Auto dealer plans expansion

Buoyed by sales up 40 percent over last year and a need to expand, Bob Jeannotte Pontiac-GMC Truck is purchasing Plymouth's Dick Scott Buick. Effective July 25, Jeannotte will lease Dick Scott Buick's facility at 200 W. Ann Arbor Road west of Lilley

for about seven months until a new facility is built.

The 17,000-square-foot dealership will be immediately south of Jeannotte Pontiac-GMC Truck on Sheldon Road, south of Five Mile Road in Plymouth Township.

Jeannotte said the purchase and construction represent a \$2.8 million

investment. "It's an upcoming, growing area I feel is nowhere near having reached its potential with all the construction going on. We're already one of the top 100 dealers in the country, and when the development starts between Five and Seven Mile, the whole area is going to boom," he said.

"The dealership will boom with it," Jeannotte said he hasn't been granted a tax abatement, but is looking into it.

Jeannotte and Scott expect no one to be laid off. Employees will be able to remain with Scott or work for Jeannotte. Jeannotte plans to hire at least

15 additional office, sales and service employees "just as a starter."

"We are awfully glad we were able to find another dealership and stay in the community," he added.

Scott — who also owns Dick Scott Dodge at Ann Arbor Road and Main Street and Dick Scott Motor Mall off I-96 west of Brighton — will convert his Ann Arbor Road Buick site.

"We will sell some other product in that facility," said Scott, adding that a deal is in the works. "I'm not at liberty to talk about it, but you will see

Trip to Middle East an eye-opener

It was Charles Darby's love for travel that led to his involvement with the Council for the National Interest.

On a 1985 trip to Egypt and Israel, Darby, a retired General Motors employee from Plymouth, said he was struck by the plight of Palestinians who seek their own homeland.

"I began to study the subject. It became very obvious to me our backing of Israel is lopsided — we give them money that amounts to one-third of their GNP (gross national product)," he said.

Darby said about one-third of all U.S. foreign aid goes to Israel. "I was pro-Israel. But once I became informed on it I thought a big injustice was being done," he said.

Last year, he learned of the Council for the National Interest. Founded by a former congressman, the group seeks to cut U.S. aid to Israel and have more land provided for Palestinians.

He joined 20 other group members in a fact-finding tour of the Middle East June 10-27. They met with Arab and Israeli political leaders, including Israel prime minister Simon Perez.

The first stop was Jordan, where they met with aids to King Hussein. "In talking with them, they were very upbeat on the peace process with Israel. They had high hopes for a highway planned to go from Egypt to Israel and Jordan."

In the Israeli-controlled city of Jerico, he said authorities at first wouldn't let the party in. "One of the little ladies said her husband

City loses second railroad battle

The city of Plymouth has lost a second battle this year with CSX Transportation Inc. over trains that block railroad crossings.

When trains that block crossings for more than five minutes violate a municipal ordinance, the railroad companies shouldn't be fined, a federal judge has ruled.

The July 1 ruling by Judge George LaPlata in U.S. District Court in Detroit was the second time this year the city has been thwarted in its efforts to keep trains from blocking crossings for more than five minutes.

In January, the state Legislature passed a bill sought by the railroads to increase the time trains could legally block crossings from five to seven minutes.

Yet, LaPlata's ruling leaves open the possibility that the city can still write tickets if crossings are blocked longer than five minutes, under another section of state law not changed by the Legislature, Lowe said.

City officials maintain long blocking of crossings is a nuisance to drivers and poses a safety concern as emergency vehicles sometimes must wait for trains to pass.

School chief, new trustees get down to business

There'll be three new faces at the table at the next Plymouth Canton Board of Education meeting, set for 7:30 p.m. Monday at the E.J. McClendon Educational Center, 454 S. Harvey in Plymouth.

It will be the first meeting — albeit a short one — for incoming Superintendent Charles Little of New York. It also will be the first board meeting for newly-elected trustees Susan Davis and Mark Horvath, both of Canton.

"We thought we'd take it easy on Dr. Little and not saddle him with a long meeting his first day on the job," said district spokesman Dick Egli.

Plymouth Canton Superintendent John Hoben retired after 23 years at the helm. Board members Les Walker and Carl Batashill didn't run for re-election.

The only item on Monday's agenda concerns fiberoptic cable for the district's high technology network.

The board will award cable bids for Eriksson, Field, Hulsing, Far-

rand and Miller elementaries. Funding will come from the 1991 bond issue.

New board officers were selected Tuesday. Dave Artley of Canton will serve as president, Susan Festen of Plymouth Township as vice president, Davis as secretary, and outgoing board president Roland Thomas of Plymouth as treasurer.

Little, 49, comes to the district from Frontier Central Schools where he administered a suburban Buffalo district of 5,050 students. He earned his doctorate of education degree in 1978 at Indiana University and his bachelor's degree at Rutgers University.

Little is skilled in developing budgets and is generally well-liked, say news sources in New York. The most controversial issue he faced recently involved the sale of a vacant elementary school. Little supported the \$250,000 sale to a Muslim group. It was opposed by taxpayers who succeeded in placing the proposal on the ballot and killing the deal. A subsequent sale was approved.

Little, who earned \$92,500, will

receive salary and benefits of \$117,373 per year. Included is a monthly car allowance of \$500, \$150 monthly for in-district travel, and a tax-sheltered annuity.

Newly-sworn-in trustees Davis and Horvath — both of whom were endorsed by the teachers' union — are regarded as earnest and qualified.

"People think Mark has done his homework and will be a good board member," said Egli. "He's going to be sharp. Susan Davis's background and interest in the district give her a good basis for not only serving on board but being board secretary."

A reliability engineer with Ford Motor Co., Horvath is married with two elementary school-aged children. He has a metallurgical engineering degree from Michigan Technological University and a master's degree in applied statistics from Oakland University. He coaches T-ball and soccer and is active in the Miller Elementary PTO.

Davis is director of community services for Growth Works. She holds a bachelor's degree in social



work from Madonna University and a master's degree in community agency counseling from Eastern Michigan University.

Married with three college-aged children, Davis serves on the Community Council for Substance Abuse Prevention and the Plymouth-Canton gang task force. She was Hulsing Elementary PTO president.



Given the state and federal mandates increasingly eroding school local control, some question what remains for boards of education to do besides allocate funding.

There's plenty, says Egli. "There may be more and more a basis for boards to act. To me there is a great need for local input, and that's really what your



board signifies, because it's an elected body responding to the community," he said.

"There are things like housing. A critical aspect of the educational process is where a kid goes to school. And the curriculum is still largely determined at this level. How education is approached is determined here."

Candidate stresses ability to work with both parties

Democrat Carolyn Blanchard, who'll face the winner of the Aug. 2 Republican primary for the 20th District State House seat, said the district needs someone who can work with both parties in Lansing.

"I think we need some leadership and some vision. I think I have that to offer," said Blanchard, of Northville.

In November, she will face the winner of the Republican primary for the state House seat — incumbent Jerry Vorva of Plymouth or former state legislator Gerald Law of Plymouth Township.

Blanchard brings to the race 10 years experience as a criminal defense lawyer in Detroit. "I've also

done some juvenile and probate work," she said.

"I feel I know a lot about people. I also do appeals. I've been in all the prisons in Michigan."

Prior to her experience in law, Blanchard served 10 years as a public health nutritionist. In this role, "I've been in homes throughout Wayne County. I got a broad exposure to people, their needs and problems."

"I've been in the projects and some of the mansions. I run my own practice so I know the problems of business people," she said.

"I think the people are ready to have the legislature do something for them. I can work both sides of the aisle. People want a legislature that can work, not split bi-

party lock-step."

Blanchard, 42, said she's running "because I think I have a vision about what society should be (that is) different than Mr. Law's or Mr. Vorva's. I think I can do the job better because of my experience, because of my innate ability."

Blanchard calls for more money for education from residents' income taxes. "The income tax is a fair tax because it hits the poor and wealthy equally," she said.

"Education is going to be woefully underfunded," she said.

As she is uncontested in the Democratic primary, Blanchard said she would wait until after the primary before putting her campaign in full swing. "I have a distinct strategy for each person (Vorva or Law)," she said.



"I would be a very responsible legislator. I would respond to questions and be available to people," Blanchard said, adding that if elected she would try to open a centrally located office in the district, if she could afford it.

Wilcox project comes to stop

Jack Wilcox, who owns the Wilcox House off of Kellogg Park in downtown Plymouth, has announced the dissolution of his partnership with Marcello and Silvio Scappaticci to build a luxury apartment project on Wilcox's downtown property.

Plans for the project were approved by city officials in 1990. "Although the developers had received municipal approval and enjoyed a record of many successful projects in the area, financial institutions were not looking favorably at

new construction of any kind," according to a joint statement from the project partners.

"They determined that their time and energies could be employed more productively and decided to cancel further activity on the project," the statement continued.

"It's back to the drawing board," Wilcox said, adding he'll begin talking with other developers and government officials to seek a new development at the site "in keeping with the image of Plymouth."

Residents object to counting at Mettetal

An airport traffic counter installed at Canton-Plymouth Mettetal Airport was the subject of heated debate last Thursday at the Mettetal Airport Advisory Board's monthly meeting.

The counter, installed May 18 by Michigan Department of Transportation surveyors, is used to calculate the number of aircraft operations taking place at the north Canton airport. The calculation is then used to determine the amount of activity at the airport, a figure that could be later used for planning purposes, said airport manager Randy Collier.

"The number might be used when weighing projects; if there was a funding problem and there

were two airports with needs, the funding would probably go to the airport with a higher usage," Collier said.

Operations counts are obtained by using a recording hose placed on the runway that records both incoming and outgoing flights. The hose records flight numbers for a time period of up to 10 weeks, according to Steve Vertalka, of the MDOT survey department.

The procedure is similar to that used to obtain traffic counts on area highways, he said. A formula based on variables such as season, region, and the percentage of itinerant and local flights is then applied to determine the number of yearly operations, Vertalka said.

But some local residents are questioning both the accuracy and the significance of the operations counts.

"The numbers that they have are way off. The whole justification for the existence (of the airport) is based the operations numbers. This (airport) is supposed to be a community asset, but it isn't being used like they say that it is," said Bob Zaetta, a member of the Plymouth Concerned Citizens group.

Zaetta is concerned that inaccurate or inflated operations numbers may change the state's agenda at the airport. The state may use the inflated numbers to justify future expenditures that may not be warranted, Zaetta said.

"The state has always used the operations count to justify using state money to purchase a hobby airport. They could also use these

numbers as a reason for future expansion," he said.

However, Collier disputes the notion of expansion in the near future. "Our hands are tied. There is no way that the airport could expand without township approval. I think it is written into the purchase agreement," Collier said.

Grange their home away from home

Eighty-seven-year-old Helen Eckles may be not be as quick on her feet as she once was. But try to pull one over on the Plymouth Grange treasurer and she'll catch it instantly.

The organization held a membership drive at the Cultural Center Wednesday night, and local Grange master Ruth Strebbling mentioned that in 1989 - the last year the Plymouth Grange served up pies at the community's Fall Festival, "Helen baked 340 pies." Eckles quickly corrected her, saying, "it was 360."

"I enjoyed doing that. I wish I could continue doing that," she added.

It truly was a labor of love. Asked which was her favorite kind of pie, Eckles replied, "Don't care much for pies."

The Grange, a farming fraternity and the hub of social activity when farmers comprised the bulk of the Plymouth community, has dwindled to 40 members, few of whom are still involved in agriculture. But "all 40 are active in community service," said Strebbling. "If the Grange is going to die, it's going to die over my dead body."

The next Grange event is a potluck picnic planned for 6:30 p.m. Saturday, July 23, at the Plymouth Cultural Center. Grangers will be honored for a combined 390 years of service.

The organization meets regularly at members' homes. For times and dates, call Strebbling at 420-0545.

While Eckles' health won't permit baking for days on end, she's still a masterful treasurer and spends hours making lap quilts that Grangers give away.

Eckles, a widow, is back in her own home in Plymouth

Township after an extended stay at a nursing home. Her friend and fellow longtime Granger Louise Tritten, 86, also attended the membership drive meeting, headlined by state master Ronald Winter who traveled to Plymouth from Marshall with his wife, Beulah.

Over the years, Tritten estimates she's baked tens of thousands of cookies. She got an early start. "You had to be 14 to join the Grange when I was a girl. But we were six miles from town, and my parents, who belonged to the Grange, didn't have anyone to leave me with. So they took me at 13."

Tritten grew up on a 280-acre farm on the Wayne-Washtenaw county line in Canton Township. "We grew grain, oats, wheat, corn and raised cattle," she said. "We didn't have tractors; everything was horsepower."

Established in 1867, the Grange gave farmers much-needed political power. "One of the purposes was social because farmers were spread across the country. Farmers might go for weeks and not see another person," said Ronald Winter. "The railroads were exploiting farmers, so there was reason to get together. The Grange always worked for the benefit of the farmer. But it was social, too."

The Grange survives as a statewide organization with 66 branches. Its activities are as diverse as its members. Grangers, who range in age from 5 on up, volunteer their services for the deaf, in particular with the Michigan School for the Deaf in Flint. They host leadership and summer camps and get involved with conservation, historical preservation, the arts, health care and other issues.

The Grange supplies members

with benefits including discount tractor accident insurance, car and homeowner insurance and travel discounts.

Among Plymouth Grangers' most popular activities is donating services for Meals on Wheels, which serves the home-bound.

Attorney facing prison term, fines in embezzlement case

Plymouth attorney Thomas Hibler faces a possible 10-year prison term and \$7,500 in fines if convicted on two counts of embezzlement and one count of alternative larceny by conversion.

Hibler, a general practitioner freed on bond, was bound over for trial by 35th District Judge James Garber at his preliminary examination Friday. Hibler stood mute at his earlier arraignment and a plea of not guilty was entered for him.

His arraignment on the information is set for Friday, July 22, in Recorder's Court in Detroit.

Hibler's attorney, Peter Bec of Plymouth Township, could not be reached for comment late Friday.

Hibler was disbarred for practicing on a suspended license, according to Robert Donaldson, Wayne County assistant prose-

cutor assigned to the Special Crimes Division.

An Attorney Discipline Board hearing panel said the charges against Hibler were established by default because the lawyer did not answer the Attorney Grievance Commission's formal complaint or appear at a hearing in Detroit.

Hibler is charged with "continuing to practice law and hold himself out as an attorney; knowingly making false representations in an affidavit to the state Supreme Court; and failing to respond to requests for investigation" after his suspension, Donaldson said.

He also is accused of failing to file proceedings for clients and keep clients informed, he added.

"In January 1994, an interim order or revocation was filed by the attorney grievance board.

Mr. Hibler didn't answer the allegations, so the allegations were deemed to be true and entered by state Supreme Court," Donaldson said.

The embezzlement charges stem from an incident involving one of Donaldson's clients, a woman with Alzheimer's disease. "Before she was adjudicated as incompetent, she came in to have him handle her financial affairs," Donaldson said. "He proceeded to cash in stocks - \$60,000 worth - put it in his trading account, and took all the monies out." Hibler also is accused of taking "\$54,000 in savings bonds she's received since 1963," the assistant prosecutor said.

Hibler was ordered to repay the client in Wayne County Probate Court, but didn't, said Donaldson.

had spent years in the CIA, they finally let us in," Darby said.

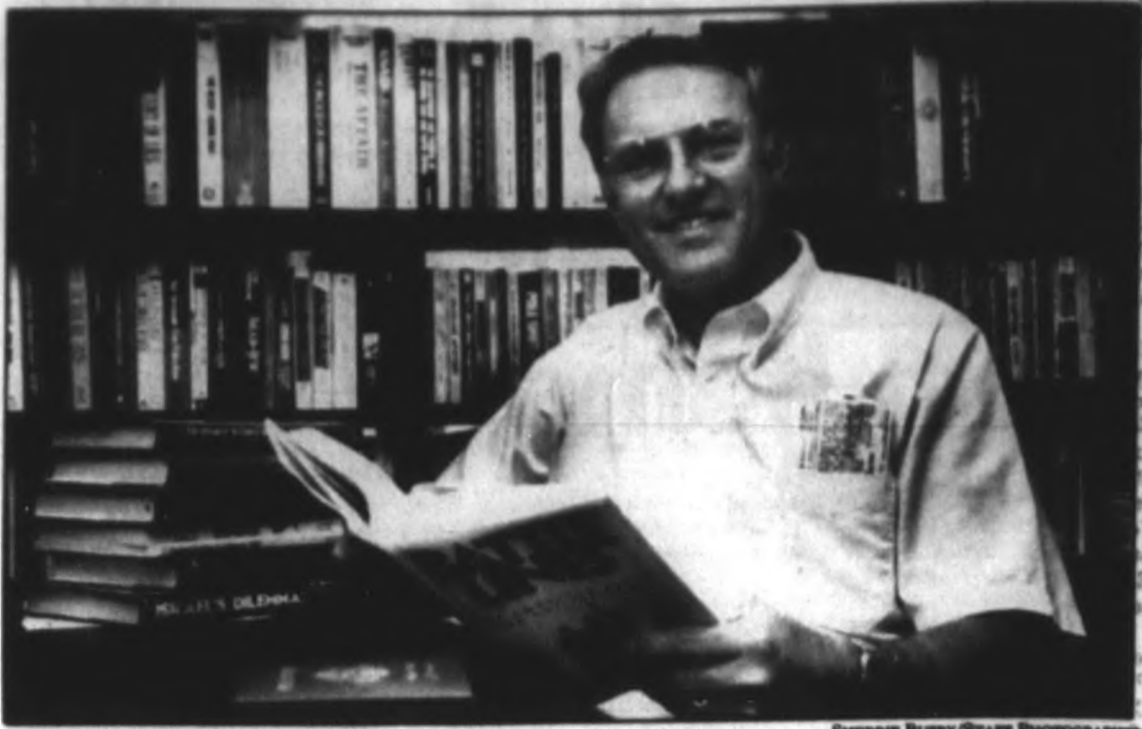
There, they interviewed Palestinian prisoners. "They said they all had been tortured while in jail in Israel," Darby said.

The group met with other Palestinian Arabs, who said they were upset that Israelis turn away 700 tourists a day from Jerico. "They live on tourism. They're choking off the economy by not letting tourism in there," Darby said.

The group, which wants travel and other restrictions lifted toward Lebanon, visited Beirut. "I walked the streets for three hours, I wasn't kidnapped," Darby said.

Saying the climate in the area is warm and dry, Darby said, "I can see why people settled there."

He said that while Egypt, Israel and Jordan are westernized, Syria — which the group also visited — is more oriented to the Arabic culture.

LaPlata on July 1 granted a CSX motion to invalidate the city ordinance that directs railroads to be fined if the trains block crossings longer than five minutes.

"The court must note that it is not persuaded by Plymouth's contention that by rendering the ordinance unconstitutional trains may indefinitely linger in the crossings leaving Plymouth streets in a continuing state of chaos," LaPlata wrote.

"He said he empathized with the city but couldn't ignore the law," said City Attorney Ron Lowe.

CSX has also taken the city to local district court in an effort to have a judge dismiss around \$225,000 in outstanding fines from tickets written for blocking crossings for too long.

Judge James Garber on Wednesday set aside the case for 30 days, to give the city of Plymouth time to determine whether to appeal the U.S. District Court ruling.

In its case presented in U.S. District Court, the City of Plymouth maintained CSX could speed up trains or straighten

tracks to shorten the time trains block crossings. But Judge LaPlata cited a CSX formula that linked the number of trains per day to potential train accidents.

Further, he wrote, "Compliance with the ordinance by increasing the speed at which the continuously moving interstate trains travel certainly relates to railroad safety."

By law passed by Congress pertaining to railroad safety, LaPlata wrote, "Municipalities are forbidden from regulating, under any circumstances, matters relating to railroad safety."

"In reaching this decision, the court is sensitive of Plymouth as explained in the affidavits of Police Chief Robert Scoggins and (Fire Chief) Alan Matthews," LaPlata continued. "However the record compels this inescapable decision."

Lowe responded, "I don't think our ordinance has any effect on railroad safety," adding he would meet with the city manager and city commissioners to decide whether to appeal the court ruling.

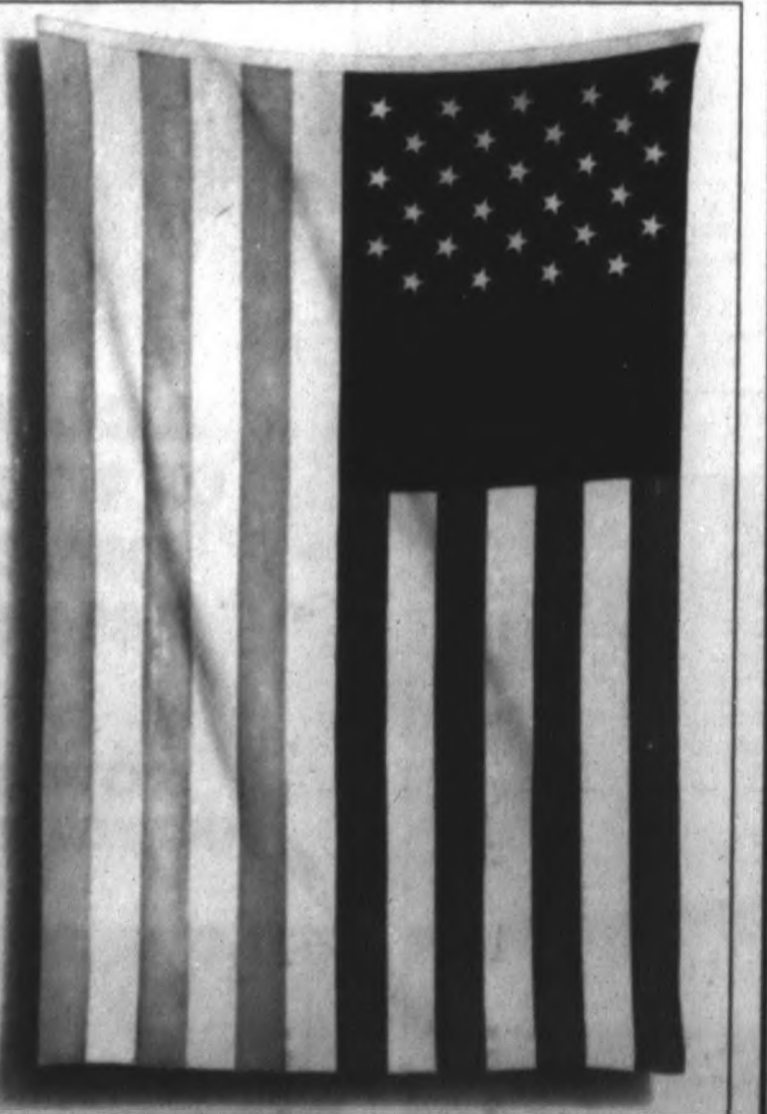

**CITY OF PLYMOUTH
ORDINANCE NO. 94-8**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 22, TITLE II, "CITY WATER SUPPLY", IN THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE FOR DECLARING WATER EMERGENCIES, FOR THE REQUIREMENTS OF CUSTOMERS DURING SUCH EMERGENCIES, AND FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The City of Plymouth ordains:

Section 1. Section 2.64 "Violations", of Chapter 22, Title II, "City Water Supply", in the Code of Ordinances of the City of Plymouth, is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.64: Violations; Declaration of Water Supply Emergency

(a) No person shall use water without permission, nor use water in violation of declaration of water supply emergency as provided herein, nor cause willful or needless waste of water by allowing constant flow of a faucet or otherwise, nor allow the occupant of any building not paying water rates to use the water from said premises. In case of the violation of any provision of this section, the offender shall be liable to have his supply of water shut off by the City without notice. The City Manager is hereby authorized to declare a "water supply emergency" whenever he determines, on the basis of existing or anticipated drought conditions, depletion of the water supply, reduction in water pressure, failure of one or more parts of the supply system, or for other good reasons, that there is a threat of loss of water supply to the City or a portion of the City.

(a) METHOD OF DECLARATION: A water supply emergency shall exist when the City Manager has caused a declaration of such emergency to be made as follows:

- (1) by public posting in at least three places as provided in the City Charter;
- (2) by announcement on the City Hall telephone answering system;
- (3) by announcement on any City information channels available on subscription television services operating within the City; and
- (4) by announcement on one or more radio or television stations with a normal operating range covering the City; provided, that this requirement shall be deemed to be satisfied if such an announcement is made by the Detroit Water Board, specifically including the City of Plymouth in its applicability.

When practical, and if the duration of the anticipated emergency warrants it, such declaration shall also be announced in local newspapers. The City Manager shall make a record of the time and date for implementation of each method of such declaration irrespective of such methods of declaration, a water supply emergency shall be deemed to exist for any person, and the property under his direct supervision or control, as soon as such person has received a direct written notice of such declaration.

(b) CONTENT OF DECLARATION: A declaration of water supply emergency shall include the effective date and time of such emergency, which may be immediate; the period of time during which such emergency shall be in effect, which may be for as much as twenty-four (24) hours per day, and until further notice is given; the types of outside water usage which are prohibited, which may include all outside usage except fire protection, and may permit certain outside usage on alternating days or during restricted hours; and the types of inside water usage which are requested to be reduced or avoided in the interest of conservation of water.

(c) WATER USE RESTRICTED: Whenever a water supply emergency exists, it shall be unlawful for any person to utilize water from the City water supply system for any type of outdoor use which is in violation of the terms of declaration.

Section 2. Rights and duties which have matured, penalties which have incurred, proceedings which have begun and prosecution for violations of law occurring before the effective date of this ordinance are not affected or abated by this ordinance.

Section 3. Should any section, clause or paragraph of this ordinance be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the same will not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or part thereof other than the part declared invalid.

Section 4. All other ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such inconsistencies hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after enactment hereof and after publication hereof.

Candidates won't rule out Social Security cuts

Two candidates for the 13th District U.S. House seat told a group of senior citizens last week that Social Security and Medicare ought to be considered for cuts to eliminate the federal deficit.

Cynthia Wilbanks, an Ypsilanti Township Republican, and Fulton Eaglin, an Ypsilanti Democrat, appeared Wednesday at the Canton Place senior citizen apartment house along with all but one of the other candidates for the seat being vacated by William Ford. (Belleville cable company businessman Dennis Fassett, a Republican candidate, was absent.)

The 13th District includes Canton and Plymouth townships, Plymouth, Westland, Garden City, and the southeast quadrant of Livonia.

One of three questions asked of all the candidates concerned So-

cial Security and Medicare.

Eaglin, an attorney and former paratrooper, said that budget cuts to eliminate the deficit "can't just come from defense. It has to come from every existing program. You've got to take something from everybody. The reality is that it's got to come from us all."

Wilbanks, who worked for former U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, noted that entitlement programs account for more than 50 percent of federal spending. "Our children are going to be faced with increasing difficulty if we are not able to look at entitlements," she said.

The other candidates seemed to oppose cuts in entitlement programs.

"If it wasn't for Social Security my mother would have relied on her six children," said David Geiss, a Wayne Democrat and longtime chief of staff for Rep. Ford. "What we should do cut is federal government waste in the

Pentagon."

Lynn Rivers, an Ann Arbor Democrat and state representative, answered that health care should become an additional federal entitlement program. "We should have a system that cares for all citizens," she said. "You should be able to move from job to job and retain your coverage."

Glen Kassel, a Wayne Republican and former PTA president, said that health care "should be for everyone," but he opposes a Canadian-style system. "We should do a little more research and get something everybody can take advantage of," he said.

John Schall, an Ann Arbor Republican, said that Social Security and Medicare are untouchable. "We need to be protecting Social Security and Medicare," he said.

Another question asked candidates what their top priority would be as a representative.

Wilbanks said spending con-

cerns her most. "Government spending is out of control. We can't afford to pass on massive amounts of debt to our children and grandchildren."

Kassel said spending is his highest priority, too. "We can't spend more than what we're getting."

Schall said his priority is to "get the economy moving and create jobs. That means bringing spending down. The time has come for real fiscal discipline."

Rivers said she wants to "help our community re-establish trust in government. We're there to serve the community, not to serve ourselves."

Geiss said, "Education is a primary necessity," but he also mentioned financial responsibility. Every U.S. representative, he said, should cut an equal share of the federal deficit from spending

in his or her district.

Eaglin said reducing the federal deficit is his top concern. "Until we can get rid of it, we can't argue about social programs. We can't argue about defense."

The candidates were also asked what they view as the most pressing foreign policy issue.

Schall said the United States needs an overarching philosophy governing its relations with other countries.

Kassel said U.S. military forces shouldn't be used where they're not welcome. He used the United States' involvement in Somalia as an example. "The United States of America comes first," he said.

Wilbanks said the U.S. needs a foreign policy "framework," but has none. "The president and his advisers are not doing us any favors by giving us a vacillating policy."

Eaglin said, "The No. 1 issue is, 'Where do we fit in the global economy?'" Eaglin also praised the North American Free Trade Agreement. "NAFTA has been shown to be a good thing for our country."

Rivers said, "We're still investing far too heavily in the Defense Department." She also said she opposes U.S. intervention in foreign affairs. "I don't think that role (of world cop) has served us well," she said. "I don't think we should pick it up again."

Geiss tended to agree. "We have to really watch where we put our big food and big mouth, or we might wind up with our foot in our mouth," he said.

The primary elections will be held Aug. 2. Wilbanks, Schall, Kassel and Fassett are seeking the Republican nomination. Geiss, Eaglin and Rivers are running for the Democratic nomination.

Candidates warned on sign placement

The Michigan Department of Transportation is worried about the safety hazard campaign signs can create.

MDOT is asking for the cooperation of candidates in ensuring safety is not compromised when placing campaign signs.

The driver's view of traffic and pedestrians can be obstructed by signs of any type.

Signs outside the right of way must comply with the Highway Advertising Act. Copies of MDOT criteria and the Highway Advertising Act are available from MDOT. Call (517) 373-7663.

Permits through the appropriate city, village or township are required to place banners over state trunklines.

Signs removed by MDOT from state trunkline right of way will be held for the candidate and may be claimed within seven days from MDOT.

Ann Arbor fairs draw top talent

What's hot in the world of art? Find out at the festival filled with fun, music, entertainment, and of course art.

The Ann Arbor Art Fairs roll in Wednesday through Saturday, July 20-23, offering nearly 1,000 exhibitors working in an array of mediums from painting, drawing, sculpture, ceramic and print-making to photography, glass, metal, jewelry, mixed media, wood and fiber.

If you're into one-of-a-kind clothing you'll find plenty of hand spun, woven and painted wearables at the four-day art extravaganza drawing 500,000 visitors annually.

The fair is actually three separate fairs in one — the Ann Arbor Street Fair, State Street Art Fair, and Summer Art Fair sponsored by the Michigan Guild of Artists and Artisans.

"The Ann Arbor Street Art Fair is known to select those artists, emerging as well as established, on the cutting edge," said Susan Froelich, coordinator.

Judith Fitzpatrick specializes in fine jewelry with an elegant edge. Mixing metals and semi-precious stones, the Bloomfield Hills jeweler designs and crafts contemporary rings, earrings and pins with geometric and architectural influences. She brings her wares to Booth No. A189 on East University at the Ann Arbor Street Art Fair, now celebrating its 35th years.

"Out of 22 jewelers in the fair, Judith is the only one from Michigan. That in itself speaks very highly of her work," Froelich said. "Her rings are very unusual in shape, asymmetrical. It's a very clean, contemporary perspective."

Fitzpatrick, who does wholesale and retail jewelry shows around the country, works primarily in 14K and 18K gold as well as sterling silver to craft limited production pieces. For those who desire something that's customized, she creates work in all of the above metals plus 22K gold and platinum.

Mixing metals is the wave of the future, said Fitzpatrick who frequently combines gold and silver in the same piece of jewelry. Consumers have grown tired of rigid standard forbidding the wearing of silver and gold together.

"Today, people are more interested in two metals, different combinations of metals. Colored gemstones have been gaining in popularity all along."

With an eye to the future, Fitzpatrick's latest series of conforming rings allow the wearer to mix, match and stack rings with simple, but elegant lines. A popular seller is her matching wedding rings.

"There's a lot of couples out there getting married and they're looking for something out-of-the-ordinary, something that says they're love is special."

Fitzpatrick's customers buy more yellow gold than white. Rings and earrings are her most popular sellers. When designing a piece, she takes into consideration all of these elements along with what the market will bear. What trends, if any, does she see in future jewelry sales?

"People are more oriented to yellow gold, but it's an individual preference," she said. "In general, people don't invest a lot of money in fashion trends. They want a piece of jewelry that's somewhat timeless."

Fitzpatrick's designs reveal a quiet elegance. For

Parrotheads go crazy for Buffett

■ Jimmy Buffett's coming to Pine Knob and that means the venue will be packed with manic fans who are brightly dressed and sometimes costumed. The Parrotheads are coming.

Going to a Jimmy Buffett concert isn't as easy as buying a ticket. It takes a tropical wardrobe and spirit.

The brightly dressed fans make his shows a spectacle with their brightly colored wear, plastic lobster, shark-finned hats and flying beach balls. They clasp their hands over their heads in the form of a shark fin during Buffett's song "Fin."

Marlene Buffa will decorate her car to make sure that Buffett fans know how serious she is about her admiration for the singer. Along with being the Midwest Tropical Appreciation Society/Detroit Parrothead Club president, she's also a fan. Her car will bear fliers and posters complete with tear-off information about her club while she dons the group's T-shirt to help advertise it. The organization's banner will be flying above several other member's cars.

Club member Paul Saloka of Sterling Heights has found no better way to honor his musical hero than to dress up as a human volcano, modeled after the Buffett song by the same name. The costume, which consumed 5 1/2 feet of his 5-foot 8-inch body, was constructed from cardboard and was complete with flowing lava made from plaster mold compound, he said.

"More than likely, I will wear it to the concert. When Buffett comes to town, you know you can go crazy for awhile," Saloka said.

This fun-loving spirit doesn't end with Buffett's shows, however. In the case of Buffa and the 165 members of her group, Buffett's fun-loving spirit is celebrated year-round. "We like the way his music makes us feel. It's pure escapism and fanaticism and it's fun," said Buffa,

whose resemblance to the singer's name is purely coincidental.

Buffett's shows, which come to Pine Knob Music Theatre in Independence Township July 19-20, are so important to his fans that they have been known to schedule events around Buffett's shows. Buffa, for example, scheduled her wedding to John Schwendler of Phoenix a month before Buffett's shows so as not to interfere.

The appreciation society is one of 28 Buffett fan organizations scattered around North America and one of two in Michigan. (Buffa, former president of MENSA, sure has appreciated Buffett. She has only missed one of his shows since 1979.) She said her group has a different twist to it. Buffett is known for focusing attention on ecological awareness, but the local organization is more socially conscious.

In less than two years of its existence the Appreciation Society has donated canned food and raised \$1,200 for the Gleaners Food Bank through fund-raisers.

Member Tom Wikol of Birmingham said being a Parrothead has allowed him to grow socially.

"It makes you a more well-rounded person not only personally, but socially because you can be around so many people young and old," said Wikol who is a member along with his wife Debbie.

For fun the organization has monthly beach parties at Carlos Murphy's restaurant in Southfield and other locations in Southeastern Michigan. The social focus is what persuaded David McDade of Flint to join the organization.

"I think I joined because of Buffett's music, but Buffett is as active in the community it comes out in a group," said McDade, the club's 30-year-old vice president.

Despite that, it's the music that's drawn the group together. Buffett is known for his easy-going calypso/reggae-based storytelling about simple topics such as drinking a blended tequila cocktail ("Margaritaville"), eating America's most popular tailgating cuisine ("Cheeseburger in Paradise") and one of the most unpopular days of the week ("Come Monday").

"I like the songs," explains Highland resident Judy Culbertson, 49. "His songs tell stories. It's not the stuff you can't understand. It's good music."

As for Buffett's new album "Fruit Cake," Buffa views the 23rd release as a mix of the past re-packaged for today.

"It's more of a mixture of styles," said Buffa who bought "Fruit Cake" a few days after it was released.

"Some stuff on this one sounds like old Buffett, some sounds like new Buffett and some stuff sounds like

'80s Buffett."

"Old Buffett tends to be more acoustic and mid-'80s Buffett tends to be more electric. The new Buffett sounds like he has a 50-piece band even though he doesn't, but it sounds more calypso."

The Appreciation Society's Parrotheads are scattered throughout the state with the largest population centered in the metro Detroit area. Membership also extends into Ohio, California, Arizona and Wisconsin and southern Ontario, Canada, with ages ranging from pre-teen to 60.

"It's unusual for one genre for music to attract such an age span. Most (musical) groups focus on one span of the music market. (Buffett) never intended to be a family show, he's said over and over," said Buffa, who also operates her own tailor-made Hawaiian shirt business called Tropical Tailor.

"All I want is for people to have fun and good clean fun and enjoy themselves and if we can help others in the process that's great."

"Platinum on Black" various artists

During the past few years, house music as an art form has evolved from its beginning basic synthetic keyboard notes and drum machine-programmed pounding into what can be referred to today as possibly a state of being.

"Platinum on Black" (frr, 1993) exposes this musical essence by not only compiling the latest European dance hits, but providing substantial evidence of a musical evolution.

The 14-track compilation straddles a fine line between what can be referred to as cutting edge and possibly monotonous and on the other side providing energetic and fun house music. Each song is appealing in its own dance club sways starting with the gospel gyrating "Love, Peace & Happiness" by Soul Solution, the frenzy marching band symphony of The Goodmen's "Give It Up" and the delicious jerky remix of Gabrielle's "Dreams."

More compelling re-mixes of club veterans Utah Saints ("What Can



You Do For Me") and New Order ("World") are more confusing and much harsher than the original non-dance-club remix versions.

"Platinum On Black" represents a wide perspective of musical energy, names and aspects under one solid title and is pushed to its limits with action and strength.

Unfortunately, this release is neither substantial nor compelling, but is jammed packed with empty calories. When you get right down to it, who cares.

"Vauxhall and I" Morrissey

Performers are easy targets for scrutiny and Steven Patrick Morrissey shouldn't be naive to this. Since the beginning of his career, the former frontman for the 1980s post-punk band The Smiths has been the focus of allegations about his band's break up, his sexual orientation, and his non-enthusiastic outlook of life — just to name a few.

Now with the release of his fifth solo album, "Vauxhall and I," (Sire Records, 1994) Morrissey states what exactly is on his mind and in essence slaps listeners in the face with his cheerful charm.

In the past, Morrissey has demanded that critics examine his works and allow it to stand alone. This time around he exposes more of his thoughts and morbid sense of humor through his typical storytelling-mannered lyrics placed over mid-tempo acoustic arrangements.

In previous releases his royal depression-ess had a way of keeping listeners' attention with creative phrases, but as soon as you think you comprehend his unusual realm of reality,

he hits with an obscure idea thrusting followers into dazed confusion. In "I Am Hated For Loving," Morrissey explains, "I am hated for loving, anonymous call, poison pen, brick in the small of the back again, I still don't belong to anyone — I am mine. I am hated for loving, I am haunted for wanting . . ." Now who exactly should feel sorry for him? He professes a no-holds barred policy of desire toward an unknown loved one by demanding, ". . . I am now a central part of your mind's landscape whether you care or do not. Yeah, I've made up your mind. . . ." In his recent hit single "The More You Ignore Me, the Closer I Get." Clever lyrics for someone who demands he has never loved before.

In "Hold On To Your Friends" Morrissey takes a stab at self-rationalization by expressing, ". . . But now you only call me when you're feeling depressed, when you feel happy I'm so far from your mind, my patience is stretched, my loyalty vexed . . . just bear in mind; there just might come a time when you need some friends." Perhaps that lends some insight into "the real" Morrissey?

versatility, some of the earrings have removable drops.

"My design ideas come from all types of external influences: out of nature, architecture, geometric forms. I take into consideration shape and form, and function. I think about scale and proportion and how a piece will look on a certain person."

Unlike many jewelers, Fitzpatrick does not design around a

stone. She begins with the metal. "I use simplistic stones set in a circle or a square. It works in two different methods — hand-fabricated using a variety of techniques, and by the lost wax casting process."

Fitzpatrick first became interested in jewelry while studying art with George Landino at Groves High School in Birmingham. It was during the two years she

spent in the sculpture department at the University of Michigan, she realized it would be wise to choose a medium with a stable economic future. A year of studies in England honed her technical skills before Fitzpatrick returned home to finish her fine arts degree at Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia. Her professional experience included stints at two Southfield jewelry studios — Morris Bednarsh Jewelry Design, and Mi-

chael S. Wigler. Jewelry allows her the best of all worlds.

"I knew I wanted to be in art, but didn't want to be a starving artist. Jewelry is working in a sculptural sort of influence. Europe gave me more of a disciplined and technically oriented approach that was less creative. I came back here to incorporate knowledge, training and creativity. I knew, I wanted to create my

own line of jewelry and sell it." Fitzpatrick's line of Judith Yvonne Jewelry can be found in more than a dozen galleries in

New York and throughout the East Coast. Art Fair hours are 9 a.m.-9 p.m. Wednesday through Friday.

Just grab and go with tiny purses

My Mom visited from Louisiana last week and accompanied me on this assignment — a quest for the newest mini-bags and clever "wallets-on-a-string."

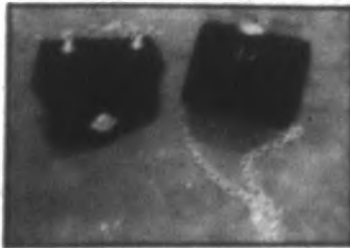

— choreographed to music and set on dramatically lit stages which tell each fashion's story. The show takes a year of preparation, beginning in April when designers present their fall collection in New York.

JoAnn Young, of the Dayton-Hudson Corporation, based in Minneapolis, directs the show which is also presented to the Minneapolis market.

"People who appreciate the structure and detail of garments from the '40s will really like what's on the runways this fall," she predicted. "Lots of plaids, tweeds, and suits with collar details."

Choreographer Myron Johnson and his Company of Dolls, of Minneapolis, agreed.



Emissions testing law snags more motorists

More vehicle owners will have to get costlier emissions tests beginning Oct. 1 under a new state clean air law.

"This is just under the existing program. We're not talking about new programs," said Susan Clark of the Michigan Department of Transportation.

"There will be a significant increase in the number of vehicles that will be tested each year — from 1.8 million to 2.3 million," Clark told a public hearing of ser-

vice station operators Thursday in Novi. Reasons:

■ A new state law will require annual auto emissions tests (AETs) for vehicles built after 1975. The old law went back only 10 years.

■ Vehicles up to 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight will have to be tested. Current law applies up to 8,500 pounds.

■ No exemption will be given to persons in the Medicaid social services program.

Nor will the new law contain a break for those who need expensive repairs to cut air pollution.

The old law set a cost limit of \$82. The new law caps needed repairs at \$200 and will increase it with the rate of inflation.

"The cost of the emissions test remains at \$10," Clark said, "but a \$3 administrative fee must be sent to the state for the initial test" — a total of \$13 to the vehicle owner.

The new law — PA 232 — transfers operation of the emissions testing program from the Department of State to MDOT. It still applies only to Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

"Wasn't the state receiving any money from emissions tests before?" asked Southfield dealer Mark Hechler.

No, answered Deb Brown of MDOT's governmental affairs section. "That (\$3 fee) is in the law."

According to a state Senate Fiscal Agency report last year, the federal Environmental Protection Agency was highly critical of Michigan's program because the Legislature continually cut general fund appropriations.

Lawmakers would vote an appropriation, then cut it in a bill euphemistically known as a "negative supplemental." The Senate budget analysts said expenditures were reduced from \$3.3 million in fiscal 1986 to \$1.7 million in fiscal 1993.

"Due to declining funding, the Department of State has reduced industry training and education, consumer education and informa-

tion, analyzer performance problem identification and analysis, consumer complaint field investigations, official state referee inspections in cases of disputed accuracy, and audits," the Senate analysts said.

Terry Burns, executive director of the Service Station Dealers Association in Lansing, said his group had "concerns" about MDOT's proposed rules to implement the law, but that he would put the concerns in writing later.

"Will testing stations need modifications of their existing equipment?" asked Ron Meyer, vice president of the Automotive Service Association of Michigan, headquartered in Livonia.

"Yes — later," replied Clark. "We have no numbers on the cost."

Clark said the changes are entirely independent of another possible development — new rules under the 1990 federal Clean Air

Act amendments. Earlier thinking has been that the AET program would be expanded to seven more counties — Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston and St. Clair in southeastern Michigan; Kent, Muskegon and Ottawa in western Michigan.

But Michigan is appealing its designation as a "non-attainment" state. "If EPA agrees, we may need no program at all, provided we can maintain our air cleanliness, or we may have to upgrade," Clark said.

On hot summer days, however, ozone counts in southeastern Michigan have been running close to EPA limits, raising the odds it will be a "non-attainment" area.

The state will keep open its record for additional comments on its rules changes until July 15. Send comments to: Michigan Department of Transportation, 425 W. Ottawa, PO Box 30050, Lansing 48909.

Holland Grill lights my fire for barbecuing

I love it when I'm proven wrong. Shortly after I flew the coop in Wyandotte, and moved into my own digs, I bought a classic - a shiny new black Weber kettle grill. The sun rose and set around that grill. I was known as the "charcoal king" at the local grocery store.

In the fall, I cleaned, wrapped and carefully stored it away. In the spring I polished it and brought it back to the deck. In the summer I used it, sometimes days in and days out. Many a summer night dinner was delayed waiting patiently for the coals to get that "gray ashen" cover. Never in a million years I thought, would I ever choose to own a gas grill.

They flare up, just like my kettle grill, they need maintenance just like my kettle grill, and I could never understand the love of tasting propane-scented ribs on a muggy July night. But I was wrong.

Converting to gas

You have to understand that I'm a gadget freak. I walk into a store and pick up pot scrapers, measuring cups and key chains with lights on them. Supermarket check-out aisles with all their kitchen gadgets and doodads are to me what a candy shop is to a kid. So when I walked into Denny Wright's HWI Hardware store in Livonia this spring to get a screen repaired, the last thing I ever thought I'd do was walk out with a gas grill.

Not just any grill, mind you, but a shiny new state-of-the-art Holland Grill. I fell victim to Denny's "try-it-you'll like it" offer of ownership. When I told him all the reasons I never wanted a gas grill, he assured me the Holland Grill was different.

Brad Holland, owner of the made-in-America Holland Grill, guarantees no more flare ups. Denny even said "the folks at Holland would buy back the grill if I didn't love it."

The Holland Grill is remarkable - it grills, it roasts, it steams, it fries, it smokes - it's the best gas grill I've ever used. Granted, it's the only gas grill I've ever used. What makes this grill a winner in my book is that secret, patented Holland System drip pan that enhances flavor and eliminates flare-ups.

My love affair with the Holland Grill didn't start as rosy as Denny and the folks at Holland would have liked. The Holland Grill takes a little getting used to.

Since the unit has a drip pan covering the burner unit to eliminate flare-ups, all of the cooking must be done with the lid closed.

As Brad Holland says in his cookbook, "when you're lookin' the food's not cookin'." The inside temperature is preset at around 400 degrees which makes the grill very suitable for cooking steaks and burgers, potatoes, casseroles, biscuits and pastries.

Indoor oven

I like to think of the grill as an outdoor oven. My first attempt at grilling steaks took a lot longer than anticipated because like most folks, I never read the instructions. I cooked with the lid open. My second attempt at roasting a whole turkey was nothing short of spectacular. Even momma praised the Holland.

With a suggested retail price of over \$600, the Holland Grill shouldn't be one of those impromptu purchases. Wright's Hardware in Livonia, and This Is It Bar-B-Q's on Orchard Lake in West Bloomfield are selling their stocks of Holland Grills on sale, and have lowered the price to the \$460 range. But is the Holland Grill really as good as the competition?

I was pondering this question at a party at my Uncle Earl's when I spotted his unused, unopened Father's Day gift - a top-of-the-line Weber Genesis gas grill. I begged Uncle Earl for the opportunity to "break in" his new grill.

While I must honestly say that the Weber performed admirably, my ribs were tinged from the grease flare-up until I realized how to cook them indirectly on the grill with one of the burners shut off.

The Janes Gang family doctor, Gilbert Roc of Canton, wondered if the Holland was as good as his Ducane gas grill. After borrowing a Ducane from a friendly neighbor, I found the cooking surface small, and there were frequent flare-ups.

The best way to buy any new gas grill, is to carefully watch a demonstration, ask loads of questions, and if possible, try cooking on it yourself. If you're used to cooking on a charcoal grill, a gas grill will definitely be something that takes a little getting used to.

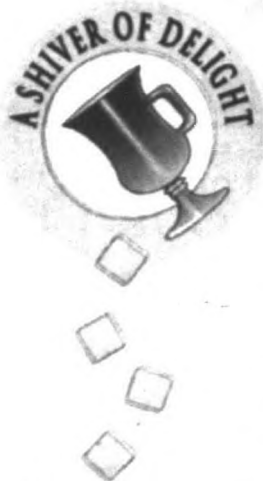

SIP OF ICED COFFEE

Quench your thirst for something different, yet refreshing with iced coffee. It's this summer's hottest sip. Start with a fresh pot of coffee, then put it in the refrigerator to get cold. Add ice cream, cocoa and other flavorings, whirl in the blender, and enjoy.

As temperatures climb, so does the demand for iced coffees. And with this mandate, as well as an increasing interest in specialty coffees, comes the birth of trendy coffeehouses.

"Iced coffee is a popular alternative to other drinks, such as sodas and alcoholic beverages," said Tom Corey, a manager at Grand Cafe in Farmington.

"Because of the popularity of iced coffee, we offer six different versions of the drink, including two specialties - Iced Caramel Apple and Orange Mint Sipper. These two drinks, created by Grand Cafe employees, can be made at home with regular brewed coffee. Our other iced coffee drinks use cappuccino as the base."

According to Corey, the secret to a good iced coffee is taking the time to let the coffee cool naturally. "Start by brewing a fresh pot of coffee, then put it in the refrigerator to get cold. If you pour hot coffee over ice, it melts the ice and you get too much water in the drink."

Drinking iced coffee is one thing, for many "hip" area resi-

dents, it is also important where you drink this beverage.

The Grand Cafe, which is owned by brothers Bob and Dennis Sakuta, attracts a steady clientele seeking not only its iced coffees, but also its 36 different hot coffees and teas. This in-town, basement-level coffee shop also offers a fairly extensive sandwich, salad and pastry menu.

Kay Laberge of Farmington Hills sampled iced coffee for the first time at Grand Cafe, and was inspired to try it herself at home.

"I went out and bought a cappuccino machine so that we can enjoy this frothy drink cold on hot summer days," she said. Laberge now ices regular brew coffee for another cool taste treat. "I sometimes add different liqueurs to iced coffee when we entertain," she said.

While sipping or munching goodies at the Grand Cafe, patrons can enjoy the various "coffee artwork," - reproductions of famous paintings with a coffee theme added by local artist Janisse Larson. On the peach-colored walls are sayings to ponder while you sip - "No man is lonely while drinking coffee with his friends," and

"Friendship is like money - easier made than kept."

If reading material is what coffee drinkers want, then the Lonestar Coffee Co. could well be the place for them.

Reminiscent of a comfortable home library, this six-month-old downtown Birmingham establishment has 2,000 books lining shelves on the walls. "Our customers are invited to read these volumes while they are here," said Ryan Rosett, who owns the Lonestar with his brother, Jay.

"We are offering a lot more than just a cozy atmosphere and the only coffee roaster in the area. Our store features a full line of iced coffees for the summer, including our newest creations of fat free iced mocha drinks.

"These icy creations are like frozen blender drinks. In California people stand in line for these mocha beverages," said Ryan Rosett.

Lonestar also carries 16 flavors of Stucchi's ice cream and yogurt, as well as fresh squeezed orange juice and lemonade. Low fat and fat free pastries are also offered.

"When we opened the Lonestar we set as our goal to not only offer the best cup of coffee around, but also to provide coffee drinkers with a pleasant atmosphere and social environment."

Atmosphere, Atmosphere.

Atmosphere. Creating a good atmosphere was also the aim of Dominic Ercolani, owner of Espresso Thysself, a new coffee house in Keego Harbor.

"I wanted to combine good food and beverages with old world Italian charm. With the help of local store designer Ron Rea, we have been able to give our patrons a hint of Italy," Ercolani said.

Espresso Thysself serves gourmet coffees and teas - as well as pastries from a number of Detroit area bakeries. It also offers Italian candies, fresh squeezed and nectar juices and homemade Italian soups.

This Oakland County coffeehouse with a "catchy" name is mostly known for its 26 flavors of cappuccino, which can be served hot or iced. It is also known for its entertainment and poetry readings on weekends and selected weekdays.

"Cappuccino doesn't have to be strong to retain its taste when served over ice," said Ercolani. "It just has to be good."

Entertainment, including classical music presentations, is another appeal of most of the area's coffeehouses.

According to some of the owners, their businesses are the bars of the 1990s, and they wanted to create social environments similar to bars. Entertainment has helped them accomplish this.

Barbecue sauce contest winners share secrets

Good flavor and aroma, this is what our judges had to say about Mary Van Alsten's "My Own Barbecue Sauce," winner of our homemade barbecue sauce contest.

"I've been making it for over 30 years," said Van Alsten who lives in Redford. "It has a sharp, sweet taste. Baste ribs with it the last half hour of cooking or use it with chopped leftover pork or beef for sandwiches. My daughter Janet uses the same recipe."

Van Alsten's secret sauce is a tasty mixture of minced garlic, onion, ketchup, mustard, molasses, cider vinegar and a hint of chili powder. She won a \$50 gift certificate for barbecue supplies from Wright's Hardware in Livonia.

Our second place winner Betty J. Manthey of Plymouth has a tasty recipe that's easy to remember. Her "Two by Two Barbecue Sauce" recipe is full of twos - two cups ketchup, 1/2 cup Italian dressing, and two tablespoons lemon juice are among the secret ingredients.

"My mom used to concoct a lot of things in the kitchen," said Manthey who won a \$25 gift certificate from Danny's. "This recipe is partly my mom's, I changed it a bit. It sticks to your ribs,

but you can also use it on chick en, pork chops or baked beans."

Jim Ingram of Livonia was the third place winner. His winning recipe "Cayenne Have More Barbecue Sauce" is a zesty combination of ketchup, light brown sugar, ground horseradish, Dijon mustard, and cayenne pepper. Ingram won a copy of "The Best Covered and Kettle Grills Cookbook Ever," by Melanie Barnard (HarperCollins Publishers, April 27, \$16.95).

Like our other winners, Ingram said he enjoys inventing things in the kitchen. He uses his sauce mainly on shish kebab, but says it's real good on vegetables too. "Everyone always wants more," said Ingram who does all the cooking at his house.

Deciding a winner and picking three finalists for this contest wasn't easy. We planned to have three finalists, but because there

were so many good entries, Chef Larry James who read all of the recipes, asked if we could please have four finalists. The fourth was Millie Bean of Bloomfield, who received an Observer and Eccentric tote bag as her prize.

The finalists prepared two quarts of their sauce for judges to sample at Rocky's of Northville on June 30.

The judges were Chef Rocky Rachwitz of Livonia, owner of Rocky's of Northville, Dennis Wright of Livonia, owner of Wright's Hardware in Livonia, and Bill Bresler, photographer for the Plymouth Observer Newspaper, and an outstanding cook.

"They were all very, very close," said Rachwitz, with the other judges nodding in agreement. "But one stood out a little from the rest."

Quench your thirst with iced coffee

Home economists for the American Dairy Association offer these tips for making iced coffee:
■ Use freshly brewed coffee, preferably double-strength. (Use two times more coffee than usual for the same amount of water.) The coffee should be prepared no more than three hours in advance. Allow the coffee to cool before using it. It can be stored, covered, in the refrigerator.
■ To keep the ice cubes from diluting iced coffee, make creamy coffee cubes. Stir in half-and-half or milk into leftover coffee; pour into ice-cube trays and freeze.

ICED CARAMEL APPLE

8 tablespoons apple pie filling
2 1/2 cups chilled brewed coffee
2 cups vanilla ice cream
1 tablespoon caramel sauce
Caramel sauce, whipped cream and cinnamon for garnish

Place first four ingredients in a blender and blend until smooth. Lightly coat inside top quarter of four 8-ounce glasses with caramel sauce. Pour in iced mixture. Top each with whipped cream

Welcome back

Canton grad returning to coach Chiefs' cagers

■ For a guy whose ultimate goal is to coach high school basketball, Dan Young could have done no better — in his second year as a varsity coach, he's landed the head job at Plymouth Canton, the school he graduated from just eight years ago.

It seems like a dream come true for Dan Young.

He was never a star when he played basketball at Plymouth Canton. "I started, but I was very average," he admits.

His teams were never anything too great, either, always flirting with .500. But when he left Canton, he set his course: To teach and to coach.

That was eight years ago. Now his goal has been reached.

Young has been chosen to coach his alma mater, the school he graduated from in 1986. He replaces Dave Van Wagoner, who resigned in May.

To be completely accurate, Young realized his goal a year ago — when he was hired to coach at Brighton HS. "I would have loved to stay there," Young said. "But my teaching job is here."

Moore's 'TV Nation' plays like twisted '60 Minutes'

Like most of his fellow baby boomers, Michael Moore still has vivid childhood memories of the Cold War and its looming threat of nuclear annihilation.

Unlike most other boomers, however, the 40-year-old filmmaker has done something about it.

In a hilarious segment for "TV Nation," his new NBC satiric-investigative magazine premiering Tuesday, July 19, Moore travels to Russia to take out the missile he suspects is still aimed at his beloved hometown of Flint, Mich. The creator of the acclaimed documentary "Roger & Me" carries along a sign that reads "No Nukeski Flintski."

Plan A, he reveals, is to find and disarm the missile. Plan B is to change its target, and he thoughtfully provides the former Soviets with a detailed map to the homes of Hollywood stars. "Steve

Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, right here," he says, indicating one spot, "or Chuck Woolery."

Moore's mission to Moscow is one of five principal segments in an hour that plays like a twisted version of "60 Minutes."

Other stories: Moore visits companies that have moved plants (and jobs) to Mexico; Rusty Condies recruits acclaimed black actor Yaphet Kotto and a convicted white felon to see whether some New York cabbies routinely pass up black passengers; Merrill Markoe visits a state-of-the-art Minnesota prison that has everything except inmates; and Jane Morris and Jeff Michalski visit Niagara Falls and Love Canal, where a real estate agent shows them "homes they could have for up to 20 percent less than comparable houses farther from a trenchful of dioxin-laced sludge," the off-camera narrator explains.

Perhaps it's fitting that Moore currently is putting in 25-hour days, doing seven episodes of "TV Nation" while putting the final touches on "Canadian Bacon," his fall feature film starring John Candy, Alan Alda, Rip Torn and Rhea Perlman. Without "Bacon," "TV Nation" might never have happened, he explains.

"I started thinking about ('Bacon') around the time of the Gulf War when I saw how easy it was to get Americans to just go against any enemy that the government tells them they should hate," he recalls.

"Iraq was a country that was an ally for the previous decade. We had given them \$4 billion in aid. And then, one day, they were the next Hitler. And I thought, boy, it doesn't take much, does it? All of a sudden, everybody's tying yellow ribbons and (getting) behind Desert Storm."

Pushing this notion to the extreme, he envisioned a movie in which the United States declares Canada an enemy. While in Los Angeles to line up financing for the film, he got a call.

"Somebody called from NBC and said, 'If we gave you an hour of network TV, what would you do with it?' So I said, 'Yeah, well, I'll think of something and be right over.' So I drove from West Hollywood over those hills to Burbank, and by the time I got there I had come up with the idea for the show. I know this sounds like a flip story, but it's actually the truth."

Moore confesses that sometimes he can't understand why people agree to be interviewed on-camera by him.

"I always am running into people who have seen 'Roger & Me' and who know what I am up to," he muses. "And they still will do the interview. I've asked myself (why that is). And I say, 'Well, '60 Minutes' has been on the air for 25 years. Why, at this point, would anyone talk to Mike Wallace?' I mean, if you saw him coming down the hall, what would you do? You know what I mean? But people still talk to him. People go on 'Geraldo' and 'Sally Jessy (Raphael) to expose the most embarrassing things about their lives. Why?'"

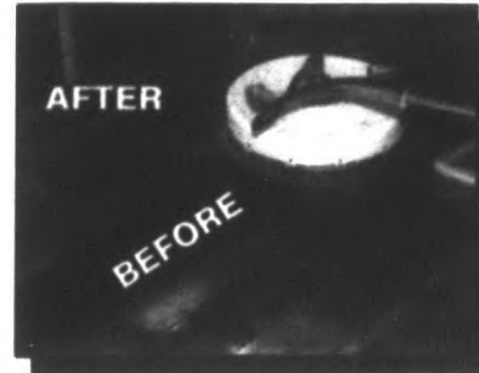

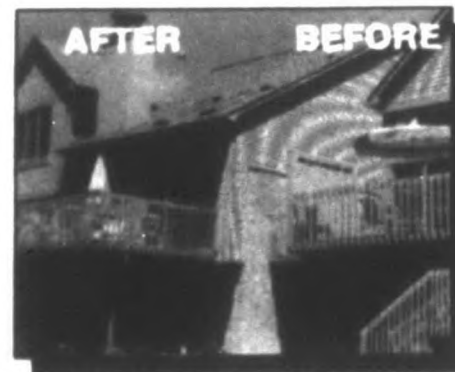
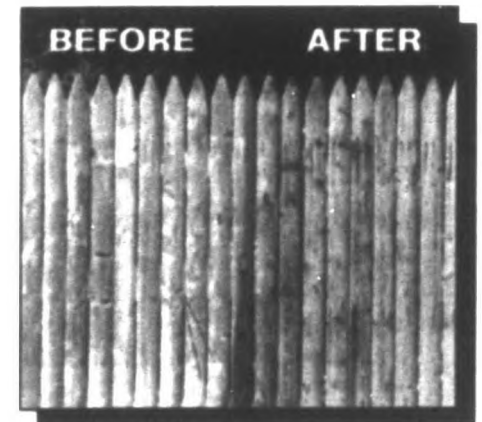
