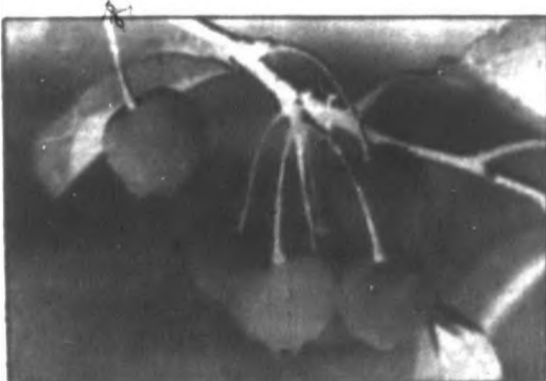

Schools asked to join bus suit



The Milan Area Schools want the Plymouth Canton schools to join them in a class-action law suit aimed at recovering money from firms that sold school buses to both districts.

Attorneys for Milan Area Schools want to know whether Plymouth Canton Community Schools officials are interested in joining a class action suit to recover money from a school bus distributor that pleaded guilty to price fixing.

Hoekstra Truck and Equipment Co. of Grand Rapids, a Plymouth-Canton supplier, and five other Michigan distributors pleaded guilty in federal court last August to bilking school districts in the state by rigging bus bids.

The six companies were ordered to pay a total of \$2.3 million in fines by

U.S. District Court Judge Richard Enslen.

Plymouth attorney and General Motors Corp. retiree Ted Bohlen has taken Plymouth-Canton schools to task for failing to solicit more than one bid for school buses. He asked at last week's school board meeting whether the district will join Milan's suit. Milan schools are suing McFadden Corp., one of the six indicted bus distributors.

Plymouth-Canton school attorney Errol Goldman said, "Milan is looking for other districts to join their

class-action suit. They're not sure whether there is any money to be regained." Goldman said he'd research the issue and report back to the board.

Bohlen also asked that school board President Roland Thomas make known the fact that he (Thomas) apologized to a representative from Tri-County International Trucks of Dearborn, distributor of Genesis buses. Genesis' bid was rejected at the outset by Plymouth.

Students getting a bang out of percussion camp

Ah, summer vacation. Time for sleeping in, relaxing and soaking up the rays. That may be true for some Plymouth-Canton students, but not for musicians attending percussion camp at Centennial Educational Park.

Twenty-four percussionists are getting a head start on the marching band competition, tackling the music program that will entertain Canton and Salem football fans next fall.

Leading the camp is clinician Gregg Rinehart, a Flint native who

Information superhighway comes to Observer

One of the most popular information sources for users of personal computers, the Internet, is now being made available to suburban residents by the Observer Newspapers.

The Internet is an international collection of more than 10,000 data bases with information about thousands of subjects that is available from the home or office to anyone with a computer that has a modem and a hard drive.

The Internet connection offered by the Observer Newspapers is different from any other known service in the nation because it has a low user rate, offers a flat fee without a single add-on charge, provides an ease of operation that does not require

technical computer knowledge, and because it includes a local electronic newspaper available nowhere else.

For more than a year this newspaper has operated the O&E On-Line electronic newspaper, which offers computer access to all 12 Observer & Eccentric newspapers, daily stock prices, daily news summaries from USA Today, local discussion groups, chat, games, electronic magazines, e-mail, a software library, and shopping features. That on-line service, also user-friendly and highly graphical, has been available for \$4.95 a month.

Beginning today, the much-acclaimed Internet is being offered as a supplement to O&E On-Line. The full O&E On-Line service — including Internet access — will cost as little as \$9.95 a month,

compared to normal Internet monthly charges of \$20 to \$35. Users who sign up for a year will be charged \$9.95 monthly, for six months, \$14.95 monthly, or for one month alone, \$19.95.

There are no extra charges for special connections or additional time. Nor are there any other buried costs that accompany many other Internet connections sold by commercial on-line providers.

For \$9.95 a month the user of the O&E's Internet service will receive the full range of features, including: access to thousands of computer data bases from major research universities to law libraries to the Library of Congress; access to thousands of shareware and freeware software pro-

hails from Houston, Texas, and his assistants/former students Brian Rolon, John Best, Andy Salmon, and Jonathan Ovalle. Ovalle will enroll at the University of Michigan on a music scholarship in September, and plans to lend a hand to musicians at Centennial Educational Park once school begins.

Before her seven-hour day began at the high school Thursday, Marcie Livingston described percussion camp. "It's fun, but it's a lot of work," said the Canton senior who plays keyboards and xylophone. "It think it will be time well spent."

In addition to the opening music from "Kiss of the Spider Woman," students are learning new styles and techniques. Rinehart, percussion coordinator for nationally acclaimed bands from Spring Independent School District near Houston, works as a consultant and directs Champions Percussive Concepts. Champions Percussive Concepts offers

summer camps, weekend clinics, school district inservice sessions, and percussion arranging.

Band boosters funded the camp and have paid Rinehart to travel to Michigan several times to assist Plymouth-Canton percussionists.

"We're here creating an 11-minute halftime show, but the goals are to get all percussionists to be well-rounded percussionists," said Rinehart.

Considering a move to Plymouth-Canton if a position with the schools can be worked out, Rinehart oversees a year-round percussion program in Texas that includes jazz, hand drumming, ethnic drumming, melodic percussion and orchestral playing.

"The goal is to develop a program that starts in sixth grade and develops over seven years. We're trying to raise the level of kids' playing abilities," he said.

Rinehart is impressed with parents' support of the Plymouth-Canton program. "The parents' organization here is

very interested in giving kids a higher level of education. They called and asked if I would come up here. I see some real mediocre work, this is one of the better places," he said.

"This whole area here has unlimited potential, because you have five middle schools feeding one high school program, and it should be great," he added.

Rinehart said football fans this September will notice more activity on the sidelines as percussionists spend more time entertaining the crowd on keyboards, marimbas, vibraphones and drums.

There's growing opportunity for percussionists, added Rinehart. "The whole percussion world has grown immensely," he said.

Canton sophomore Karen Frankhart plays electric keyboards, marimbas and xylophone. "This camp is different, but it's good," she said. "It's pretty fun, but a lot of extra work. The practice will probably help us."

The Family Fun Picnic will feature Sunshine the Clown and Friends who will provide games for the kids, including balloon animals. Face-painting also will be available.

Throughout the afternoon, Silver Sounds DJs will provide entertainment for listening and for dancing. Lucille's will provide country-western line dancing demonstrations. "People can dance right along," Hauck said.

Fran Mintz of Jazzercise also will provide a demonstration. And a group of Canton Place residents and staff members will join in Dancers with Jan's School of Dance in Belleville will have a recital of their talents.

Food - hot dogs and Polish sausage provided by Bob Boyer of Boyer's Meat Processing in Can-

Canton because its bus has a front-mounted engine. Hoekstra's Thomas MVP buses, purchased by Plymouth-Canton for \$65,276 each, feature rear-mounted engines.

Thomas, at a February school board meeting, said the Genesis bid, at the very least, was very de-

ceptive and may have been fraudulent. He commended Plymouth-Canton transportation director Dale Goby and his staff for a job "nothing short of outstanding" in procuring buses.

In an April 25 letter to Ed Rose, In County vice president and a Canton resident — Thomas

said, "It is unfortunate that it was implied that fraud and or deception was attributed to your company. At no time was it my intent to discredit your company or your products. I apologize for any misunderstanding and appreciate the opportunity to clarify these concerns."

Cleveland faults McNamara for high staff salaries

Detroit City Councilman Clyde Cleveland, a candidate for Wayne County executive, has charged incumbent Edward McNamara with responsibility for excessive staff salaries, the poor condition of the county youth home, and secrecy surrounding the activities of his office.

Cleveland is McNamara's only challenger for the Democratic nomination. Democratic voters will choose between the two on Aug. 2. The Republican candidates are Helen Gotowka of Dearborn Heights, Lawrence Schweiger of Livonia and Paul McMaster of Redford Township.

Cleveland, 59, has been a member of the Detroit City Council since 1974. In a June interview he checked off a list of items in making a case for himself and against McNamara.

The overcrowded youth home in Detroit, where juvenile offenders are held, is in a disgraceful state of disrepair, Cleveland said. "Children are sleeping on the floor, being sexually and physically abused."

McNamara has too many relatives and elected officials working for him, Cleveland said. "Wayne County is full of cronyism and nepotism," he said. "Why, in the name of God, should the mayor of Lincoln Park (Frank Sall) be

serving the executive of Wayne County?" Sall is McNamara's deputy director of management and budget.

Cleveland also noted that McNamara employees Patricia Kukula, director of the Health Choice program, and Hanson Clark, purchasing director, are running for political office this year. This is an example, he said, of McNamara extending his influence into areas far beyond his realm of responsibility.

McNamara should also be criticized, Cleveland said, for recruiting and running candidates against political enemies. Like in 1990 when McNamara backed then-Westland councilwoman Terri Reighard-Johnson against

County Commissioner Kay Beard. And in 1992 when McNamara backed then-county commissioner Kevin Kelley against R.bert Picano for sheriff.

"As a Wayne County executive, I would not run somebody against Kay Beard," Cleveland said.

His other complaints are: McNamara feuds too often with the County Commission. "You work with people. You don't have to get antagonistic."

McNamara's administration deliberately stalls the work of the county auditor general. In Detroit, Cleveland said, "we don't stonewall the auditors. We cooperate with them."

McNamara isn't accessible

enough to the media. "Reporters can come in and interview me any time they want to."

The salaries of McNamara's staff are too high. Cleveland pledged to cut the salaries of top executives by at least 20 percent.

Cleveland also said he would consider closing Metro Airport from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m., ban the aircraft with the loudest engines, and establish county government offices in the suburbs.

Cleveland challenges McNamara to three debates in Livonia, Detroit and a neutral site. He also vows to reveal his tax returns for the last five years and challenges McNamara to do the same.

The Mask and the Mirror — Loreena McKennitt

Generally regarded and widely hailed as a "folk" singer, I don't know if that's how I would define this wonderful musician and her blend of Celtic, African and Middle Eastern sounds with a voice that brings to mind, variously, Enya, Kate Bush and the Cocteau Twins' Elisabeth Frazier.

Here is a woman who clearly stakes claim to an ethereal category wholly and uniquely her own.

Born and raised in Manitoba (her parents are livestock dealers), she now calls Stratford, Ontario, home, and has contributed music to that city's famed Shakespeare Festival over the years.

In the early 1980s, when her financial situation was vastly different, she and her harp spent many an hour shilling for spare change on the streets of Toronto. In short order, however, she was writing film music and headlining concerts throughout Canada.

In 1985, she cut her first album, for her own company. Two more, enormously successful in the independent music world, followed, and when "The Visit" was released a couple of years ago, it was on the Warner Bros. label. No one, apparently, was prepared for its sales (more than 500,000).

The Celtic themes are still here, as is that angelic, crystalline and other worldly vocal magic that is hers. The scope is, perhaps, broader, but this is not meant as a change in direction, just an expansion of vision.

The song titles tell the story: "The Mystic's Dream," "The Bonny Swans," "The Dark Night of the Soul," "Marrakesh Night Market," "Full Circle," "Santiago" (a song waiting for radio to embrace it, thanks in large part to the violin work of longtime Bruce Cockburn sidkick Hugh Marsh), "Ce He Mise Le Ulaing? The Two Trees" and "Prospero's Speech" (from "The Tempest" of Shakespeare renown).

The titles don't tell of the lushness of her voice and keyboard work, nor of the production and solid manning of the performers.

Perhaps it is folk music. It certainly is music that, above all, moves the soul.

John Gorka is one of the outstanding songwriters of our time; up there with John Hiatt, Elvis Costello and Bruce Springsteen. This

struck me as indisputable fact the first time I heard the above quoted masterpiece from his 1992 High Street collection, "Temporary Road," a song that impressed me enough to lift a line for my wedding vows last year.

With the release of this year's equally brilliant "Out of the Valley," his fourth for Windham Hill's High Street imprint, the man that Rolling Stone dubbed "the pre-eminent male singer/songwriter of the New Folk movement," is certain to see his fan base grow stronger.

Speaking by phone from his New Bethlehem, Pa., home last week, Gorka allowed that "I don't run from that word" when I asked how it struck him to be lumped in with the broad-based "folk" category.

"I don't know what I am," he said. "I guess I'm a singer/songwriter from the folk world."

When asked to name names and cite influences, he hedged.

"That's a hard one. I've listened



to so many people. The first kind of music I really listened to was bluegrass, so Flatt & Scruggs and the Earl Scruggs Revue, some Bill Monroe; stuff like that. Later on, when I started listening to the singer/songwriters, it was Joni Mitchell, Jackson Browne, John Prine, Eric Andersen. Then, when I started playing live, people like Stan Rogers and Claudia Schmidt."

On the new album, which finds Leo Kottke, Mary Chapin Carpenter and Kathy Mattea leading an all-star cast, he pays homage to a most-unlikely patron.

"That's Why," his attempt to de-

mythify the Presley myth ("He's left this life, he's left this stage/He's left the building but not the age"), is at once irreverent and touching. It also might have had a tangible presence overlooking its creation.

"It was a new studio," Gorka said of the place where "Out of the Valley" was recorded, "with vintage stuff. The console was from RCA Studio B, where Elvis recorded, and Roy Orbison. The piano is the one that Carole King used to record 'Tapestry.'"

He might have also mentioned that the guitar he used on the recording of "Mystery To Me" was

loaned by Scotty Turner, who used it to help Buddy Holly write songs.

Studio nostalgia and hot shot backing aside, John Gorka stands on his own. Expect him to stand tall as he takes the stage solo Tuesday night at the Power Center in Ann Arbor.

Goldentones hope for hometown recognition

Instrumental surf rockers, The

Goldentones have opened for the likes of Shadowy Men on a Shadowy Planet, The Stray Cats, Dick Dale

and the Breeders. But here at home, the Detroit-based band is having a hard time getting attention.

"I don't want to slam our own city, but I wish that people were a little more appreciative. . . . People just have never gotten behind the local music scene here," drummer Chad Lewis said.

All The Goldentones' Detroit-area shows haven't been disappointments to them. Their yearly "Beach Rave" on Memorial Day weekend at Industry in Pontiac attracts an average of 1,800 people each time. But outside of Michigan and abroad, The Goldentones are getting rave reviews. Industry insiders have also noticed the band. This fall, The Goldentones' song "Outbound" from their latest release, "Atlantis," is scheduled to be included on an instrumental band compilation released by Rounder Records. They will also be listed in an encyclopedia of instrumental music.

For the most part, just like Matt Dillon's band in the film "Singles," The Goldentones' biggest fan base is outside the country.

"I think it's the type of music that we do. Instrumental music has always been popular internationally. For one, it's not American lyrics so anybody can understand it," Lewis said.

On Tuesday, July 5, however, the band hopes to get more recognition

locally by opening for the B-52's at Pine Knob Music Theatre in Independence Township. Fred Schneider of the B-52's asked The Goldentones to warm up the audience for him after hearing "Atlantis," which is distributed by Caroline, Cargo and Dutch East India records. (Schneider was unavailable for interviews.)

"I think it'll get us a little bit of respect locally. It should. We've gotta be doin' somethin' right to be playing with the B-52's at Pine Knob," Lewis said.

The set will mostly consist of songs off of "Atlantis," and a surprise tune, according to bassist Joseph Zito. "Atlantis," written primarily by guitarist Dominic Zito, has more of a cohesive sound to it, the band said.

"We wrote the whole album at one time. 'Atmosphere' was a compilation of about two years of writing. It was all written for one purpose, one album. . . . The last one was recorded at all different dates at three different record studios. It's a lot better product than the last one. It's a lot tastier as far as listening," Lewis said.

The Goldentones open for the B-52's at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 5, at Pine Knob Music Theatre, 1-75 and Sashabaw Road, Independence Township. Tickets are \$12.50 for pavilion, and \$7.50 for lawn. For more information, call (810) 377-0100.

'Go Fish' breaks ground at the Main

Max, a hip "twentysomething" with oversized jeans and a baseball hat perpetually worn backward, wants a girlfriend. When she first meets Ely, a shy and gawky older woman, she's not interested, but soon discovers they may be compatible after all.

The hilariously agonizing chain of events that leads to their relationship comprises "Go Fish," a wise and wonderful new comedy at the Main Theater in Royal Oak. Filmed in black and white on a shoestring budget, it may do for gay films what Spike Lee's "She's Gotta Have It" did for black-made movies a decade ago.

What we're talking about is attracting a mainstream audience to a film told completely from the lesbian point of view. "Longtime Companion" did it to an extent for gay men. The well-intentioned "Philadelphia" felt it had to water its message down to play the multiplexes.

"Go Fish" works primarily because of attitude, which is at all times uncompromising and honest. Director Rose Troche originally wanted an all-woman cast and crew for her Chicago-based short film project.

"Looking back, we were striving for a kind of lesbian purity, an 'all for one, all-inclusive lesbian sis-

and crew received a salary. Although amateurish at times, the women who occupy "Go Fish" are very honest and real, the kind of people you might pass on Chicago's north side. Maybe you have.

Because the movie is in black and white, director Troche gets carried away with arty compositions that have little (if anything) to do with what's happening in the story. I can understand the image of hands coupling, parting, and then coupling again. So how about that little African American boy playing on the grass?

One especially quirky idea really does work. At several points in the film, four women literally put their heads together and discuss the latest developments in the Ely-Max saga. Their modified Greek chorus serves as an able support group that gets the lovers together.

While keeping a light, free-wheeling mood, the movie does touch on some serious issues. When it's discovered that Daria, who has slept with just about everyone in the film, has had sex with a man, women gang up on her and question whether or not she's truly lesbian.

Perhaps the single best scene in "Go Fish" is its engaging twist on the first date, an event not limited to sexual orientation. The phone rings as Max and Ely, after awkward conversation, finally start to neck on the couch. It's Ely's girlfriend from Seattle and for yet another moment, the relationship is thwarted.

Foreign language study essential for students

Question: My daughter is entering high school next year, and we believe she should take a foreign language. She is not sure which language to take. It is difficult to work it into her schedule with all the other requirements. How many years do you think she should take, one or two years?

AnsWER: Your daughter should take four years of a foreign language, if available . . . and if she goes on to college, as you indicated, tell her to continue mastering the foreign language of her choice.

Foreign language has struggled for its legitimate role in the school curriculum for as long as I can remember. Indeed, the legitimate role of foreign language in the curriculum in this country is pitiful if you wish to compare us with other emerging nations.

English classes start at the early elementary level in most nations including China and Japan and, I believe, also in Russia and Germany.

English is required at the secondary level (7-12) for all students in many countries. Indeed, in many countries, students speak the language (English) from the time they walk into the classroom until the class is over. Sort of

like, you just entered the United States when you walk into this room . . . so speak English. Many of our quality foreign language teachers in this country use this concept.

Historically, foreign language teaching in this country got off to a poor start. Foreign language was originally taught, back in my school days, as a mental discipline. The concept was to have a better grasp of grammar through Latin and Greek and in the process gain a bit of the history and glory of Greece and Rome.

When we entered World War II and the GIs went overseas, it was soon discovered that even two years of French, German or Spanish did little or nothing for fluency in the language.

The U.S. Armed Forces did a study and determined that at least 840 hours of foreign language training is minimum for any proficiency.

That translates into about five years of foreign language for our students, or foreign language being a required subject from eighth grade through their senior year.

Two years of a foreign language is not sufficient, according to the American Council of Teachers of Foreign Language. The council believes, rightly

so, that students should not only be proficient in the language, but culturally competent. That means not just parroting back a language in class but

having an understanding of the culture in context with the language spoken.

The United States has an elitist attitude when it comes to foreign language. Our national egotistical attitude is . . . let them learn English if they want to talk to us.

U.S. Sen. Paul Simon, D-Illinois, in his book, "The Tongue Tied American" said, "It is not uncommon that when our nation must formally or informally engage in dialogue with the Chinese or Soviets and other countries, we are dependent on interpreters provided by the other side . . . lacking language skills, we lose this advantage in tough bargaining."

Your daughter's fluency in a foreign language is not a suggestion by me, it is essential for her in this shrinking world. A world in which English, by the late 21st century, could become the second language.

Just how tragic is the archaic thinking in Michigan? The Michigan Department of Education, in its infinite wisdom, dropped foreign language from its core curriculum — essentially saying foreign language is not of value. That is prehistoric thinking.

I know the problem. Too many core

subject requirements and not enough room in the schedule . . . not a requirement for graduation.

It may never become a requirement for graduation, but it will be a requirement for those students who want an edge on those who graduate without foreign language as a part of their resume and portfolio.

This is the same advice I gave my daughter, who took Spanish in high school and college . . . many years ago. My daughter ended up in Arizona and interviewed for the teaching job she wanted. The school district served many Hispanic children and families.

Anne had good credentials. She walked into the office, looked at the interviewer (he was Hispanic) and said, "Como esta usted? Me llamo Anne Doyle." She was hired before she walked out of the office.

Hoben's retirement is a loss for schoolchildren

The old order passeth. Plymouth/Canton Schools Superintendent John Michael Hoben is finally abdicating his throne. So, coincidentally, are the great Bill Keane of Oakland County Schools and Bob Docking of Bloomfield Hills.

I have worked for some of the best superintendents ever to grace a board room — men like Keane, George Garver of Walled Lake and Livonia, Norman Drachler of Detroit and John Schultz of Rochester. I've interacted professionally with other top school chieftains such as Docking, Mike Flanagan of Farmington and Wayne County, George DePillo of Warren Consolidated, and Marian Ginopolis of Oxford. I worked with Center Line's, Terry Follbaum, Berkley's Sam Flam, Farmington's Bob Maxfield, and Bloomfield Hills' new appointee Gary Doyle before they became superintendents.

None of them ever held or will hold more absolute sway in a school district

or a board room than did Dr. Mike Hoben. To begin with the man stands 6-feet, 5-inches and weighs 240 pounds. He turns heads by merely walking into a room. If that weren't enough, he also coached champion football teams in Plymouth when the district had only one high school rising to become superintendent.

His resume reads like an adventure novel. Wounded and combat-decorated as a Marine captain in Korea, he played basketball for the Boston Celtics and was inducted into Adrian college's Athletic Hall of Fame.

My favorite Hoben story occurred when he was called to the home of one of his former football players who — upset over a personal problem — had demolished most of his parents' basement with a pool cue and was up there brandishing it against anyone who might venture down.

Summoned by the athlete's father, the old coach promptly came over and

went downstairs. Seeing the distraught young man clutching the cue, Hoben picked up one himself and said, "You set 'em up and I'll break." The tensions thus eased, he was able to get his former player to drop the stick and talk.

God knows I fought many battles with big Mike over funding for curricula or the handling of some other issue. Once I stalked into his office with a problem and found him listening to one of Tiger outfielder Alan Trammell's motivational tapes. When he didn't look up in about 20 seconds, I hollered, "Dammit, Mike, turn off that tape and listen to me!" Mike had a deep fascination with gadgetry, but he did turn off the tape and listen. Actually, he listened a lot more than I probably deserved, because I never made his life easy.

Not only would Mike Hoben listen — he would offer advice. If I didn't accept it, he usually made me follow it

anyway. Usually, but not always — and that was the key to his character. He gave innovators just enough leeway to excel without dipping too radically into the district's coffers. In fact, a favorite Hoben rebuff was, "The board won't buy it." Actually, so absolute was their respect for his leadership and his national reputation as an outcomes-based educator, they would have bought practically anything he asked for. This was one reason he had to be so careful.

The old order passeth. And superintendent John Michael Hoben's retirement after nearly a quarter of a century on the throne is an irreplaceable loss for Plymouth/Canton's schoolchildren.

"Wow! What an honor to be singled out like this," Cariera said. "But, as I always say, 'They're not just customers, they're my friends.'"

Cariera, of Sterling Heights, counts about 500 customers as friends, filing their names and vital statistics away for reference

she calls "helping out."

"I note their favorite colors, the best silhouettes for their figure type and special dates in their life. Then I call them," she said, "I let them know when I have a blouse that goes with a suit they bought. When a suit they admired goes on sale. When a new collec-

tion of dresses come in. These are all very busy, busy people and they appreciate my interest. They don't have time to shop. Yet they need to look good."

Cariera said it's not unusual for a customer to tell her about the job they're buying an interview suit for, or the career they hope a certain suit will help them launch.

"I always listen to my customer

and then pull merchandise and accessories that they will need," she said. "I've had customers call me after a job interview and say, 'Wow, Joyce! That suit did it!' I care. I really do. If they're interviewing with a law firm I don't bring out coral suits."

Cariera said she guards each customer's privacy and gives her all when selecting and sizing

clothes for elderly customers and shoppers who have had recent surgeries.

"I send cards. I call and chat if they haven't been into the store in a while. You see, they really are more than customers — they're friends," she repeated.

Cariera said her sales expertise is self-taught, following a divorce that brought her into the business world seven years ago. She raised

two children and is now a grandmother of two.

"Another tip I would offer is for salespeople to remember that saving a dollar means so much to everyone today," she said. "Look out for your customers. Let them know when sales and good buys are available. Seventy percent of my sales come from regular customers."

Shower pasta with fresh herbs, veggies

If pasta isn't "fattening," why does it have the reputation for being so? It's not the pasta itself that's high in calories, quite the contrary. Commercial boxed spaghetti contains only 200 calories per two ounce (dry) serving with just one gram of fat. In most cases, the calorie culprit is the sauce we shower our pasta with.

Most restaurants and home cooks start a sauce with several tablespoons of olive oil or other fat to brown garlic, onions and other vegetables that go into the sauce. If ground beef is added to the sauce for flavor and texture, hundreds of calories quickly accumulate just in the sauce.

On top of all these calories, grated cheese, and even more olive oil is customarily sprinkled liberally over each serving. A small plate of pasta, with all the accoutrements, can weigh in at a hefty 750 calories per serving.

Some chefs create pasta sauces with loads of butter, heavy cream and grated cheese. Fettucini Alfredo is an example.

A five ounce cooked portion of plain pasta equals 200 calories. It swells to over 1,000 calories when you add the cream sauce.

But you don't have to go through life pretending to like plain pasta. What adds calories to otherwise healthy pasta is fat.

It tastes so good because it has twice the calories of proteins and carbohydrates. Drenching pasta in fat, no matter if it's healthy canola oil or a grassy scented imported olive oil, is not necessary.

Cut fat

Fat can be easily omitted and when used, should be measured by the teaspoonful. If you must cook with ground meat, cook it, and drain it well in a colander.

Look for low-fat cheeses in the dairy case at your favorite grocery store. Parmesan cheese isn't the healthiest choice. Buy a high quality, imported Parmesan cheese. It has more flavor than the stuff that comes with a shaker top in a can. You'll use less, reducing the amount of calories in your pasta dishes without sacrificing taste.

Flavor enhancers

Enhance the flavor of your pasta sauces with herbs. Fresh herbs and spices can boost the flavor and aroma of an otherwise plain dish.

Splurge and purchase fresh herbs whenever possible. Fresh basil, a hint of oregano and a tablespoon of minced garlic can do more for a plate of plain pasta than any clam or tomato ever could.

This is the season for fresh vegetables. Chopped parsley and freshly ground pepper will heighten the taste and aroma of a cup of freshly chopped garden tomatoes beyond belief. Saute an onion until golden brown and allow a fresh chopped green, red or yellow pepper to "sweat" over the onion and toss in some pasta for a delectable light summer dish.

Another tasty dish is fresh steamed Swiss chard tossed with some pasta, chopped tomatoes and a smattering of fresh ground pepper.

Use ground turkey instead of hamburger to cut the fat in hearty meat sauces. Try tofu (soybean curd) in rich, tomato-based pasta sauces flavored with fresh herbs. Finely crumbled tofu has the texture of ground beef and will absorb the garden-fresh flavor of the tomato sauce.

Leftover cooked pasta can be reused in cold salads. Reheat the pasta by blanching it for 30 seconds in boiling water.

At our house, we use leftover pasta to make crusts for savory spaghetti pies and in lasagna.

If you'd rather leave the cooking to someone else, when you go to a restaurant, ask to have your pasta dish prepared with less oil.

I recently ordered a dish that I thought would be low in fat - linguini tossed with a sauce made of mussels, chunks of shrimp, scallops, salmon, fresh basil and olive oil.

The dish would have been outstanding had it been highlighted with only a splash of olive oil. There was easily four to five tablespoons of oil covering the bottom of my dinner plate.

If you crave cream sauces, there are ways to cut the fat. I picked up a copy of "The Pasta Lover's Diet Book," by June Roth (Bobbs-Merrill Publishers, 1984) at a garage sale. The book is now out-of-print, but you'll find recipes inside.

"Can she bake a cherry pie, Billy Boy, Billy Boy? Can she bake a cherry pie, charming Billy?"

An old-fashioned question, but there are still a considerable number of people who can not only bake a cherry pie, but pick their own pie cherries off the tree as well.

"In a normal year, we'll sell out of cherries in a couple of days," said Bob Long, the fifth generation owner of the Long Family Orchard and Farm in Commerce Township. The farm has an acre of tart cherries, all of which are sold on a you-pick basis.

"People come from all over to pick cherries. They freeze or can them and make cherry pies all year. A lot of people are buying dehydrators and drying cherries. And, of course, some people make jam or cherry cordial," said Long.

At the farm, Long doesn't allow cherry pickers to use ladders. When he sees broken branches at the six-foot level, he stops selling. The cherries at the top of the trees go to the birds. Long said he doesn't grow sweet cherries because the birds would get most of them.

In Traverse City there are so many sweet cherry trees that the loss from birds is evened out.



Due to the cool spring weather this year, cherries should be ripe by the second week in July, a little later than usual.

"With only an acre of cherry trees, we don't have to spread

the season out, so our cherries are big and juicy and ripe when we start picking. You can't beat the flavor of tree-ripened fruit," Long said.

Start a wine cellar without going broke

many years, and Strong suggests it is the same with wine. In 1961, when Strong moved to California's Sonoma County, there were 12 wineries. Today, there are over 150. Strong is considered a pioneer in the California wine industry and his expertise is recognized and respected.

During a recent meeting, Strong shared his suggestions for one of life's most enjoyable undertakings - starting a personal wine cellar. A visit to any one of the metropolitan area's larger wine shops makes one conscious of the sheer breadth of choices. It makes the task of beginning a wine cellar seem intimidating.

"A basic wine cellar should contain representation from a variety of wine types," Strong said. "Once a person knows his or her personal wine preferences, both practical and affordable choices for cellar wines should be made. Start with a classical foundation that allows building a comfortable base from which

to make further additions to the collection."

Strong's starter suggestions include 18 wines that are good values and offer unusual quality for the price. "I have personally tasted each of these wines and found them to be honorable examples of winemaking," Strong said. As any good marketer would, Strong includes suggestions from his winery, but he has chosen others with vision and scope.

When we first reviewed Strong's wine cellar recommendations, we echoed his sentiments and agreed to meet with him for further amplification of his ideas.

We, too, have tasted all 18 wines and fully agree - a good start on a sound collection without the need to secure a bank loan!

"In selecting the wines, I took an eclectic approach," Strong said. "I consider the wines good values and a catalyst for questioning a retailer about additions to a personal cellar."

Before purchasing in quantity, Strong suggests buying and tasting one bottle. Then, according to your means, purchase more. Our personal preference is the purchase of four and no more than six bottles for our cellar.

There are many good wines and purchasing cases soon takes its toll in space and money. And what if the particular recommended vintages are not available? "In selecting the wines, I chose

According to figures supplied by the Cherry Marketing Institute in Okemos, Michigan produces 70 to 75 percent of the tart cherries grown in the United States. The 3.5 million tart cherry trees in our state harvested 270 million pounds of fruit in 1993.

"A cherry tree can grow anywhere, but the success of a cherry orchard depends on specific climatic conditions," said Jane Baker, director of domestic marketing for the Institute. "That's why most of Michigan's major tart cherry orchards are concentrated along Lake Michigan, where the weather is tempered by the lake."

The cherries are grown successfully within 15 miles of the lake, where good air drainage, relatively high elevations and a medium sandy soil are present.

Michigan is also one of the nation's top producers of sweet cherries, harvesting about 20 percent of the annual crop. Michigan's

sweet cherry production is concentrated in the Grand Traverse region.

Joan Fajak never made a cherry pie in her life until her daughter married a farmer named Bob Long, who just happens to have a cherry orchard.

"After Chris and Bob got married three years ago, I thought that as a good mother-in-law it was my duty to get into the spirit of the thing, so I got Bob's recipe for cherry pie," Fajak, a Livonia resident, said. "My husband and the daughter I have left at home love the homemade pie, and I have to say it is really wonderful.

There's nothing like a homemade cherry pie."

Fajak admits she takes the easy way out when it comes to pie crust though. She uses Pillsbury's frozen product. "It's just as good as mine, and a lot easier," Fajak said.

An enthusiastic convert, Fajak even pits the cherries as directed by Long, who claims that store-bought pitters are cumbersome and slow.

"Just grasp the sides of the cherry with your thumb and forefinger," Long directs. "And, with your other thumb and forefinger gently squeeze the cherry, forcing

the pit to pop out the stem end. There's nothing to it. Just be sure to pit over a bowl to retain the juice lost in the pitting process. A lot of cherry recipes call for the juice."

Long also offers tips on preserving the freshness of tart cherries. He suggests drenching newly bought cherries in cold water to remove "field heat" from fresh-picked produce. Cooling will help prevent deterioration in the area where the cherry was pulled off its stem.

It's best to process your cherries right away, to capture the full flavor, freshness and deep red color of the tree-ripened fruit. If this is not possible, store cherries in cold water, in the refrigerator until you're ready to use them.

These care tips apply to cooking (tart) cherries only. Sweet cherries should have the stems attached to prevent decaying. Do not immerse sweet cherries in cold water.

To freeze cherries, Bob Long recommends using ¼ cup sugar to 1 quart of whole, pitted cherries. Mix with juice retained from pitting process until sugar is dissolved. Be gentle when stirring. Pack into containers, leaving adequate head space for expansion when freezing.

To use frozen cherries in pies or other cooked products, thaw until cherries can be loosened. Then cook as you would fresh fruit. If your recipe calls for sugar, allow for sugar that was added before freezing. Frozen cherries will often have more juice than is called for in a recipe. If that is the case, use only the part of the juice, or add thickening to compensate for the extra juice.

In medium bowl, combine cherries, granulated sugar, tapioca and almond extract; mix well. (It is not necessary to thaw cherries before using). Let cherry mixture stand 15 minutes.

Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry; fill with cherry mixture. Dot with butter. Adjust top crust, cutting slits for steam to escape. Bake in preheated 400 degree oven 50 to 55 minutes, or until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly. Makes 8 servings.

To make a sugarless cherry pie, replace 1 cup granulated sugar with an equivalent amount of dry sugar substitute. Prepare pie as directed. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven 50 to 55 minutes, or until juice begins to bubble through slits in crust. Makes 8 servings.

FRESH CHERRY PIE

- 3 cups pitted tart cherries
- ¼ cup cherry juice
- ½ cup honey, or 1 cup sugar and ¼ cup more juice
- 2½ tablespoons tapioca
- ¼ teaspoon almond extract
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 9-inch pastry shell for 2-crust pie

Mix cherries, juice, tapioca, salt, almond extract and honey together and let stand for 15 minutes. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Dot with butter. Add full top crust, with slits to allow steam to escape, or make a lattice-top crust. Bake at 425 degrees for 50 minutes.

STAR SPANGLED CHERRY PIE

- 4 cups frozen unsweetened tart cherries (or 2 cans 16-ounces each, unsweetened tart cherries, well drained)
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- ½ teaspoon almond extract
- Pastry for 2-crust, 9-inch pie
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

CHERRY OATS SNACK CAKE

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1½ cups old-fashioned or quick-cooking rolled oats, uncooked
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup dried cherries
- 1 12-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate morsels

In a large mixing bowl, combine butter and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Add oats and flour, mix well. Stir in vanilla, cherries and 1 cup chocolate morsels. Spread batter evenly into an ungreased 8-by-8-by-2-inch microwave-safe dish. Cover dish with waxed paper. Microwave on high 4 minutes. Rotate dish a quarter turn; microwave 4 to 5 minutes longer or until top of cake appears dry.

Sprinkle remaining cup chocolate morsels over top of warm cake. Let stand 10 minutes, then spread chocolate evenly over cake. If desired sprinkle with additional dried cherries. Let cake cool completely before cutting.

(Wise Road) make a left, go three miles.

Washtenaw County
Wasem Fruit Farm (u-pick tart cherries, black and red currants) — (313) 482-2342. Located at 6580 Judd Road, Milan. Exit US-23 at exit 31 (Willis Road), east three miles to Pitman Road, south 1 mile to Judd Road. Or exit I-94 at exit 187 (Rawsonville Road), south 4½ miles to Willis Road, west 4½ miles to Pitman Road, then south 1 mile to Judd Road.

Ward's Orchards, Inc. (u-pick tart cherries) — (313) 482-7744. Take I-94 to Huron St. (exit 183) at Ypsilanti, then south 4 miles. Follow the signs.

Macomb County

Coon Creek Orchard and Cider Mill (u-pick sweet and tart cherries) — (313) 784-5062. Located at 78777 Coon Creek Road, 4 miles north west of Armada.

Westview Orchards (u-pick tart and sweet cherries) — (313) 752-3123. Van Dyke (M-53) at 30 Mile Road, two miles south of the Village of Romeo.

Healthy sauces make for healthy pasta dishes

FAT FREE WHITE SAUCE MIX
2 cups non-fat dry milk powder
¼ cup cornstarch
¼ cup chicken bouillon powder
4 teaspoons onion powder
1 teaspoon dried thyme
1 teaspoon dried basil
½ teaspoon fresh ground white pepper

Combine all ingredients in a medium sized bowl. Store at room temperature in a tightly closed container.

To reconstitute this mix, use ¼ cup of mix to one cup of liquid (such as skim milk or water). Makes 3 cups dry mix. Each ¼ cup of mix makes enough for 2 servings. Each serving has 90 calories.
For those not counting calories, stir 1 tablespoon butter or margarine into the reconstituted sauce, and heat until thickened.
If you like cheese sauce, try this version that incorporates the white sauce mix:

CHEESE SAUCE

¼ cup fat free white sauce dry mix

1 cup water
¼ teaspoon dry mustard
¼ teaspoon paprika
2 ounces (about ¼ cup) sharp cheddar or fresh Parmesan cheese, grated

Place the white sauce mix and water in a saucepan. Stir in the mustard, paprika and cheddar cheese. Cook and stir over low heat until the cheese has melted. Makes enough for 2 servings. Each serving has 155 calories.

HEALTHY BOLOGNESE SAUCE

1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced

1 onion, finely diced
1 large clove garlic, minced
8 ounces tomato sauce
¼ teaspoon honey
½ teaspoon dried basil or 1 teaspoon fresh chopped basil
Dash fresh ground pepper or to taste

Saute mushrooms, onion and garlic in a non-stick fry pan adding just a drop of water to make stirring easier. Let the water evaporate as the vegetables become limp. Stir in the tomato sauce, honey, basil and pepper and cook for 5 minutes.

Serve over hot, drained pasta. Makes 2 servings. Each serving has only 58 calories (sauce only).

LITE MEAT SAUCE

½ pound lean ground beef or turkey
1 onion, finely diced
1 large clove garlic, finely minced
1 green pepper, finely diced
1 large can Italian tomatoes, with juice (about 35 ounces)
6 ounces tomato paste
2 tablespoons fresh chopped

basil or 1 tablespoon, dried Salt and fresh ground pepper to taste

Crumble the ground beef or turkey in a large non-stick frying pan. Stir and break meat apart as it cooks. Drain well. Add the onion, garlic and green pepper.

Cook and stir until vegetables are limp, about 4-5 minutes. Add the tomatoes, tomato paste and basil. Cover and cook 20 minutes over medium low heat. Mash sauce lightly and correct the seasonings. Makes 6 cups of sauce. Each cup contains about 125 calories.

Most food poisonings can be avoided

Headache, nausea, vomiting, fever, abdominal pain, visual impairments, chills or various other ailments are symptoms of food poisoning. Could food poisoning be what's wrong with you?
It is estimated that 97 percent of food poisoning can be prevented by proper cooking, better storage and appropriate hygiene practices.
The immune system plays a critical role in decreasing the occurrence of foodborne illness. Symptoms of foodborne illness will vary depending on the age and health of the victim. At risk are people over the age of 55, children that are one year old or younger, pregnant women and the chronically ill. These include those with liver disease, kidney disease, diabetes, chemotherapy and AIDS.

of an E. coli attack are usually mild with diarrhea and gas pains that can begin six to 24 hours after eating and will last about 24 hours. The E. Coli bacteria can come from raw or undercooked ground beef, unpasteurized milk and unpasteurized apple cider.
Cook ground beef and its products to 155 degrees F. or hotter. Don't drink unpasteurized products, and prevent any cross contamination between cooked and raw foods to control E. Coli.
Salmonella bacteria is the most commonly reported cause of foodborne illness. The onset of symptoms are six to 48 hours and lasts about two days. The symptoms are nausea, abdominal cramps, diarrhea, fever, and headache. These bacteria are found in raw or undercooked foods such as poultry, eggs, unpasteurized milk or other dairy products and meats.
To control this bacteria, be careful of cross contamination such as using serving tongs, for putting raw meat on the grill and

and the juice runs clear. Use a meat thermometer if you are unable to judge when it's cooked completely. Avoid very low oven temperatures (below 300 degrees F.) as this may encourage bacterial growth.
Do not leave any food sitting at room temperature for longer than two hours. Always thaw meats in the refrigerator, never on the kitchen counter.
Keep cold foods at 40 degrees F. or below and hot foods above 140 degrees F. Reheat leftovers to 165 degrees F.
Cool large quantities of foods quickly by putting them in smaller, shallow pans and refrigerate or freeze immediately.
It is your responsibility at home to take safety precautions to minimize the risk of foodborne illness.

meat is cooked without washing them.
Campylobacter jejuni (Campylobacteriosis) is not a household word but has been recently recognized as the leading cause of diarrhea. These cases have been from undercooked fish, poultry and meats, raw (unpasteurized) milk and untreated water. Symptoms include muscle pain, headache, fever followed by diarrhea, abdominal pains and nausea. Cook meats thoroughly before eating.
Keep everything that touches food clean. Utensils, bowls, countertops and your hands clean when around food. Always use warm, soapy water on your hands prior to touching the food cooked or raw. Something so simple as washing your hands will eliminate a lot of food problems, and washing hands after using the bathroom is an absolute must!
Cook foods thoroughly. Do not eat raw meat or eggs. Cook meat until the center is no longer pink

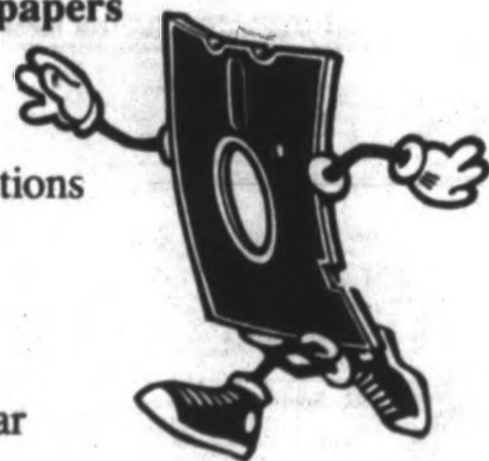
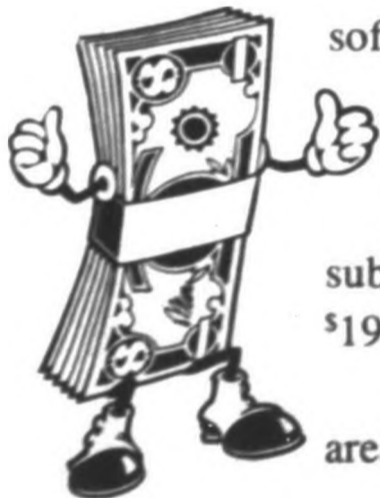

Redford Catholic Central High baseball coach John Salter is no stranger to success on the diamond.

He has recorded 14 straight 20-win seasons to go along with nine district, two regional, and three Catholic League titles, not to mention a state Class A crown in 1987.

His career winning percentage is .727 (280-106).

Despite a team batting average of only .255 this season, the Shamrocks finished 25-9 and won a district in what might have been Salter's finest coaching job since he began running the CC varsity in 1981.

For his efforts, Salter was named by the sports staff as Observerland Coach of the Year.

"We really didn't hit the way I thought, but we played pretty good defense and got outstanding pitching from Dave Susalls and Andy Kummer," Salter said.

The CC coach was also forced to juggle his lineup after Mike Brusseau, the team's top returning infielder, missed most of the cam-

paign with an injury.

Westland John Glenn, the area's No. 1-ranked team, leads the way with three All-Area selections. The Rockets, who finished 27-4 overall, also placed two on the second team.

Dave Susalla, pitcher, Redford CC: The senior left-hander, who recently signed with the University of Detroit-Mercy, enjoyed a banner season with an 11-1 record. In 83 innings, Susalla struck out 120 and walked 34. He posted an ERA of 1.86.

When he wasn't pitching, Susalla played the outfield (hitting .247 with 22 hits).

"He was our workhorse," CC coach John Gravin said of his three-year starter. "He won all the big games for us this season."

"His sophomore and junior years he had a sore arm, but this spring he worked on strengthening and conditioning, and it helped. He didn't miss any (of his 14) starts. "Dave often pitched on two days' rest. He was dominant at times, and I think he'll be better in college. He doesn't have the blazing speed, but he's tricky with a good breaking ball. Just a great kid to coach because he listens."

Susalla is also attentive in the classroom. He finished with a 4.2 GPA.

Brian Berryman, pitcher, Redford Union: The only junior to make the squad, the right-hander shows enormous potential as a pitcher.

He finished with an 11-1 record and two saves. In 69 innings, Berryman struck out 110 and walked just 22. His earned-run average was 1.81.

"Brian was dedicated to throw well every time out . . . and he did," said Rick Berryman, Brian's father and RU's varsity coach. "He had better command of his pitching and he worked hard to improve. He's been very dedicated in off-season conditioning. You don't just go home after the game; it's the things you do in the off-season to continue to throw hard."

When he wasn't on the mound, Berry played outfield and batted .315 with four homers and 30 RBI (both second on the team).

He played in every inning of every game.

Mike Marsella, pitcher, Ply. Salem: The numbers for the senior right-hander speak for themselves — 9-0 won-loss record; 2.18 ERA; 60 strikeouts in 60 innings; only eight walks.

Marsella, Salem's co-MVP, also pitched in the Coaches Association All-Star Game on June 23 at Tiger Stadium.

"Mike showed flashes of brilliance in his junior year (7-4 record) when he shut down Royal Oak Kimball in his first game and had a no-hitter against Livonia Franklin in the district final," Salem coach John Gravin said. "He's a guy who matured the most of anyone I've coached."

Marsella is undecided about his college choice, but may be leaning toward Henry Ford CC, according to Gravin.

Andy Kummer, pitcher, Redford CC: The Shamrocks' No. 2 man, a right-hander, finished with a 9-3 record and a 2.71 earned-run average.

In 72 innings, Kummer fanned 83 and allowed 35 walks.

"He came in here this year as a question mark at number two, but he came through and became a solid number-two guy," Salter said. "He also played basketball, but he's someone who worked hard and got serious about baseball the last 1½ years."

"His curve ball was his best pitch, but he also had a good split-finger and fastball. He was not overpowering, but a smart pitcher. Just another great kid to coach."

Kummer, also an excellent student with a 4.2-plus GPA, is undecided about his college choice.

Ocelots attract big numbers for rebuilding job

It was a great season, 1993. With the emphasis on *was*.

Schoolcraft College men's soccer coach Van Dimitriou knows duplicating a season in which his team won 19 of 21 matches will be next to impossible. Making the task increasingly difficult is the loss of 10 — perhaps 11 — of the 16 players used most often in '93.

Two-year standouts Bill Lanspeary, Billy Joker, Matt Stabile, Andy Cosenza, Adam Carriere and Matt Lividini are gone. Stabile and Joker are headed for Northeastern Illinois University in Chicago.

Others won't be returning. Matt Lee suffered a compound fracture in his leg playing summer soccer for the Wolves and will be lost for the season; others Dimitriou was hoping to have back, notably Vince Troiani and Joe Perron, are possible academic casualties.

That leaves just five experienced players returning for certain: forward Fadi Bazzi, midfielders Tim McCauley and Tom Kusak, and defenders Ryan Piper and Bill Binkiewicz.

"We've got a rebuilding job to do,"

Although faced with new challenges from new programs — notably Madonna University's first-year team, which starts this fall — Dimitriou said he has had more players call him this season than ever before.

"My main concern was replacing our goalkeeper," he said, referring to the loss of Stabile, a two-year standout. "And we got the No. 1 keeper in the state."

That's Ariel Mechlowitz from Warren DeLaSalle, one of the state's best. Dimitriou was able to attract him through several of his current players, who play with Mechlowitz's summer league team, the Wolves. "He decided to come here, and we're glad he did," said Dimitriou.

Mechlowitz isn't the only member of the Wolves convinced by fellow Wolves to sign with SC. Chris Hayes (from Plymouth Canton) and Jeff Kley and Ryan Phipps (both from Plymouth Salem), all defenders, have signed. "All three will be starters or first off the bench," said Dimitriou.

Not just Wolves were pitching in the recruiting effort. Bazzi, the Ocelots' leading scorer last year, talked to several players he knew from his hometown of Dearborn.

Mohamed Hijazi, who played forward with Bazzi at Dearborn High School, could end up at stopper for SC. He's 6-foot-1, 180 pounds, and "the best leaping player I've seen in a long time," said Dimitriou.

Four Dearborn Fordson graduates are also coming: Nasser Salame, a versatile midfielder who's "quick as a cat"; Oussama Rahal, a forward/midfielder who possesses "a great shot and excellent acceleration"; Wissam Fardoun, a left-footed midfielder; and Wissam Haidar, a defender/midfielder.

All four are exceptional ball handlers, according to Dimitriou. "They play well together," he said. "I'm looking forward to seeing them play together (for SC)."

Of course, no positions are assured among the Ocelots, especially for the newcomers.

Like Mario Piacentini, a 6-2, 175-pound center midfielder at Royal Oak Kimball who scored 40 career goals and was all-conference in the Metro

Suburban Activities Association.

And Alex Dzyngel, a tough midfielder/forward at Farmington Harrison who's recovering from a broken leg.

And keeper John Hunter ("He's very interesting," said Dimitriou) and midfielder Chris Wedge, co-captains at Redford Union.

Others who very possibly could make a strong impact: Eric Stoeklein, a defender from Canton; Chris Graczyk, an outside defender from East Detroit; Jeremy Kurtinitis, an all-conference midfielder/forward at Dearborn Edsel Ford; Todd Villanueva, a tough midfielder/forward from Walled Lake Central; Jim Weber, a midfielder/forward from Brighton; Rick Fernandez, a defender from Taylor Truman; Robert LaFrance, a defender from South Lyon; Mike Hatfield and Darrin Wolfe, both from Tecumseh; and Doug Walters, a midfielder from Belleville who — like Bazzi — will also play basketball at SC.

So many interested, and Dimitriou said there could be more. Which means anyone interested in unseating the reigning NJCAA Region 12 champions will face an uphill struggle.

bound for Michigan, played shortstop most of the year, hitting .463 (.38 for 82) with six homers, two triples and nine doubles.

He knocked in 35 runs. This guy can hit, and he has tremendous athletic ability. Hoenes said. The big thing for him in college is finding a position for him.

As a right-handed starter, Besco finished 7-1 with a 1.52 ERA. He struck out 64 in 46 innings, while allowing only 21 walks, 26 hits and 10 earned runs.

Even though Derek and Bryan got most of the headlines, they kept everything in perspective, there was no animosity from their teammates, Hoenes said. The most important thing is that they handled the pressure well for high school kids.

They're both very quiet. They're not rah-rah types. They just come to play every day.

Jeff Lance, second baseman/pitcher, Redford Thurston: "I'm a senior, a first team All-Area pick in both football and baseball, enjoyed a fine senior spring, batting .456 (.41 for 90) with six homers

(school record), three triples and eight doubles.

He had 32 RBI and scored 34 runs with 18 stolen bases.

As a pitcher, Lance went 7-3 with a 2.52 ERA (and three saves). He struck out 73 and walked 26 in 58 1/3 innings.

Lance, bound for Henry Ford Community College, holds nearly every Thurston offensive career record. He also had an RBI triple in the Coaches Association All-Star Game June 23 at Tiger Stadium.

He is a four-year starter.

Jeff has been an outstanding player, played with injuries (broken nose), aches and pains, Thurston coach Ernie Majeski said. He's never been out of a ball game. That alone, speaks for itself. We're going to sorely miss him.

Jason Mitchell, third baseman, Redford Union: The senior hit .409 (.38 for 93) with a school-record seven homers and 41 RBI.

He also collected 10 doubles and three triples. Mitchell also had a slugging percentage of .806 and an on-base average of .509.

Mitchell, who sported a .960 fielding

average, played every inning of every RU game.

Jason's probably one of the hardest working, dedicated players I've worked with, Berryman said. "He's a throwback to the old adage, 'Hard work and dedication will make you a better player.'"

It also earned Mitchell a baseball scholarship to Eastern Michigan University.

Dave Knight, third baseman, Ply. Salem: A two-year starter at third, Knight was Salem's top offensive weapon most of the season.

He batted .369 with a team-high 23 RBI as the Rocks finished 24-9 overall. As a junior, Knight hit .387.

Knight collected 31 hits, including seven doubles this season.

He is also an outstanding student, possessing a 3.7 grade-point average with an ACT score of 27.

Both Knight and Marsella made All-Western Lakes Activities Association.

"He was the most dependable guy we had," Gravin said. "He decided last year that he was going to play third and bat third every game. He's the guy who got our clutch hits."

University of Detroit-Mercy and Michigan State have shown interest in the third sacker.

Dennis Madden, shortstop/pitcher, Liv. Franklin: The All-Western Lakes Activities Association at-large pick was one of the Patriots' mainstays this season.

"Dennis was a competitor, and he came around as a person the last 1 1/2 months of the season," Franklin coach Jim Karoub said.

He batted .407 (.33 for 81) with seven triples, three homers and 32 RBI. His on-base percentage was .600. He also drew a team-high 16 walks and was second on the Patriots' club in runs scored with 25.

Madden also stole 13 of 14 bases. The senior also pitched in 26 innings with a 1-4 record with a 4.46.

"He was one of the guys you had to be aware of when you played Franklin," Hoenes said.

Madden is also playing for Little Caesars in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League.

"He's our leadoff man and is doing a tremendous job there," Caesars coach John Morra said.

Ryan Ostach, outfielder, Ply. Canton: The 6-3, 215-pound senior was the Chiefs' most potent offensive weapon.

Batting in the No. 3 spot, he led the Chiefs with a .428 average, including two

homers and eight stolen bases.

Ostach, headed to Michigan Tech University on a football scholarship, made the All-WLAA and All-District teams.

"Ryan was probably our best athlete, a guy who can run, can throw and can hit," Canton coach Ed Turek said. "He was definitely a valuable player."

Jeromey Cosby, outfielder, Westland Glenn: Tied teammate Bryan Besco with an area-best 11 homers, while knocking in 44 runs.

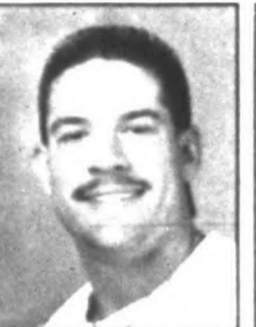
Cosby batted .347 (.35 for 101) with two triples and one double. He walked 20 times and scored 37 runs.

"He came on strong the second half of the year," Hoenes said. "He runs fast and is a tremendous athlete."

Cosby is headed to Ferris State University on a football scholarship. He played inbacker for the Rockets' state Class AA runner-up playoff team and was an All-Observer first-team pick.

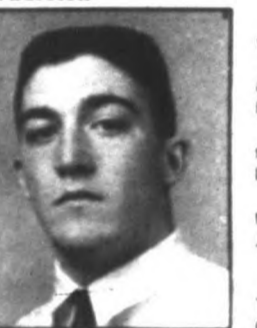

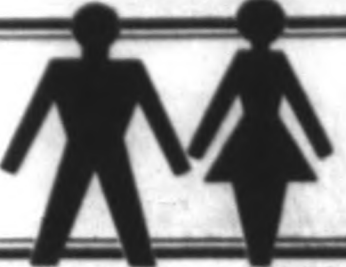

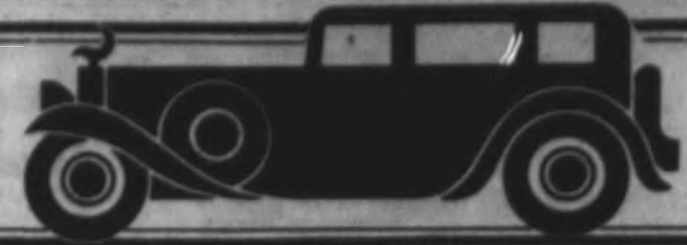

Barbara Walters puts AIDS 'In a New Light' on ABC

If Barbara Walters, the host of ABC's "In a New Light" special on Saturday, July 9, seems unusually persuasive in her narration, there's a good reason: When it comes to AIDS, she walks the walk and talks the talk, says executive producer Joe Lovett.

"The fact that Barbara is hosting this year is just wonderful to me, because she really is the godmother of the project," he says. "It was her matchmaking that made it happen."

The two-hour information/entertainment program, the third in an annual series from ABC, originated when Walters, who knew Lovett from his tenure as a producer on "20/20," came to him with a request from a colleague, an ABC executive.

"She said to me, 'Phil Beuth, the head of "Good Morning, America," wants to get involved in a project about AIDS in which he can make a difference,'" Lovett recalls. He later found out that Beuth recently had been devastated by the loss of a son to acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

Lovett, an openly gay man

credited with some of the earliest network (especially prime time) coverage of the AIDS issue back when the syndrome still was "a gay disease," had been at work on a documentary covering the annual AIDS-related "Heartstrings" tour. He offered the documentary to Beuth.

No. More, Beuth said. Soon, Lovett realized that ABC wanted a major "infotainment" special that was even bigger than the national tour of "Heartstrings."

"In a New Light," which features an address by President Bill Clinton and is part of a National Night Against AIDS program that has been heavily promoted by Walters and a number of AIDS-related agencies, is only one of the prize-winning newswoman's many attempts to educate the nation about AIDS, Lovett says.

"Her commitment to AIDS has been incredible," he says. "Back in '85 I did a story called 'AIDS in the Heartland,' about a young woman in Indiana who had gotten AIDS from a transfusion. At that point, non-gay people weren't coming forward very much. (That woman) really helped

change the face of AIDS and show how it can really affect everyone. And she also was a member in a born-again Christian church that had embraced her.

"After that show aired, Barbara said, 'We really have to do a primer on AIDS.' And I said, 'Oh, Barbara, everyone knows what AIDS is about.' And Barbara said, 'Joe, you know what AIDS is about, no one else does.'

"So we did a very simple, you know, 'What is AIDS?' And it started with her holding a baby with AIDS and saying, 'You cannot get AIDS by holding or touching this child.' That was a very brave thing for her to do, because in all the emotionalism about AIDS (at the time), how was she going to be seen? But she didn't care about that," Lovett says. "All she cared about was getting the message across. This is a lady who really cares about our world."

Walters drives home her message to the public in her final remarks during the special.

"I want to leave you with one thought: AIDS is not a fad," she says. "It is not the disease of the year. It's the disease of the century and, for the most part, preventable. If each and every one of us doesn't face the facts head on, we will have lost millions more men and women tragically — and, even worse, unnecessarily."

And, with a rising rate in teen-age pregnancies and a soaring rate in sexually transmitted diseases, Lovett reminds viewers: Every one of the initial encounters was a potential AIDS transmission.

"Last year more than 100,000 people called the CDC's national AIDS hotline (1-800-342-AIDS)," he says. "Almost 50 percent of them did not understand that they themselves were at risk for AIDS until they saw the show."

Take me out to the making of the ball game

Baseball on the Fourth of July? It doesn't get more American than that.

Fans of the game and its history who anxiously await Ken Burns' mammoth "Baseball" series, premiering this fall on PBS, can get a sneak preview on Monday, July 4.

"The Making of Baseball," a half-hour special on PBS (check local listings), offers a behind-the-scenes peek at the nine-part (nine-inning) series to come.

Viewers will see the kinds of decisions Burns and his staff have made en route to completing the project, such as what historical footage to run, which photographs to display and how to weave together the many interviews conducted on the subject.

Burns, the man who breathed life

"The Civil War, certainly in that terrible and costly crucible, defined us in one way," Burns says, adding that he and his partner, Lynn Novick, believe "that baseball is no less a precise describer of this very elusive thing and people we call Americans."
