p.m. Saturday, June 25. Tickets are \$22.50 in advance; \$25 the day of the show. For more information, call (810) 377-8200 or (810) 645-6666.

Thunderharp Choir dares to be different

Today's modern music styles demand that bands create as diverse sound as possible which many times — inadvertently or purposely — leads groups to simply mirror others.

Thunderharp Choir's diverse harmonic, acoustic-based sound comes naturally to the six-member band which takes pride in its flexibility.

But what do you expect from a band that enjoyed playing the sweater department at JCPenney's at Briarwood Mall in Ann Arbor.

"People were actually shopping as we were playing," said drummer Ron Vensko. "There was a lady shopping for sweaters behind me as I was playing. I felt something hitting my back and I turned around and there she was."

Unusual-placed gigs are just part of the dues that bands have to pay, according to Thunderharp Choir. On June 22, however, the band will play a

high-profile gig at Griff's Grill as part of the bar/restaurant's concert series in conjunction with the World Cup Games at the Pontiac Silverdome.

Mid-June will also bring the release of Thunderharp Choir's 14-track compact disc which was recorded at Livonia's Sound on Sound studios.

Critics have described the band's sound as edgy folk rock, but the band prefers to do its own name calling, such as "American," "pop/alternative" and even "neo-grunge."

"We like to experiment, but I've seen experimental bands which are far out there," vocalist Christine McCall-Kuehn. "We are grounded. We like lyrics and harmonies."

The band's liking for originality does not stop with lyrics alone. The band uses such instruments as a harp, violin and harmonica as well as its lineup of two lead vocalists, gui-

Red Rock West' hits the big screen

Score it high for cult appeal. The leads in "Red Rock West" — Nicolas Cage, Dennis Hopper, Lara Flynn Boyle — all had memorable roles in David Lynch movies. The thought alone of Hopper reprising anything close to the menace of Frank Booth in "Blue Velvet" should sell tickets.

HBO Pictures originally didn't see it that way. It bypassed theatrical release for this low-budget thriller and instead buried it in late-night cable slots and on the shelves of video stores (you can find a single copy at the local Blockbuster, if you're lucky). It took the persistence of a San Francisco art house and small-time distributor to bring the movie to big screens nationally.

Following the arrival of "Red Rock West" at the Main Theater in Royal Oak are a string of reviews, hailing it as the year's best American film. While it doesn't deserve this kind of adulation, it's definitely a hoot for film noir

buffs who enjoy their thrillers Texas-style.

Red Rock is a sand speck of a Southwest desert town where Michael (Cage) limps in on his last tank of gas. Shuffling into the local bar, he's greeted by the owner Wayne (J.T. Walsh), who mistakes him for the hired gun he's been waiting for.

Michael pockets the \$5,000 deposit and takes off for the bartender's house, not to shoot his wife Suzanne (Flynn Boyle) as instructed, but to warn her instead. She appreciates the gesture, doubles Michael's money and sends him on his way.

Of course, things never work out this cleanly. The scheming bar owner is also the town sheriff and as he tracks Michael, the real killer arrives. Fans of Dennis Hopper at his most psychotic and anti-social won't be disappointed.

Director John Dahl, who debuted in 1989 with another straight-to-cable quickie called "Kill Me Again," has a nice feel for this material. He's obviously seen a number of the film noir titles that "Red Rock West" pays tribute to — maybe too many.

In classic cost-cutting style, the movie sticks close to its quartet of characters. It also has some inventive and often sublimely beautiful camerawork, using midnight blues and deep golds instead of the traditional black and white. The force of gunshots is accented by fast pans away from a weapon and toward its prey.

After a while, however, "Red Rock" starts looking like strung-together bits from other people's movies. Cage's character is an ex-Marine; his "Wild at Heart" monicker was Sailor. He and Flynn Boyle hide in a closet and watch the action through darkened slats a la "Blue Velvet."

Hopper, in one of his memorably cheery lines and again driving a black muscle car, rhapsodizes about the purr of a V-8 engine with the same gusto he once reserved for Pabst Blue Ribbon.

Flynn Boyle makes your standard femme fatale. Is there ever

any doubt that this woman is bad to the bone?

Cage is still playing, well, Nicolas Cage. You have to hand it to him for picking unusual projects, though. He can work with the biggest names in Hollywood and then sign up on a no-name project like this one in the hopes of discovering another Lynch or Joel and Ethan Coen. He may have hit paydirt with Dahl.

While underdog status of "Red Rock West" makes it seem better than it actually is, the movie deserves to be seen with an audience that can laugh along with its low-key humor.

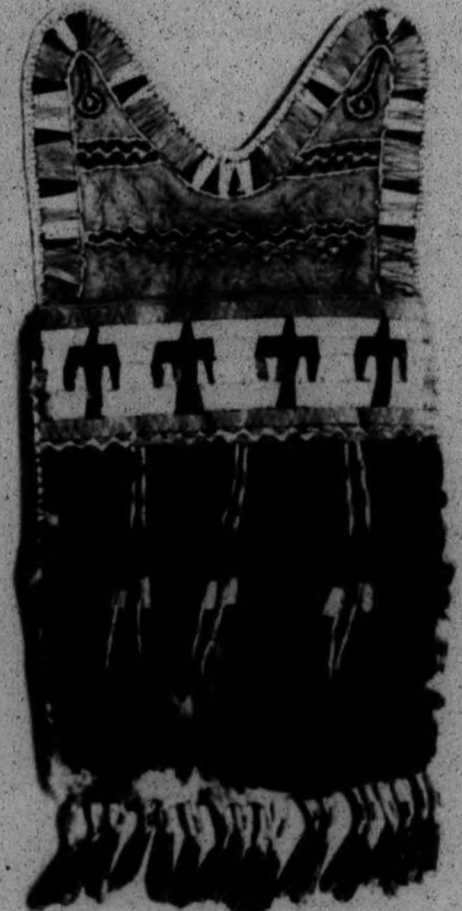

artist, bassist, drummer and percussionist who isn't afraid to use almost anything, including a fire extinguisher, for the best sound.

Nothing about Thunderharp Choir is contrived. The members insist their sound is spontaneously generated.

"We just kind of jam for awhile and then something clicks," said bassist Don Didonato.

Even though Thunderharp Choir feels creative freedom is the key to its music, perfection is also an essential aspect.

"Everyone is very picky; most everyone does not settle for anything. Everyone demands a lot from each other," Jason McCall-Kuehn, a 1983 graduate of Livonia Stevenson High School.

Even though the members might be picky, they are not afraid to stick their neck out to capture musical creativity, such as using 11 children to sing nursery rhymes. The children sang various songs for roughly an hour, but their appearance on the song "Strawberries" on the band's forthcoming release. The chil-

dren's voices were essential to the song, according to vocalist Graham Strachan, a 1980 Stevenson graduate.

"The song is about when I moved to this country," said Strachan, who moved from Scotland to the United States as a child. "I remember hearing from the street where I lived a man selling fruit and calling out 'strawberries' and 'bananas.'"

Thunderharp Choir has long-time ties to the area. Strachan, who has penned songs for Atlantic Records artist and Detroit native Liz Larin, also fronts the recently regrouped Robb Roy. Christine McCall-Kuehn fronted, toured and released an album with Jugglers and Thieves. Jason McCall-Kuehn owns Sound on Sound and is a compatriot of Strachan's in Robb Roy.

House bill toughens drunk-driving law for young adults

The state House passed a bill last week that would make it illegal for anyone under the age of 21 to drive with a blood alcohol content of 0.02 percent or greater.

The current drunken-driving laws would apply to people convicted of violating this law. A blood alcohol level of 0.02 can be

exceeded by drinking just one or two 12-ounce beers.

For people 21 and older, the law hasn't changed. They still have to have a blood alcohol content of 0.1 percent or greater to be legally drunk.

Gov. John Engler is expected to sign the legislation.

Area representatives voting in favor of the law were Lyn Bankes, R-Redford Township, whose district includes part of Livonia; William Keith, D-Garden City; Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, whose district includes part of Livonia; and Deborah Whyman, R-Canton Township.

Voting against the law were representatives Justine Barns, D-Westland, and Richard Young, D-Dearborn Heights, whose district includes part of Redford Township.

The new, stiff penalty ties in with another law passed overwhelmingly last March. Pub-

lic Act 31, which went into effect June 1, makes it a misdemeanor to knowingly allow underage drinking at a social gathering, or to knowingly allow anyone to consume or possess a controlled substance at a social gathering.

The law applies to an owner, tenant, or any other person who

has control over any premises, residence or other property.

Many communities already have ordinances on their books saying much the same thing, but a state law is easier to enforce, said AAA Michigan government affairs officer Bill Cillusso.

Big games. Big money. There's no doubt about the big bucks following the marketing of sporting events. The malls and Main Street shops plan to cash-in on World Cup fever the next two weeks, selling everything from T-shirts to tote-bags.

Collectible pin trading, a Swiss wine tasting party, big-screen soccer broadcasts and drawings for prizes are just a few of the special events planned for mall shoppers when the World Cup Soccer Games come to the Silverdome in Pontiac June 18-28.

And while fans enjoy the festivities, retailers hope that they'll want to buy a book about the game, a soccer ball just for kicks, and a T-shirt to commemorate the event.

Janet Stecher, spokeswoman for the The Michigan World Cup Host Committee, said while no retail sales predictions were made around World Cup Soccer, the guestimate would probably be in the thousands of dollars.

"Somerset Collection in Troy, the four local Taubman shopping centers and Great Oaks Mall in Rochester have been instrumental in organizing World Cup promotions, and we are delighted with their plans. Related sales of merchandise should be wonderful," she said.

To welcome international visitors, the Taubman centers, Lakeside in Sterling Heights, Twelve Oaks in Novi, Fairlane Town Center in Dearborn and Briarwood in Ann Arbor will offer language assistance, tourist

guides and monetary conversion charts.

Raised in Munich, Germany, Rickert came to the United States in 1978. Her interest in soccer stems from her homeland's love for the sport. Her two children share her interest in the sport and play on local teams.

that's what hurt them, going after younger customers and overlooking their regular shoppers. We won't make that mistake at Jacobson's."

This column has been in the making for more than eight years. Although momma gets mentioned the most in my column, along with my sister Rose, Aunt Phyllis, and all the other unrivaled Janes women cooks, nary a period has been spared for my dad.

He has taught me well. Not being one to bask in the spotlight, my dad has been content to stand quietly in the wings, kind of like the kid in school who caused no problems, raised no furor, and when called upon, knew all the answers.

Silent helper

My dad never once made an omelet, but on numerous occasions, he scrubbed and seasoned the cast iron skillet so well that hardly a drop of grease needed to be used. He's the one who went to the market - without complaining after working 16 hours straight - for eggs.

Dad keenly sharpened the kitchen knife on the grinding wheel in the garage. Dad was the one who reached into his wallet when momma yelled for one of us kids to ride our bike to the Party Pantry for margarine. He always smiled and said "keep the change."

Dad was the one who, whether he liked it or not, when momma directed, would pull out the stove twice a year so momma could clean the floor, something that hasn't been done at my house since the day we moved in.

My dad never made dinner, but he spent many an hour cleaning freshly caught perch, smelt and walleye that he and I fished from the lake. He taught me how to fillet so perfectly with nothing more than a pocket knife. He taught me patience, but more important, he taught me how to sit in our boat, kick back, and if but for just a few hours, forget about the crazy world on shore.

My dad taught me that it was OK to slide your bread around the dinner plate to sop up all those juices and then eat it with your fingers. He might never have made dinner, but he instilled in me a work ethic that always provided the means to enjoy dinner.

Handyman

My dad never read a cookbook, but he could help build a basketball hoop, a shelf for my trophies and rewire the camper trailer without the help of a book or manual. Last week, six months short of his 80th birthday, he drove out and explained in detail what needed to be done, and then proceeded to help me replace my kitchen air conditioner and 220-volt line to the stove. He could light a pilot light with his Zippo lighter and never singe the hair on his arm.

He could be content with a beer and a baloney sandwich yet appreciate a fine liqueur and filet mignon. He always gave thanks for what we ate no matter how simple or fancy. When he came with me to a taping of Kelly and Company at Channel 7 or was my guest while judging at the Michigan State Fair, he would sit on the sidelines with a proud grin on his face knowing that I just wasn't his son but also his friend. My dad never complained when he had to work on major holidays. For that matter, he never complained about burnt toast, under cooked chicken or having to change the fuse when momma blew the circuit breakers because she had the oven, stove top, mixer and two Nesco roasters operating simultaneously.

My dad, being the great connoisseur that he is, taught me that when you're on vacation, it's perfectly OK to dine at Zender's in Frankenmuth, Pete & Mickey's in Charlevoix, the Belt Street Bar in Grand Rapids and Giovanni's in Melvindale in shorts and a T-shirt. He would also hint that God was happy you came to church and that a jacket and tie wasn't always needed.

My dad never told us to say thank you to the people who waited on us in restaurants, but we know it was the right thing to do simply because he did it. And I can still remember the day when we went out to dinner as a family and he asked the waitress to refigure the bill because when he totaled the check in his mind, she short changed her self and the restaurant by not "carrying the one."

In his own special way, Dad has taught me about love and patience. Thank you dad, I love you, Happy Father's Day.

Busy dad shops and cooks for his family

Peter Kreher is every busy woman's dream. When he comes home from work he drops his briefcase and reaches for an apron.

You can talk all you want about mom's apple pie, but the Kreher family of Birmingham raves about dad's baked beans, chicken fajitas, or his infamous yellow rice. Did I fail to mention his marinated leg

of lamb, which starts out on the grill and reaches perfection in the oven?

"With my lamb I get marriage proposals," said Peter Kreher, a busy insurance agent and active Rotarian who not only does all the cooking for his family, but the food shopping as well. We're talking "super dad" here, or at least "super supper dad."

Wife Julie, a full-time media

specialist in the Birmingham School District, is quite pleased with the arrangement. In fact, she says it's mutually beneficial. "It gives us both the opportunity to wind down after work. I don't have the pressure to get dinner ready, and Peter has his evenings free to play volleyball, golf, tennis, or squash."

As a teacher, Julie enjoys the after-dinner time to help their two daughters, Kristy, 13, and Sarah, 8, with their homework. "Besides," Julie adds, "I don't enjoy cooking."

Like most families with young children, the Krehers' lives revolve around managing careers, family activities, and community involvement. Kreher drops his briefcase and grabs an apron as soon as he walks in the door at 4 p.m. He cooks a full meal almost every night, complete with vegetables, and always with an emphasis on low fat. He claims to be spontaneous. "I really never plan anything," he says. Oh sure. Only a

man who knows what's in his cupboards can say that.

It all started when Kreher was a starving student at the University of Detroit. He constantly called his mother back in Buffalo asking, "Ma, how do you cook this?" Her response was to send him a thick book full of blank pages, with the advice to fill in those blanks. "She told me to stand over the stove and cook, keep adding things until I like it, then stop," Kreher says. He continues to follow her wise advice.

Grilling is his specialty. "I grill out all year long," he said. "I grill more in the winter than in the summer." His chicken fajitas are a family favorite. He serves them with white beans or yellow rice, his signature dish. And he usually accompanies all his grilled entrees with a serving of fresh fruit, such as watermelon.

Kreher is a mild-mannered man with a great sense of humor, except when it comes to his yellow rice. Then he's all business. "I go down to Eastern Market and buy Uncle Ben's (Converted) yellow rice. It's between a white and a brown. There's no saffron in it, and it has its own special flavor," he says. Kreher buys the rice in 10-pound sacks.

So, what does a man who can saute, roast, grill and grow his own garlic, basil, and leeks serve for dessert?

Bananas Foster or cherries jubilee flamed to heavenly heights on his trusty gas grill?

Not! Kreher doesn't do desserts. "You know what, we run down to the Dairy Deluxe on Woodward. We're there six nights a week," said Kreher without apology. Then, always conscious of maintaining a low-fat diet, he adds, "Although I always get the no-fat yogurt."

Knowing that Father's Day is an inherent work day for anyone in the food business, chef Mike Messing, sous chef at Sebastian's Grill at The Somerset Collection in Troy, also will be slaving over a hot stove this Father's Day. Messing, a graduate of the acclaimed culinary arts program at Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills is the eldest of 10 brothers.

"Dad instilled a steady work ethic and always insisted that I reach for my goals," said Messing, who claims to get his talent for cooking smelt from his dad. Messing's career choice was also inspired by his mom and grandma, who made bread almost daily and loved to cook.

PORK ROAST WITH POTATOES

1 pork butt, about 3-4 pounds, bone in
8 potatoes, scrubbed, cut in half
5 carrots, cut into 2 inch pieces
1 onion, chopped coarse
1 cup water
1/2 teaspoons seasoned salt
Dust pork butt with a little flour

and brown in some hot oil on four sides until golden, about 4-5 minutes. Place in a roasting pan and set aside. Place the skillet you browned the roast in over high heat. Add water and scrape pan to loosen bits.

Immediately pour over pork butt. Sprinkle with seasoned salt. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Remove from the oven. Add potatoes, carrots and onions. Spoon pan juices over pork, vegetables and potatoes. Cover and continue baking for 1 hour or until roast is

cooked as desired. Serves 6-8. Ask my dad what he would ask momma to make for his last meal and he would probably request

CITY CHICKEN

1 pound veal shoulder, cut into 1 inch cubes
1 pound pork butt, cut into 1 inch cubes
3 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons oil (vegetable or olive oil)
1/2 teaspoon sage

Salt and fresh ground pepper to taste
6 slices (thick) bread, cut into cubes or bread crumbs
Wooden skewers for meat

Marinate the veal and the pork in the lemon juice and the olive oil for at least 1 hour. Thread the meat alternately on the skewers. Crumble the bread in a blender or processor and season with sage, salt and pepper. Dip chicken in a milk wash or lightly beaten egg and roll in seasoned bread crumbs.

Place on a baking pan and bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. If desired, top with a can of cream of mushroom soup diluted with 1/2 can of milk and continue baking until sauce thickens. Serves 4.

SAUCY PORK CHOPS

6 pork chops, about 1/4 inch thick
4 tablespoons seasoned flour
1 medium onion, sliced thin
1 (10 1/2 ounce) can condensed

cream of chicken soup
1/4 cup catsup
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Dust pork chops with seasoned flour. In a medium skillet, brown pork chops in a little oil. Top chops with onion slices. Combine soup with catsup and Worcestershire. Mix well.

Pour over chops, cover and reduce heat to a simmer. Cook for 60 minutes or until done. Serve with sauce. Serves 6.

Spicy pork, steamed clams make festive summer dishes

This Szechuan classic incorporates crunchy water chestnuts and tender pork which are bathed in a fiery orange garlic sauce.

Serve this dish with lots of rice to help soak up the hot and sour gravy.

SPICY PORK

1 1/2 pounds boneless center cut pork loin
Mannade
3 1/2 tablespoons soy sauce
2 tablespoons minced fresh ginger
2 tablespoons rice wine or sake
1 1/2 teaspoons sesame oil
1 tablespoon cornstarch

2 tablespoons grated orange zest
2 cups thinly sliced water chestnuts

Sauce:
1/4 cup chicken broth
4 1/2 tablespoons soy sauce
2 1/2 tablespoons rice wine or sake
1 1/2 teaspoons sesame oil
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
2 teaspoons brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper
2 teaspoons cornstarch
6 tablespoons peanut oil
2 tablespoons minced garlic

1 teaspoon crushed red chile pepper or chile pepper flakes

With a sharp cleaver, trim any fat or gristle from pork. Cut against grain into slices and place in a bowl.

Combine soy sauce, ginger, rice wine, sesame oil and cornstarch to make the marinade. Pour over pork slices and allow to marinate at least one hour in the refrigerator.

Heat a small pan of water until boiling and blanch the orange zest. Remove with a fine strainer and squeeze dry in a paper towel.

Reheat the water and blanch the water chestnuts for 30 seconds. Drain.

Make a sauce with the broth, soy sauce, rice wine, sesame oil, Worcestershire sugar, pepper and cornstarch. Mix well.

Heat a wok and add 1/4 cup of peanut oil. Add pork and stir fry over hot heat until the meat is cooked, loses its color and separates. Remove with a strainer and drain in a colander. Clean wok.

Reheat the wok and add remaining 1 1/2 tablespoons of the oil. Add the orange zest, garlic and chile pepper and stir fry over high heat for 10 seconds. Add water chestnuts and stir fry for 30 seconds. Add the sauce mixture and cook, stirring constantly to prevent lumps until thickened. Add the cooked pork,

toss to coat and transfer to a serving platter. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

Chef's suggestion: this can be made with tofu for vegans or chicken/turkey or beef for a change. Serve steamed clams with a side of pasta.

STEAMED CLAMS OR MUSSELS WITH BALSAMIC VINEGAR

2 pounds littleneck clams or mussels
2-3 tablespoons olive oil
3 tablespoons minced onion
1 clove garlic, minced
1 large vine ripened tomato, cored, seeded, chopped

3 tablespoons chopped fresh basil leaves
2 tablespoons Balsamic vinegar

Salt and pepper to taste
Heat the oil in a 5 quart pot over medium heat. Sauté the onions 6-8 minutes or until golden. Stir in the garlic. Add the clams to the pot, cover tightly and allow to steam for 7-8 minutes, shaking the pan frequently to keep from burning.

Add the tomato and basil to the pot and cook for 30 seconds. Remove the sauce from the heat. Add the vinegar to the sauce and sprinkle with black pepper. Shake pot to coat clams or mussels. Serve with extra sauce on the side for dipping.

Keep your chopping board clean

Just which chopping board — wood or plastic should I use? The caller inquired of the Food and Nutrition Hotline.

"This has become a commonly asked question," said Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Food and Nutrition Hotline.

Recent studies are confusing. "The best advice we can give is no matter which board is used, keep it extremely clean and sanitized," said Treitman.

Plastic cutting boards are still easier to clean and sanitize than wood. A plastic or glass board can go into the dishwasher — whereas the wood would warp or disfigure if cleaned in this manner.

Setting aside one cutting board for raw meats and another just for bread and veggies is a good idea. This way the bread or veggies which may not be cooked will not have a chance to pick up bacteria from the meat or poultry.

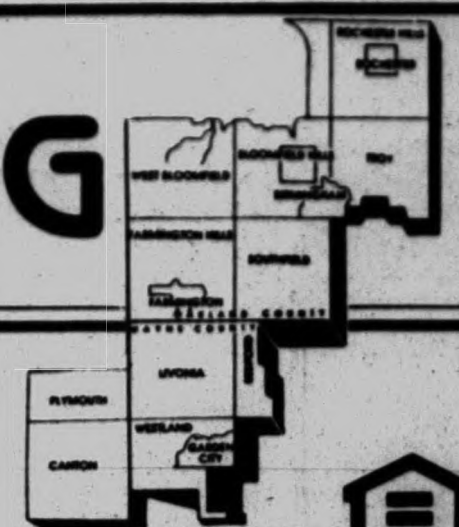

World Cup snobs are much too big for us local folks

It's only five days away. World Cup fever? It feels more like a worldwide virus. It's enough to make you sick. When the world comes to America — excuse me — when Brazil, Romania, Sweden and Switzerland come to the Pontiac Silverdome, it's supposed to captivate all the neophyte soccer fans. They tell us it's going to capture our hearts and our imagination. That's what local soccer ambassador Andy Chapman tells us every week in the Detroit News. Sorry. I won't get near the place. I had my fill when the Brits and the Germans played an exhibition game last summer.

Local coverage, hey?

Being the cheap reporter that I am, and with 17 years experience covering soccer at the grass-roots level — how could you forget those stirring accounts of Wolverine tournaments and Churchill-Stevenson classics? — I wasn't good enough to get a media credential. Not enough room in the press box, said FIFA (or is it FIFI?), the world governing body of soccer. Being the good American reporter that I am, I thought they would allow a guy like me to see world-class soccer, up close and personal. Isn't that what this mega-event is all about, promoting a foreign game in this country? (By the way, it's easier getting a credential for the Michigan-Notre Dame football game.) Although kicked in the shins by FIFA, I was fortunate to get a ticket to that exhibition a year ago through friend Jim Duggan of the Michigan Host Committee, and to attend a reception afterward for the English team at the Main Event.

Real exhibition game

At least I got a taste of it. I saw a few hooligans staggering around draped in Union Jacks. I felt like a real fan, herded, livestock-style, through a huge line into the Silverdome. I also felt very secure. If something bad was going to happen, at least the fans had good backup. On hand was the ATF, FBI, the Michigan State Police SWAT team (with rifles in hand), U.S. Border Patrol, the National Guard, Brinks, Oakland County sheriff's deputies and the Pontiac Police. And don't forget the thousands of volunteer security staff. I understand Dragnet (Jack Webb's crew), the Man From UNCLE, and the A-Team (including Mr. T) will be there for this month's Brazil-Sweden encounter. They say the popularity of soccer in this country hinges upon the performance of Team USA. But who are these guys? Recently, CNN featured a group of young soccer players from Georgia and asked them who was their favorite U.S. player. Each response drew a puzzled and blank look.

What concerned Plymouth Salem coach John Gravlin most going into Saturday's Class A regional semifinal at Brighton turned out to be the one thing he didn't have to worry about. But other phases of the game simply failed the Rocks. The hitting, which Gravlin hoped would come around, did indeed. But Salem's pitching was poor, the defense was worse and the mental mistakes were unforgivable — all of which makes it surprising the Rocks managed to push the game into eight innings before falling to Saline, 8-7.

"We didn't play well enough to win," Gravlin said afterward, noting four errors that accounted for four unearned runs. "We were hitting, the best we've hit all year. We were hitting shots. "But we did not pitch well and we made too many mistakes. There aren't a whole lot of excuses." If this provides any consolation, Salem wasn't the only team to be ambushed by Saline. The Hornets upended Westland John Glenn 8-7 in the final to claim the title — with a 27-10 record, worst of the four teams in the region. The Rocks finish with a 24-9 mark. Salem fought back from 5-1 and

7-5 deficits to tie the game and force extra innings. They trimmed the Hornet lead to 7-6 with a run in the sixth, scored by Sam LaGrow on Kurisu Kazuki's groundout. When Bersuder started to move to third on Knight's throw to first, Salem first baseman Brad Lear fired back to Knight.

The throw was well overthrown. Bersuder trotted home with the eventual game-winning run. Kher took the loss, although he was a Salem bright spot. He gave up just one hit in three innings, walking two and striking out four. The run he allowed was unearned. Mike Marsella, 9-0 going into the game, started for Salem and the Rocks spotted him a 1-0 lead with three first-inning hits. Dave Knight's sacrifice fly scored the run. But the Hornets got to Marsella in the second for five runs on four hits and two walks. Two errors added to Salem's misery. Sullivan returns to network TV for 'After the Headlines'

Kathleen Sullivan is good naturedly aware of the rich irony in her being the host of a where-are-they-now special.

"I know," she says, laughing. "That's what's so great about all this. I think it's very funny."

"After the Headlines," an hour-long special airing Tuesday, June 14, on NBC, marks Sullivan's first network appearance since she lost her job as co-anchor of "CBS Morning News" in 1990. She says it's taken her that long to find a project that appealed to her.

"I saw things differently than a lot of my colleagues did," she explains, recalling her years as a broadcast journalist. "I wanted to do television that spoke to the best interests of people. I believed in quoting people accurately, and I had some real high standards. And I got caught up in those a little bit, and I learned my lessons."

But at the same time, I wanted to do something that just felt really good. And everything that came along was something that I really didn't want anything to do with, she adds, with another chuckle. "This is wonderful. It speaks to the best in us. Not our mistakes. It speaks to our hopes, a little to our fears, but it gives you such a good feeling about who we are, as men and women. I wanted to be associated with a show that brought hope and light. This does that. It's not just about heat. It's about light."

"After the Headlines" takes five major news stories from the past and takes a look at how their major figures were affected by their brush with fame, Sullivan explains.

"I start the show by talking about how Andy Warhol said everyone is going to have 15 minutes (of fame)," she says. "But what happens after the spotlight is gone? What happens after your name is thrown about the world by satellite?"

"We take you to these people's lives, where they are now. It gives us an understanding of what happened 20 years ago, 50 years ago, seven years ago. Because they have now a most interesting perspective, now that they've been out of the limelight. They have a really great understanding. I'm not an interrogator. What's different in this is that we are really listening to people's stories. We don't tell them for them. I'll set it up. I mean, remember, I was a news commentator for a lot of these people. I did these stories. So I say, remember what we saw and what we knew then? And then these people can bring us up to date."

Sullivan talks of the show with the fervor of a tent evangelist, the operative phrase here being "oh, my gosh."

First you look at them and go, "Oh, my gosh, she used to be a blonde and now she's a brunette, oh, my gosh, what HAPPENED to her?" she says. "Then you go into, "Oh, really?" and "Oh, my gosh, what

was that like?" and "Oh, how did you handle that?" You learn life's lessons firsthand in a very clear, loving, kind way. The format, and the way that these pieces are structured, brings out the best in people. You fall in love five times."
