Vacant Highland site draws bid



The former Highland Superstores headquarters on Sheldon may not be empty for much longer. Action Distributing of Livonia, which distributes Miller beer and other imported products, has bid on the vacant building.

A Livonia beer wholesaling firm has put in a bid for the former Highland Superstores headquarters in Plymouth.

Action Distributing of Livonia has

put in a bid for the property on Sheldon Road valued at \$10 million. Dick Rose, company vice president and general manager, said the company is now examining the site to make sure it's suitable and that no contamination problems exist.

"We're examining everything right now to make sure everything is feasible, whether it's suitable for our needs," Rose said. "Once that investigation is completed the sale would be consummated."

Rose said Action favors the site "because of the location, size, availability to railroads — everything."

Action distributes Miller beer and other imported products to 2,000 metro Detroit businesses, Rose said. Should the facility be used, 150 employees would work out of the site beginning next spring, he said.

City officials said it was too early to determine how much the city would gain in tax revenue from the firm locating in Plymouth. City Manager Steve Walters said, "It's certainly an improvement in the tax base. There was a big loss in personal property taxes when that building was vacated," about \$39,000 per year for the city.

And Action employees, Walters said, "are potentially downtown customers."

Adding decks still as popular as ever

This is the season for enjoying backyard decks, and their popularity is still soaring, say local building suppliers and building officials.

"They're as popular as ever if not more so," said Doug Mans, manager of Mans Do-It Center, which sells lumber to deck builders, deck contractors and runs deck building classes.

Canton Township's building department last year issued 300-400 building permits for decks and related additions, said municipal services informational coordinator Casey Hans.

And Charles McIlhargey, Plymouth Township building director, said his department gets 120-125 permit applications each year to build decks.

While screened-in porches were

preferred in the 1960s, decks are popular now for several reasons.

"I think it's because of the looks and because of the terrain, there are a lot of hilly areas in the township," McIlhargey said.

"I guess people like more of the outdoors look, the whole outdoors kick. They work inside all week and come the weekend they don't want to be boxed in," Mans said.

"It gives people a place to put the kids, they can barbecue or sunbathe," he said, adding, "It's almost a must on the back of a home if they ever resell it."

The trend in decks these days is to get more fancy. McIlhargey said some decks, complete with gazebos, rails and multi-levels, run as much as \$70,000.

"I think people are trying to do more than they used to," Mans said.

"We're seeing two or three tiers and more elaborate rail systems."

"Everybody's trying to out-do the Joneses. Their neighbor puts on a 200-square-foot deck, they want to put on a 250-square-foot deck," Mans said.

He estimated that 60 percent of the store's deck business is to do-it-yourselfers. "A decent simple deck you can do in a weekend," he said, adding

Judge hopefuls stress legal experience

Ten of the 11 candidates running for district judge in the Aug. 2 primary took turns touting their strengths and answering questions in a two-hour program Thursday at the Water Club Grill in Plymouth Township.

The candidates, before about 100 supporters and members of the Plymouth Republican Club which sponsored the forum, sought to impress voters with why they should be picked from the wide field.

Voters will choose one candidate and two will survive the primary to run in November for a spot on the 35th District Court bench.

Each candidate responded to four questions they

were given in advance, and took written questions from the audience read by moderator Charles Kaufman, who serves as a part-time 35th District judge.

Michael Gerou stressed his experience as a private attorney working in "virtually every court in Wayne County," said he would also draw from life experience to make a well-rounded judge, cited extensive community involvement and said he understood business as he established his law practice from the ground up.

Ron Lowe, Plymouth city attorney, told the audience he was the candidate who had worked most extensively in the court. Asked if he'd favor the city in cases before the court, Lowe said that in his private practice, "I've represented clients before other

district courts, arguing against municipal ordinances."

Stephen Boak, now in private practice but a former administrator with the Wayne County prosecutor's office, compared his 27 years' experience to other candidates. Referring to other candidates work, he said, "I've done all that plus 10 years . . . The difference between an exceptional judge and a mediocre one is experience."

Maria Petito stressed 10 years of experience as a Wayne County assistant prosecuting attorney who has worked in district court. "That makes me very familiar with these procedures," she said. In do-

School decision expected on antitrust violations

Plymouth-Canton school officials will discuss tonight whether to join class action lawsuits stemming from antitrust violations by school bus distributors and certain Michigan dairies.

The school board meets at 7:30 p.m. in the E.J. McClendon Educational Center, 454 S. Harvey in downtown Plymouth.

Plymouth-Canton purchased buses through Hoekstra Truck and Equipment Co. of Grand Rapids, one of six Michigan distributors that pleaded guilty last August to bilking districts by

rigging bids for buses. Plymouth-Canton has purchased 35 Thomas MVP buses at a minimum cost of \$65,276 each from Hoekstra.

Philip Erickson, an attorney representing Plymouth-Canton Community Schools and other districts, said 75 of Michigan's 580 districts have joined the bus suit thus far. "We expect to have hundreds of districts participating eventually," he said.

"I think we should join if enough money is involved," said school board member Barbara Graham.

It's unclear whether Plymouth-Canton has been serviced by the

dairies indicted for price-fixing. "It's my understanding that the school district is planning to recommend that the board adopt a resolution to join the bus and milk cases; however we don't yet have the documentation we need," said Erickson. "When we do, we will make a determination."

The indicted firms include McDonald's and Bareman's dairies of Michigan, and Allen Dairy of Indiana, Erickson said. A federal grand jury investigation is ongoing in the Eastern District in Flint.

John Klopstein is district man-

ager for Marriott School Services which supplies Plymouth-Canton. He's handled the account for nearly four years and said Plymouth-Canton buys Melody Farms milk.

"Over the last four years, I'm not aware that any of those dairies provided service through Marriott," he said. "We have actively participated in other states with investigations initiated by attorneys general. We have not been contacted regarding Melody Farms, so we don't have any reason to believe they're under investigation at this point," said Klopstein.

Erickson said antitrust violations involving dairies occurred in six counties in Michigan. "The question is how far do the violations extend beyond those six counties?"

Sales by the indicted companies were made in four counties in western Michigan and two counties in south central Michigan, said Erickson, of the Lansing-based firm of Thrun, Maatach & Nordberg.

Erickson said it's difficult to estimate the amount districts have been overcharged. He declined to speculate on the amount of money involved, but said based

on discussions with clients, Michigan's experience is similar to that of other states. "In aggregate, there've been a lot of bus sales and a lot of milk sales. If you look at the situation in aggregate, the sums are very substantial, we believe."

Other items on the agenda include at-risk students, Reading Recovery; Lowell Middle School technology update; textbook adoptions; computer purchases; chain link fence contracts for Tonda and Bentley elementaries; and continued discussion of the board's goals. The board will meet in closed session to discuss labor negotiations.

Fire merger talks continue

Those stalled talks on merging the city and township fire departments are moving again.

The city and township governments want a joint fire department staff of 21, saying this is adequate to protect the community and saves taxpayers money. The unions say 24 is the proper staffing level to protect the community, while still saving money.

Both sides met Wednesday, and staffing was still the main sticking point. But the union has made a new proposal regarding staff levels, which the city and township are now re-

viewing.

"We made some progress collectively and we're meeting Aug. 3 to give the city and township time to evaluate the position taken by the unions," said Plymouth City Manager Steve Walters.

Representatives of both the city and township fire unions were unavailable for comment Friday.

Walters said the negotiating session "was somewhat more positive than the last session or two."

"The union came back to us with another proposal. We're looking it and analyzing to see if it's feasible," Township Super-

visor Kathleen Keen McCarthy said.

Both the city and township governments have set deadlines of sorts by which the two sides must work out an agreement to create a joint department.

"At this point I am still putting Act 78 on the November ballot, in order for me to take it off I have to have some settlement on this issue before Aug. 30," McCarthy said, a deadline for removing the issue from the ballot.

Township firefighters work under state Act 78 which sets out testing for promotion and other employment guidelines. McCarthy is proposing putting the issue before voters in No-

vember, who could opt to scrap the act. That would allow city officers to join the department at current rank — which the township union said it isn't opposed to.

"I'm cautiously optimistic after yesterday's (Wednesday's) meeting," McCarthy said last week.

Walters said the city must wrap up talks on a joint department in the next few weeks, because it must soon plan how to pay for current city and fire departments, or a possible city public safety department which would combine city police and fire, or the proposed city-township fire department.

ORDINANCE NO. C-94-03
CHAPTER 22
ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE***

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 22 TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADOPTION BY REFERENCE OF THE BOCA NATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE, 7TH EDITION, 1993, AS PUBLISHED BY THE BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS INTERNATIONAL, INC., AS THE ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, ESTABLISHING MINIMUM REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE CONSUMPTION OF ENERGY RESOURCES IN BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES, TO PROVIDE FOR PRINTED COPIES OF THE BOCA NATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY THE PUBLIC IN THE OFFICE OF THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT DURING REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS, TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES, TO PROVIDE FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCE, TO PROVIDE FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE, AND TO PROVIDE FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 1. REPEAL.
All other Ordinances and parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such inconsistencies, hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.
If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or part of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provision not have been included in this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE.
The repeal provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any ending fee, assessment, litigation or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.
This Ordinance is to be given immediate effect upon publication as required by law.

Feeling proud

Diploma has special meaning

Bessie Wallace had every reason to give up on life. Instead, she worked to make her dreams come true.

So poor were Wallace, her sister, and her mother, that they subsisted on biscuits and lard and lived in a two-room house with tar-paper walls, no indoor plumbing, and no electricity in their native rural Tennessee. The family did have chickens and hogs, but that was before Wallace's father deserted them when Wallace was 14. From the time she was 10, Wallace picked cotton, earning just \$2 per 100 pounds.

"My mom's goal was to complete her education," said Wallace's daughter, Pam Chaney. "She wanted to be a teacher, but there literally was no money." They didn't even know people who had indoor plumbing.

"The Sears and Roebuck catalog could come, so they knew there must be a better world out there," she said. "But they didn't know where it was, or how to get there."

Wallace's mother had little education. To scrape by, "she took in people's laundry and scrubbed on a washboard. She was determined to keep her girls together," said Chaney. "I don't believe there were government aid programs, and when they were initiated, they didn't reach into the isolated rural areas."

When Flora Wells, Wallace's mother, learned there was work in Detroit, she saved enough for bus fare and moved. The family settled in Plymouth, where, at age 17, Wallace went to work instead of finishing school. She earned much-needed money waitressing at the D&C dime store lunch counter on Main Street.

Before she was 18, Wallace married a young man she'd known since they were kids in northwestern Tennessee. She and William, her husband of 46 years, raised two sons and a daughter.

Wallace — who says commitment, to each other and their children, saw the couple through — always had a job outside the

home. She worked at Burroughs, a Sheldon Road box factory, in child care, in a Saline factory, and at Industrial Strainer before her recent retirement.

But always, a feeling of emptiness lingered.

"I've always, down through the years, had a feeling within me of leaving something undone," said Wallace. "One of the things we were taught in my family is: When you start a job, you finish it."

Not until she was in her 60s was there the opportunity to return to school. Two years ago, the Westland resident enrolled in Plymouth-Canton's adult education program. On June 9, at age 64, she received a state-endorsed high school diploma at ceremonies staged at the Salem High School auditorium.

A 4.0 student, Wallace was chosen to speak to the class of 1994. She addressed her remarks to young people.

"You may feel you've faced adversity. Things may not have gone so well. I know; I was there. But I want you to know you can make dreams come true, regardless of who supports or doesn't support you. I'm living proof."

"If there is something you really want to do, whatever it is, pursue it. Good jobs aren't out there any more for the uneducated. Hang in there and get an education. Because without it, you will never have anything."

Wallace received a standing ovation.

"I've never been so moved or felt so proud as when I was sitting there and the whole audience, including Superintendent (John) Hoben, rose to its feet for my mom," said Chaney.

A letter Chaney wrote to her mom was read by a faculty member at graduation. "In a world where mommies and daddies live happily ever after and 17-year-old girls don't have to worry about enough food to eat, or where they'll sleep at night, you would have graduated from high school on a shiny June day in 1948. At a dime store, as a child care provider, at a Saline factory, and a Plymouth factory where you be-

came powerful presence in the union and an inspiration to your daughter who was ever watching you, you worked. And you dreamed.

"Here we stand, your family, deeply moved and inspired by your courage and determination to make life turn out the way it should have 46 years ago. It's a shiny June day and you are a member of the newly minted class of 1994," wrote Chaney.

"It's been a long journey, but you continued to put one foot in front of the other, despite the obstacles, until you reached this place on this day where your dream is coming true. Congratulations, Graduate!"

Programs available

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools offer a wide range of adult education classes.

Students may earn GED certificates and high school diplomas by enrolling in day, evening or weekend classes starting in September.

Tuition is free for those who qualify, and free for classes including GED preparation, English as a second language, adult reading improvement and others.

Fees range from \$125 to \$400.

In addition to academic subjects, students may enroll in computer science, practical law, parenting, phlebotomy, auto body, cosmetology, and small business management.

Improvements under way at local Mettetal Airport

Canton and Plymouth residents may start to notice some differences as they drive past Canton-Plymouth Mettetal Airport. Improvements are already under way as the finalizations are made on a five-year airport improvement plan.

Pilots, tenants and users of the airport met with state officials July 21 at a special meeting to discuss proposed airport rules and regulations and a five-year development plan for the airport.

Some of the work has already been started: workers are slated to begin paving the airport's now-gravel parking lot in August. A new fence around the parking area, paved sidewalks and lighting will also be included in this first in a series of planned improvement projects for the airport.

Randy Collier, acting airport manager, said the improvement projects show the state's commitment to making the airport an important asset to the community.

"We want to be good neighbors. The parking lot is a mud lot. It makes a bad impression on people and we want to change this," said Collier.

The meeting was held to help airport officials prioritize planned improvements. Adding a Precision Approach Path Indicator (PAPI), which will provide pilots

with visual vertical guidance to the runway, is planned for the north end of the runway closest to Joy Road. A similar project is currently under way on the south end of the runway.

Other planned improvements include a four-foot split-rail perimeter fence along Joy Road, a new fuel storage facility and the reconstruction and relocation of taxiways. Improvements that will bring the airport up to building codes and the resolution of electrical problems are also planned.

"There are some problems here that need to be corrected as soon as possible," said Collier, adding that the airport has been in the sales process for the past four to five years. "Things fell by the wayside, and no one was complaining. But there are things that the state has to bring up to standard."

Collier said that it may take up to five years to complete the improvements, depending on funding availability. Local, state and federal monies are used to fund

such projects and are divided as such on the plans.

According to Collier, the local money is generated by the airport users and is obtained from hanger rental fees and fuel sales. The state money used to fund the projects is obtained from the state's aeronautics fund, revenue derived from aviation users. The federal portion of the improvements will be paid for by the aviation trust fund. Revenue for the fund is derived from airline ticket tax and aviation fuel tax.

The projects cannot be started until the local portion of the money is available for use. Some pilots at the meeting discussed the idea of donating \$3,000 to get the projects under way as opposed to waiting for the airport to generate the revenues.

But one local pilot who has flown out of the airport for 25 years said he would not be willing to make such a donation. "Sure, I could give you \$3,000. But the age of the pilots here are over the age of 60. We don't know where we will be in five years," he said.

Two trees damaged

Walters said truck traffic generated by the beer distributor would probably not be a problem as trucks would load and leave in the early morning.

The firm can seek tax breaks on building remodeling or renovation and on equipment that would go into the facility.

Requests on tax abatement, by state law, must be approved by the Livonia City Council as Ac-

tion would be leaving Livonia for the Plymouth facility. Tax abatement must also be granted by the Plymouth City Commission.

Rose speculated that the Livonia council, which has denied such requests for transfer but approved others, would approve Action's request.

The property seller, Liquidating Trust of Highland Super-

stores Inc., declined an earlier \$8 million sale offer from Action, Plymouth Finance Director Bill Graham said. The earlier offer was followed by an \$8.2 million offer in April.

The property is assessed at \$5.05 million for tax purposes, suggesting a true cash value of \$10.1 million.

The Highland Superstores

headquarters closed in March 1993. While Fretter Inc. had expressed an intention to move to the site last fall, the company opted for a Brighton site instead.

The site at 909 N. Sheldon provides 35 acres and 530,000 square feet of warehouse and office space.

the store runs seminars on deck building.

"We walk through people who don't know which end of a hammer to use, they end up building their own deck," Mans said.

While treated Ponderosa pine has been the favored wood for deck building, Mans said more and more folks are opting for cedar treated on the underside.

"Termites or other insects won't eat it so it won't go bad," he explained.

Mans said the most difficult part of deck building is digging holes to hold support beams. By local ordinances, support beams are required, as are railings if the deck exceeds a certain height.

Both Canton and Plymouth Township offer handouts to those

building decks, to show minimum specifications.

In Canton, the minimum depth for posts or footings is 42 inches, and decks over 30 inches from the ground require railings. In Plymouth Township, 42-inch footings are also required, and decks 24 inches or higher above grade must be railed. In Canton, three steps or more must be railed, while in

Plymouth Township more than three steps must be railed.

The city of Plymouth places requirements similar to those in Plymouth Township on deck building. Jim Penn of the city building department said the city gets requests for about 100 decks each year.

"We have little ones and big ones, not as big as some they have in the township," he said.

mestic violence cases. "There are no competing interests," she said. "It is a crime and it must stop."

Kevin Simowski cited 12 years experience as an assistant Wayne County prosecuting attorney who has prosecuted homicides and won more than 20 murder convictions. "I'm tough, fair and effective. I've raised no more than \$1,000 (to campaign)," he said, adding, "A judge shouldn't be looking at the ledger books but the law books." Simowski said he would have "zero tolerance" for defendants in domestic violence cases.

Carol Levitte cited 15 years experience practicing criminal and civil law, service as a deputy racing commissioner and extensive work in the 35th District Court. "I'm the only candidate with judicial decision-making experience," she said. Levitte suggested adding evening or Saturday morning hours to the court schedule to relieve the crowded docket.

Edward Zelmanski stressed a temperament made for the job, service as a lecturer on legal topics, working up from a staff attorney to become manager of two law offices, and said to better meet

the heavy district court caseload pre-trial conferences could be handled by telephone to save time.

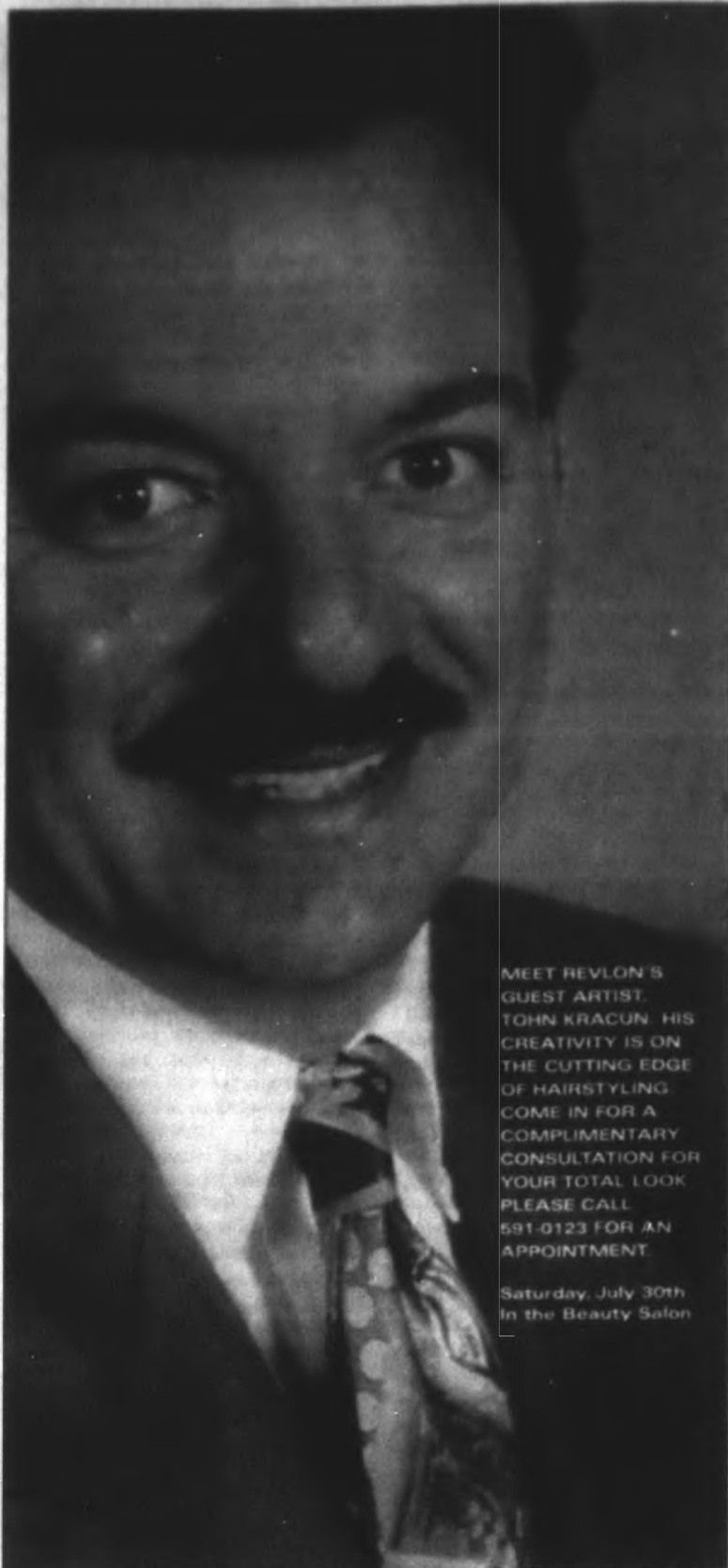
Dennis Shrewsbury, a city commissioner and private practitioner for 12 years, cited experience as a public servant. "I have the experience, temperament and fairness to be a good judge," he said. He said that while there are competing interests in domestic violence cases, "We need to protect the children involved," adding restraining orders should be swiftly and fairly enforced.

Jacqueline George, an attorney

for 18 years, stressed a desire to be a public servant. "I'd appear on the bench on time, put in a full day, no unnecessary delays, and give fair and just consideration before litigants before me," she said.

Step back in time at antiques fair

Huge brightly striped tents lend a festive atmosphere to the countryside as they welcome scavengers to the Ann Arbor Antiques Market on the third Sunday of the month at the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds.

Crowded inside horse barns, fragrant with the smell of hay, over 400 dealers from across the country display their second-hand wares. Savvy collectors mark their calendars for this popular market and thousands converge on the 80-acre site, hoping to snag the treasure they've been searching for.

I donned my walking shoes and headed to Ann Arbor on July 17, hoping to scout out our local dealers and to inquire about this summer's hottest collectibles. Of course, I knew I wouldn't leave empty-handed. Rustic painted furniture and fun '40s textiles seem to call to me from among the more formal and sophisticated Americana.

Thrill of the hunt

Martyn Hesse's beautifully refinished antique furniture caught my eye as I entered the first tent. Several of Hesse's bedside tables and bookcases (\$200-\$265) sported bright red "Sold" tags. Though he displays oak tables and chairs,



beds and dressers, it's the smaller, occasional pieces that sell the quickest. I admired the Victorian washstand, inlaid with Majolica tiles

(\$655). It also captured the attention of Ann Croft of Detroit, a novice antiques collector. See Hesse's entire inventory at the Plymouth Antique Emporium, 13101 Eckles Road.

The red painted kitchen scale with shiny brass tray (\$115) drew me to Marcia Petrella's booth. Petrella shares space with other dealers at Troy Corners Antiques, 90 E. Square Lake Rd. Included in her selection of 19th century American country furniture and accessories were a brass desk lamp (\$485) and candlesticks.

Edna Tillman has set up shop at this megamarketplace for over 20 years. She recently closed her downtown Birmingham store, but is still in business at 1255 Villa. Tillman's unique architectural and 1920s iron floor lamps (\$125) were popular items at this show, as were a wicker side table (\$245) and painted iron park bench (\$495).

I encountered the Scheets of Rochester admiring Tillman's wares. "I'm looking for blue and white porcelain and something wonderful to set the microway on," said Mrs. Scheets who likes functional pieces, not just decorative knick-knacks. The Scheets have also been looking for the perfect wood box, a quest that's lasted for years. "I like to browse until I see something that brings back memories. I'm in it for the nostalgia," she added.

Familiar faces

Other local dealers with secondhand sensations included Big Beaver Antiques of Troy, Lulu's of Royal Oak (I saw a great vintage croquet set in a painted box, \$38), B.L. Nowka Antiques in The Barn on 8 Mile Road in Northville (a blue reen butler tray, \$95 and a Victorian calling card basket, \$35), and Cowboy Collectibles and Western Memorabilia, 195 Liberty in Plymouth. For me,



the "Best of Show" were a faded blue Amish rocker and a pair of green plantation shutters that hang on the wall as art (\$150). And what did I

happily carry away through the big farm gates? A weathered green metal sap bucket that is filled with dried flowers, a gorgeous floral-design hooked rug, circa 1930 from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, and a terrific three-legged footstool.

Carl Hess (grandfather of present CEO Donald Hess) purchased Parisian in 1920 with a partner. His son, Emil, is chairman of the board. Harold Abroms is vice chairman. In 1968 Parisian was named "Brand Name

Store of the Year" by the Brand Names Foundation.

The Livonia store manager Elliot Marcus wants shoppers to know that any similarities between Parisian Department Store and the city of Paris are coincidental — "We're just plain old Parisian," he said when first arriving in Michigan.

Marcus' first task was to build a service force of 275 employees. He said he does whatever it takes to make customers and staff feel special — even ordering three \$200 foot massages for the associate's lounge.

Parisian offers its customers a

proprietary credit card with a no-interest credit plan, a liberal return policy, a diaper changing area accessible to moms and dads, a cartoon corner in the children's department, free customary alterations for men and women, extra large fitting rooms and a coffee bar.

Annually, each Parisian store awards \$10,000 to a local community service agency that serves families. The announcement of the first winner in metro-Detroit will be made at a special pre-opening party on July 31.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH
ORDINANCE NO. C-94-02
CHAPTER 21
ELECTRICAL CODE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 21, ELECTRICAL CODE; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE OF 1993, AS ADOPTED BY THE NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION ON MAY 21, 1992, BY REFERENCE, AS THE ELECTRICAL CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:
SECTION 1.
Chapter 21, the Charter Township of Plymouth Electrical Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:
21.010 Adoption of Code. The National Electrical Code of 1993, as adopted by the National Fire Protection Association on May 21, 1992, is adopted by reference as the Electrical Code of the Township.

SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY.
Any person, corporation, partnership or any other legal entity who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or any of the regulations adopted in pursuance thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or imprisoned not more than ninety (90) days, or both, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY.
If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or part of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provision not have been included in this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.
All Ordinance or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 26 TO ADOPT THE CABO ONE AND TWO-FAMILY DWELLING CODE, 1992 EDITION, AS PUBLISHED BY THE BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS, INTERNATIONAL, INC., THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE OF BUILDING OFFICIALS, AND THE SOUTHERN BUILDING CODE CONGRESS INTERNATIONAL, BY REFERENCE, AS THE ONE AND TWO-FAMILY DWELLING CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP REGULATING AND CONTROLLING THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, PREFABRICATION, EQUIPMENT OR APPLIANCE INSTALLATION, QUALITY OF MATERIALS, USE AND OCCUPANCY LOCATION AND REPAIR OF DETACHED ONE OR TWO-FAMILY DWELLINGS NOT MORE THAN THREE STORIES IN HEIGHT AND TO PROVIDE FOR PRINTED COPIES OF THE ONE AND TWO-FAMILY DWELLING CODE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY THE PUBLIC AT THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT DURING REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:
SECTION 1.
Chapter 26, the Charter Township of Plymouth CABO One and Two-Family Dwelling Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
26.016 Code Adopted. The CABO One and Two-Family Dwelling Code, 1992 Edition, as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators, International, Inc., the International Conference of Building Officials, and the Southern Building Code Congress International, is adopted by reference as the One and Two-Family Dwelling Code of the Township regulating and controlling the design, construction, prefabrication, equipment or appliance installation, quality of materials, use and occupancy location and repair of detached one or two-family dwellings not more than three stories in height. Printed copies of the One and Two-Family Dwelling Code are available for inspection by the public at the Building Department during regular business hours.

SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY.
Any person, corporation, partnership or any other legal entity who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or any of the regulations adopted in pursuance thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or imprisoned not more than ninety (90) days, or both, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY.
If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or part of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provision not have been included in this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. REPEAL.
This Section provides that all Ordinance or parts of Ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE.
The repeal provided for herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending litigation or prosecution of any right established or occurring prior to the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.
This Ordinance, as amended, shall take full force and effect upon publication as required by law.

Residents air concerns on proposed development

Canton residents joined Westland homeowners in protesting the proposed Forest Creek Estates bordering the two communities.

Bowing to strong residential opposition, the Westland City Council has rejected a 130-home subdivision that had been proposed in the city's far northwest corner, near the Canton Township boundary.

The decision followed a strong protest from Westland and Canton Township residents who blasted the proposed development, planned on the east side of Eckles between Joy and Koppernick.

One by one, residents addressed the council and drew applause from the audience as they voiced concerns that the project would harm the environment, cause traffic snarls and disrupt what they described as a peaceful way of life.

Councilwoman Sharon Scott, calling the area "beautiful," made the motion to deny the request from J&E Community Homes, which sought special approval to build the subdivision.

"If I were a resident out there, I would be with you out here protesting," Scott told the homeowners. Her motion was approved in a 6-0 vote with one council member absent.

Developer Steven Schafer indicated that plans would be revised and submitted again to the council, though residents have made it clear they will fight development in the area.

"The people who already are (living) there have rights, too," said Westland resident Mary Brent, who lives on Armstrong Lane in Briarbrook condominiums.

She pleaded with the council to avoid "rubber-stamping" the project, and she warned that residents would "remember at election time" if the council approved the subdivision.

Schafer had asked the council for special approval to place homes on 7,200-square-foot lots that would have a 60-foot frontage. Current zoning calls for

8,400-square-foot lots with a 70-foot frontage.

Schafer rejected residents' claims that the development didn't include proper plans for water drainage, which some residents said would cause flooding.

Kathleen Koenig of Canton Township said the area already floods easily, and she worried that the project would cause water from a nearby drain to rise in her back yard. Koenig, who is physically impaired and uses an electric scooter, said she depends on a back-door ramp at her home because her front yard is too steep.

"If the water comes in my own home, I am virtually a prisoner in there," Westland resident Jack Smiley,

among nearly a dozen citizens who voiced opposition Monday, said he envisioned the area around Koppernick as a nature preserve where youngsters could go camping and learn about nature.

"Please don't cave in to the developer," he said. Schafer said the development had been carefully planned to save as many trees as possible, and he said developers wouldn't intrude on area wetlands, as some opponents charged.

"The most choice trees on the site fall into the areas we are trying to preserve," he told the council, adding later, "It's also not my intent to put basements in wetlands."

Most opponents didn't accept his argument.

"I think you're being sold a bill of goods here," Canton resident Gerald McDermott told the council, "and I think it's a false bill of goods."

Although Schafer said some trees would be replaced, Westland resident Jan Hunter responded, "Just the idea of pulling trees out of an area and replacing them is revolting to me."

Schafer, indicating that developers won't abandon plans to develop the land, asked the city council for a special study session to receive guidance on a residential proposal that might be acceptable. The session hasn't yet been scheduled.

Head Start offered

The Head Start program, offered by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools in conjunction with a grant from the federal government, is accepting applications for the 1994-1995 school year.

A child is eligible for the free program if the child lives in the Plymouth-Canton Community school district and will be 3 or 4 years old by Dec. 1.

Additional eligibility qualifications include income (an annual income of \$14,800 or less for a family of four or public assistance), foster child status or a handicap.

The Head Start program is at Central Middle School, 650 Church St. in Plymouth. The program uses the High-Scope curriculum. Breakfast and lunch are served to children each day. Bus transportation is available for Head Start students on established bus routes.

Three-year-old children will be part of a Home Visit Program.

Growth Works offers women's programs

Offering services for women isn't anything new at Growth Works.

"We've been doing women's programs and women's therapy groups for about seven years," said Elizabeth Broderick, addiction specialist for the human services agency which serves the greater Plymouth-Canton area.

Mainly, those services have been for chemically dependent adolescents and adult children of

alcoholic and dysfunctional families. "Now we want to broaden the scope of that to make the programs available," said Broderick, who's been with Growth Works in various capacities since 1985 and has a bachelor's degree in psychology and addiction studies from the University of Detroit Mercy.

That will include expanding the young women's element, so that it meets three times a week. That group is for those ages 14-19. The additional session is

tended to be particularly helpful to women who are new to recovery. It will incorporate a 12-step recovery process and be disease-concept oriented.

Sessions will include a monthly lecture section substituting for a discussion.

Adult women will also meet in weekly therapy sessions, covering such subjects as women in depression, sexuality issues, attention deficit disorder in adults, nutritional needs of women, spirituality and the recovering woman, eating disorders, financial management, self-defense and empowerment. Speakers will be brought in on a monthly basis to

address such topics. Organizers would like to work with both adolescents and adults and eventually establish a mentor-relationship between the two.

"We're hoping to draw people from western Wayne County," said Broderick, citing such communities as Plymouth, Canton, Westland and Northville. The agency has been receiving some referrals from Garden City and Dearborn Heights as well.

"There is a need in this community," she said. Broderick has found women are reluctant to travel to Ann Arbor to get help. Some may have trouble with getting a baby sitter, she said.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 25 TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADOPTION, BY REFERENCE OF THE BOCA NATIONAL MECHANICAL CODE, 8TH EDITION, 1993, AS PUBLISHED BY THE BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS INTERNATIONAL, INC., AS THE MECHANICAL CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP; TO PROVIDE FOR STANDARDS GOVERNING THE DESIGN, INSTALLATION AND CONSTRUCTION OF MECHANICAL SYSTEMS; PROVIDING REASONABLE SAFEGUARDS TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY AGAINST THE HAZARDS OF INADEQUATE, DEFECTIVE OR UNSAFE MECHANICAL SYSTEMS AND INSTALLATIONS; PROVIDING FOR PRINTED COPIES OF THE BOCA NATIONAL MECHANICAL CODE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY THE PUBLIC AT THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT DURING REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS: SECTION 1.

Chapter 25, the Charter Township of Plymouth Mechanical Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

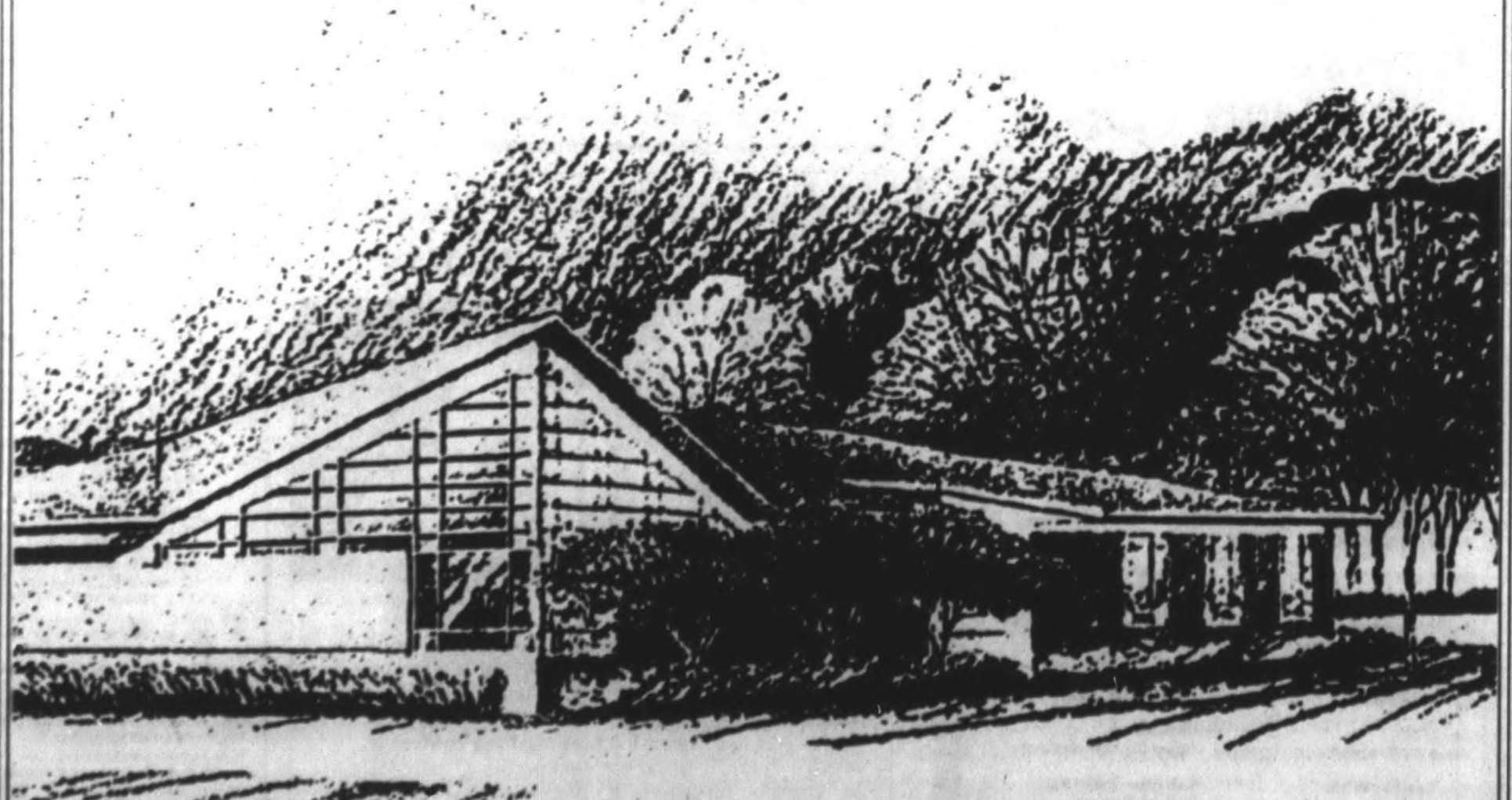

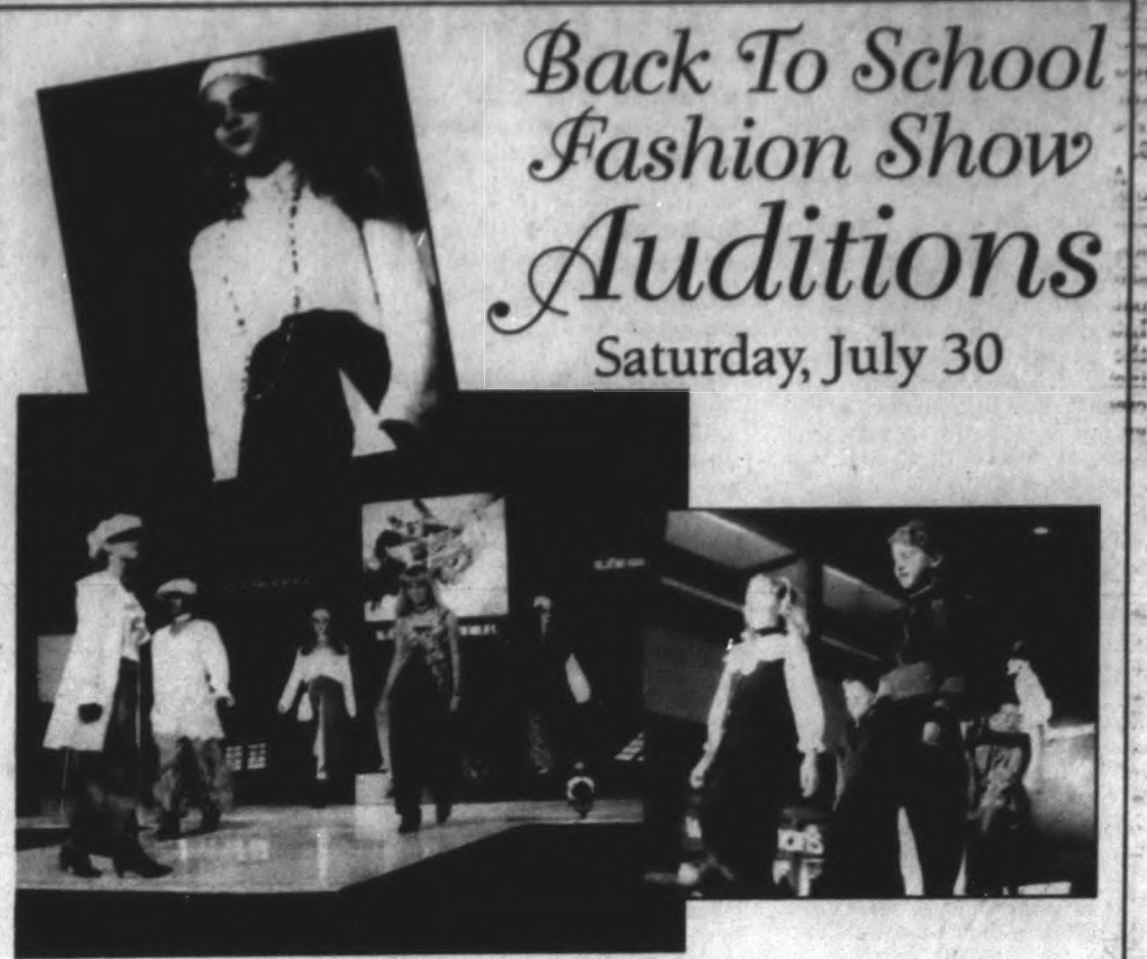

Judge declares candidacy for state Supreme Court

Washtenaw County Circuit Court Judge Donald Shelton has announced his candidacy for the Michigan Supreme Court.

Shelton, 50, is currently serving his fifth year on the Washtenaw Circuit Court bench. He is perhaps best known for his ruling a few years ago that General Motors had a legal obligation to keep its Willow Run plant open and provide jobs in exchange for the tax breaks it received from the township.

In a press release, Shelton said the Supreme Court is out of touch with ordinary people. "We need justices who have the courage to stand up to large

corporations and powerful special interest groups in favor of the rights of the people."

As a visiting judge on the Michigan Court of Appeals, Shelton was the only dissenter in the Dr. Jack Kevorkian case in which he concluded that terminally ill people have a constitutional right to physician-assisted suicide.

Shelton is a former Eastern Michigan University regent, former Saline mayor and has served on the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

He received his bachelor's degree from Western Michigan University and his law degree from the University of Michigan.

Hospital, Epilepsy Center combine for new treatment

The Epilepsy Center of Michigan and Henry Ford Health System have launched a new epilepsy treatment program to provide high quality, comprehensive care for people with epilepsy.

Under the program, medical issues will be handled by Henry Ford Health System and its team of neurologists and other health care people.

The Epilepsy Center will provide nursing assistance and handle psychological and social concerns with its team of psychologists and social workers.

Patients can receive treatment at two locations: Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit and the Epilepsy Center in Southfield.

"Both groups have an interest in developing a full-service epilepsy program for patients and their families," said Henry Ford neurologist Gregory Barkley in a press release. "This is definitely a strengthening of programs already in place at both institutions."

"Together, we can better help people with epilepsy and their families increase their quality of life," said Epilepsy Center director Ariene Gorelick in a press release. "This program also will allow the center to expand its services in the areas of family support, employment and advocacy."

The epilepsy program at Henry Ford Hospital, the largest in the state, is one of approximately 150 centers worldwide to offer surgery as an alternative treatment for patients. Among its highlights are:

- The surgical program has been able to eliminate seizures in 80

percent of patients who have received surgical treatment. More than 30 patients had surgery for epilepsy at Henry Ford Hospital in the past year.

- A team of six neurologists, with two specializing in pediatric epilepsy.
- Ten ongoing research studies to evaluate new drugs as well as research the basic mechanisms of epilepsy.
- A dedicated inpatient Epilepsy Monitoring Unit that allows physicians to evaluate detailed computer-tracked and videotaped epileptic seizures in an attempt to pinpoint specific areas of the brain responsible for seizures.
- Research studies utilizing new diagnostic techniques in Magnetic Resonance Imaging and newly developed Magnetoencephalography. MEG noninvasively tracks very weak magnetic fields that are generated by electric currents inside the brain and aids in the determination of the site for epilepsy surgery.

Epilepsy affects more than 90,000 Michigan residents. It is a common neurological disorder marked by sudden, brief changes in brain function that result in seizures of various types.

Most people with epilepsy are otherwise normal and healthy. With regular use of medication, many can live completely free of seizures.

In nearly three quarters of epilepsy cases, there is no known cause. It can strike anyone.

Of cases with a specific cause, the most frequent are the result of head trauma, brain tumor, stroke, infection and maternal injury.

The Epilepsy Center of Michigan, headquartered in Southfield, was established in 1948. It is the only statewide nonprofit organization dedicated only to epilepsy, providing medical, counseling, informational and advocacy services for people with epilepsy and their families.

Salads are refreshing on sultry summer eves

During the summer, this cook's fancy turns to salads. While hearty warm suppers are a must in the dead of winter, in July they're too much trouble. Who wants to sweat over a hot stove?

Salads are perfect. They're refreshing and quick to prepare, and with the right combination of ingredients, they're a healthy crowd-pleasing meal-in-a-dish.

For great tasting salads, choose greens that are brightly colored, crisp looking and unblemished. Store greens in a closed plastic bag in the crisper drawer of your refrigerator for up to three days unwashed. Greens will keep better unwashed, but should you wish to wash them ahead of time, roll them in paper towels to absorb moisture.

If you're in a hurry, and who isn't? here are some time-savers that work for us.

In our refrigerator there's a dish of cut vegetables including carrots, broccoli, celery and radishes. The dish is filled with water to keep the veggies crisp and cold. You can see them as soon as you open the door. The veggies are salad ready and make healthy snacks.

Good salad extenders include these items that are in just about everybody's pantry — canned water chestnuts, pineapple tidbits, olives, pickles, baby corn and tuna fish.

Lively leftovers

Every family has leftovers, and when you're considering tossing up a salad, try to take advantage of all the leftovers in your refrigerator. Cooked potatoes, a leftover grilled chicken breast, some steamed green beans and corn on the cob make for a cool addition when tossed with some bottled salad dressing spiked with a tablespoon of good mustard.

Leftover pasta, rice and beans taste better the second time around when they're tossed with Italian dressing, a fistful of fresh herbs, and chopped or steamed vegetables.

If you need something a little heartier on a rainy day, combine leftover pasta, rice, beans and vegetables with a dash of salad dressing and microwave the mixture on high for 2 to 3 minutes or until just heated through.

Grocery stores and fruit and vegetable markets are making it easier than ever for the over-heated cook to prepare cool summer salads.

You'll find salad bars that offer fixings by the pound, and packaged salads, including Caesar, shredded coleslaw, baby carrots, chopped broccoli, and even cubed, ready-to-eat fruit.

These convenience items cost more, but they're great time-savers and cheaper than eating out.

Fresh fruit and vegetable salads are always appreciated on muggy summer nights. They're easily packed into picnic baskets for nights when you want to escape the heat and dine alfresco in a cool, shady park.

Ripening fruits

Peaches, nectarines, avocados, tomatoes and mangoes are terrific in salads. Don't fret if the peaches you brought home from the store are rock hard.

Put under-ripe fruit in a closed brown paper bag at room temperature.

Avocados, mangoes, nectarines, peaches, papayas, pears and tomatoes all give off ethylene (a natural gas) which builds up in the closed bag, and helps promote ripening.

Plastic bags are not recommended for ripening fruit mainly because they retain moisture and this encourages rotting.

If you're looking for a new idea try a fresh mango. The juicy, somewhat stringy orange flesh has a sweet, melon-like flavor with nuances of tropical tastes and aromas.

A ripe mango will be soft and fragrant and benefits from an additional day or two ripening in a brown paper bag.

When the mango is ripe, cut it in half lengthwise as close as possible to the large flat pit. Pull the fruit away from the pit, as with an avocado, and slice or cube it.

Try tossing some mango into your next fruit, chicken or turkey salad. It's a luscious addition.

Fresh herbs and spices will also make your summer salad memorable. Sesame seeds and a splash of sesame oil will do wonders with leftover roast beef.

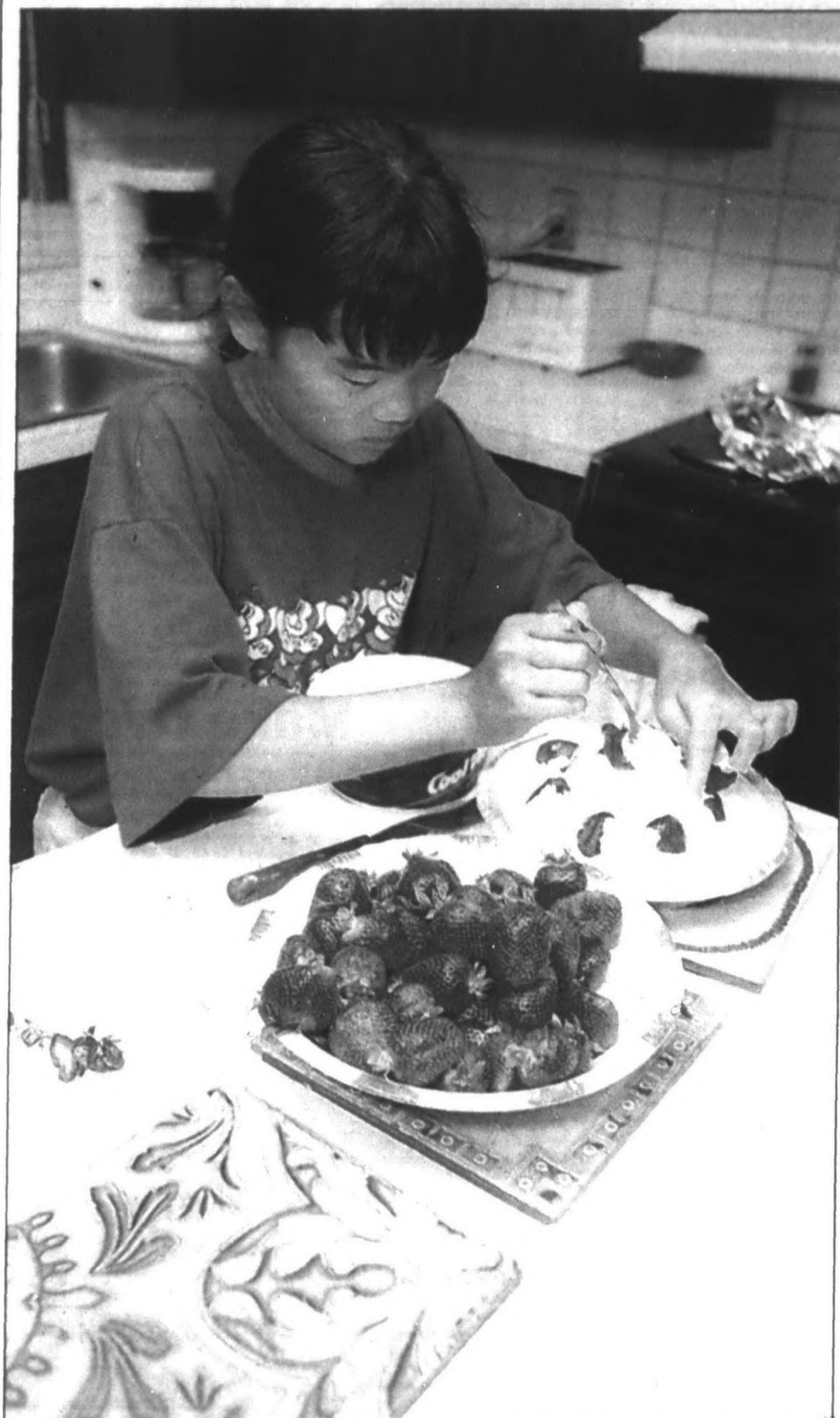

After reading a number of recipes in her mother's cookbooks, Faust selected three no-bake pie recipes to test — chocolate-peanut butter ice cream, citrus fruit pie and strawberry. She took a vote at the picnic, and the pie made with strawberries, gelatin and whipping cream was the favorite.

Marilyn Faust, Julie's mom, believes that making desserts with kids is a good way to introduce them to the kitchen. "Most of the recipes are failure-proof, and when they're done they have a reward that's appealing."

Substitute turkey to cut fat in stew

If you need a quick meal that is easy, low in fat, and great tasting, just follow this recipe.

Dorothy Couse of Bloomfield Hills serves this stew in bowls or over rice. She shops at Kroger and Felice Family Food Center. Both stores, she believes, provide the freshest produce along with fast and friendly service.

When you're preparing any dish that calls for ground beef, I always suggest substituting Turkey Store Brand 100 percent ground turkey breast. The difference in fat quantity between ground beef and ground turkey is unbelievable. Regular ground beef has 120 grams of fat per pound! Over the years Julie and her mom have worked together in the kitchen. Julie's learned the difference between a liquid measure and dry measure, and how to read a recipe.

When you're working with kids, Marilyn advises parents to "let them do the work." It may not always be as neat a project as you might like it to be, but they're learning.

"Kids at 11 years of age don't have total dexterity, so when they spill, you just say 'oh well,' and show them how to clean it up."

When it comes to working with kids in the kitchen, Marilyn Rudick of West Bloomfield is a veteran. For the past 13 years she has been teaching youngsters ages 5 to 10 as part of the Super Summer program offered by Birmingham Schools Community Education.

"In this program we need to keep kids busy all the time," said Rudick who works with about 80 students a day. Because of time restrictions, she needs to find cooking projects which do not require baking, yet allow students to participate in the project from beginning to end.

One of her most popular cooking projects is a marshmallow cat.

There really isn't a recipe to follow, because it's so simple to make.

In a small saucepan melt a cup of semi-sweet chocolate chips. Take two large marshmallows and attach them together with a toothpick in the center to make the cat's body.

Dip the marshmallows in the melted chocolate and set on a plate in the freezer for 5 to 10 minutes to set. To make the tail, use pieces of skinny licorice about 2 inches long and poke them in the back of one of the marshmallows. Then dip the ends of two candy corn pieces to the melted chocolate and add to the top marshmallow for ears. A few more pieces of licorice are used to make whiskers, and some small candy bits or icing for eyes.

"You don't always need to work with a recipe which cooks from scratch," said Rudick. "I will often use ready-made items such as frozen puff pastry and pudding to make Napoleons."

Rudick never overlooks the opportunity to use cooking as a learning tool, and has kids count the layers of frozen pastry when they go into the oven and come out.

She believes the key to cooking with kids is to keep it simple. Don't ignore a project such as dipping a plain waffle cone into melted chocolate and then rolling the cone into colored sprinkles. Rudick chooses sprinkles over nuts because some children are

allergic to nuts. The Gibson School in Redford is twice blessed. They not only offer cooking in their summer program, Kids in the Kitchen, but their class is taught by artist Paula Zaks who likes to combine the two subjects in her classroom.

In addition to teaching cooking, Zak loves to blend a recipe lesson with an art project or give the historical background of recipe to her students who range in age from 4 to 6.

"It's important for a teacher to be motivated," she said. "If the teacher or parent isn't motivated about the recipe or food lesson, then the students won't be either. Kids can do anything, but they need assistance."

When working with children ages 4 to 6, Zaks, like Rudick keeps things simple. She likes to improvise standard cooking projects such as Fruit Loop necklaces. Zaks will string dried fruits including raisins, apples and apricots on a piece of dental floss to make a necklace.

Zak suggests investing in a good children's cookbook. When selecting books for young cooks, look for ones printed in large type.

After a few summer experiments, cooking will be a positive and fun experience for your child. As you experiment with recipes, you might want to copy them for future reference.

CINNAMON CREAM CHICKEN FRUIT SALAD

- Dressing:
 - 1/2 cup light sour cream
 - 1/4 cup apple juice
 - 1 tablespoon sugar or honey
 - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- Dash salt
- Salad:
 - 6 ounces (2 1/2 cups) uncooked spiral pasta or shells
 - 2 1/2 cups cubed cooked chicken
 - 1 cup sliced strawberries
 - 2 plums, sliced (about 1 cup)
 - 1/2 cup seedless red grapes
 - 1/2 cup seedless green grapes
 - 1 small red onion, sliced thin

- 1/4 pound lean top sirloin steak (about 1-inch thick)
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper
- 4 cups romaine lettuce
- 4 cups tom savoy cabbage
- 1 medium red bell pepper, cut into strips
- 1 small cucumber, seeded and cut into strips
- 1 cup fresh sugar snap peas
- Dressing:
 - 1 tablespoon oil
 - 1/4 cup sliced green onions
 - 2 teaspoons sesame seeds
 - 1/2 cup red wine vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons hoisin sauce
 - 2 teaspoons sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon crushed hot red pepper flakes

Heat a grill and cook top sirloin to desired doneness. Slice into strips and keep warm.

Meanwhile, in a large salad bowl, combine remaining salad ingredients. Toss to mix.

To prepare dressing, heat oil in a medium skillet over medium heat. Add onions and sesame seed; cook 2 minutes. Add remaining dressing ingredients. Pour warm dressing

over the salad mixture. Add beef and toss to coat. Best if served warm, but it's also tasty served chilled. Serves 8. Each 1 1/4 cup serving has 110 calories.

MINTED COUSCOUS VEGETABLE SALAD

- Salad:
 - 1 cup uncooked couscous
 - 2 cups frozen baby peas, thawed and drained
 - 1 1/2 cups diced fresh tomatoes
 - 1/2 cup diced red onion
 - 1/2 cup diced celery
- Dressing:
 - 2 tablespoons fresh chopped mint leaves
 - 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Dash salt and pepper

Cook couscous as directed on package. Cool. In a large bowl, combine all salad ingredients. Toss to mix well. Cover and refrigerate while preparing the dressing.

In a jar with a tight fitting lid, combine all dressing ingredients; shake well. Pour over salad and toss to coat.

If desired, line the bowl with salad greens and garnish with fresh mint leaves, if desired. Makes 11 (1/4 cup) servings. Each serving is 110 calories.

- 1 (10 ounce) package frozen, sweetened strawberries in quick-thaw pouch

Combine gelatin and boiling water in glass measuring cup. Stir with mixing spoon until gelatin is dissolved.

Pour into electric blender. Add lemon juice and pineapple chunks with their juice. Peel banana and cut into chunks with a table knife. Add to blender.

Put lid on blender. Turn on high speed. Blend ingredients until they are liquefied, about 45 seconds. Turn off blender.

Remove container from base of blender. Remove lid from blender and pour mixture into 11 by 7-inch baking pan or individual plastic containers (may be an ice cube tray) with wood, paper, or plastic dessert sticks.

Place pan directly on shelf in freezer. Freeze uncovered for 2 to 3 hours, or until mixture is firm.

Defrost strawberries in pouch according to package instructions (this usually takes about 15 to 20 minutes in warm water.)

Remove sherbet from freezer 15 minutes before serving to soften slightly. Scoop or spoon sherbet into 4 dessert dishes. Top each serving with 1/4 cup strawberries in juice. Serve immediately.

lean ground beef has 90 grams of fat per pound.

Dorothy Couse suggests using beans as a substitute for meat. The beans also supply additional protein to the dish. If it's too hot to cook, toss up a pasta salad and add beans to turn this side dish into a main course.

Other low-fat alternatives to high fat foods include rice, yams,

raisins and dried fruit morsels. One quick word of advice regarding salad bars. Most of us think of cottage cheese as being low-fat, but the cottage cheese offered at salad bars is usually the "regular" kind. There is approximately 5 grams of fat per 1/4 cup.

So, remember to read your labels carefully to make wise choices.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. C-94-06 CHAPTER 27 PLUMBING CODE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 27 TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADOPTION, BY REFERENCE OF THE BOCA NATIONAL PLUMBING CODE, 9TH EDITION, 1993, AS PUBLISHED BY THE BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS INTERNATIONAL, INC., AS THE PLUMBING CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP TO PROVIDE FOR STANDARDS GOVERNING THE DESIGN, INSTALLATION AND CONSTRUCTION OF PLUMBING SYSTEMS BY PROVIDING REASONABLE SAFEGUARDS FOR SANITATION TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AGAINST THE HAZARDS OF INADEQUATE, DEFECTIVE OR UNSANITARY PLUMBING INSTALLATIONS; TO PROVIDE FOR PRINTED COPIES OF THE BOCA NATIONAL PLUMBING CODE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY THE PUBLIC AT THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT DURING REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS; TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES; TO PROVIDE FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY; TO PROVIDE FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND TO PROVIDE FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 27, the Charter Township of Plymouth Plumbing Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

27.010 Adoption of Code. The BOCA National Plumbing Code, 9th Edition, 1993, as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc., is adopted by reference as the Plumbing Code of the Township governing the design, installation and construction of plumbing systems by providing reasonable safeguards for sanitation to protect the public health against the hazards of inadequate, defective or insanitary plumbing installations. Printed copies of the BOCA National Plumbing Code are available for inspection by the public at the Building Department during regular business hours. Additions, insertions, deletions and changes, if any, to the National Plumbing Code are prescribed in Section 27.020, et seq. of this Ordinance.

27.020 Changes in Code. The following sections and subsections of the National Plumbing Code are hereby amended as set forth below. Subsequent section numbers used in this Chapter shall refer to the like numbered sections of the BOCA National Plumbing Code.

P-101.1 Section amended to insert "Charter Township of Plymouth" for name of jurisdiction.

P-104.1 Section deleted.

P-112.2 Section amended to read as follows:

P-112.2 Fee Schedule. The permit fees for all plumbing work shall be as established by resolution of the Township Board. All fees shall be paid at the time of application to the Township Treasurer or in such other manner as the Township Supervisor shall direct.

P-116.4 Section amended to read:

P-116.4 Penalties. Any person who shall violate a provision of this Code or who shall fail to comply with any of the requirements of the Code or who shall install plumbing work in violation of an approved plan or directive of the plumbing official or of the permit or certificate issued under the provisions of this Code shall suffer penalties as prescribed in Chapter 1 of the Township Code.

P-117.2 Section amended to read:

P-117.2 Unlawful Continuance. Any person who shall continue any plumbing work in or about the structure after having been served with a stop work order, except such work as that person is directed to perform to remove a violation or unsafe condition, may be liable for penalties as prescribed in Chapter 1 of the Township Code.

P-304.3 Section amended to read:

P-304.3 Public Systems Available. A public water supply and/or public sewer system shall be deemed available to a building when the building is located within such limits as are established by resolution of the Township Board.

P-309.4 Section amended to read:

P-309.4 Freezing. Water service piping shall be installed below record frost penetration but not less than five feet below grade. Plumbing piping in exterior building walls or areas subject to freezing temperatures shall be protected against freezing by insulation or heat or both.

P-309.5 Section amended to read:

P-309.5 Sewer Depth. Building sewers that connect to private sewage disposal systems shall be a minimum of 42 inches below finished grade at the point of septic tank connection. Building sewers shall be a minimum of 42 inches below grade.

SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY.

Any person, corporation, partnership or any other legal entity who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or any of the regulations adopted in pursuance thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or imprisoned not more than ninety (90) days, or both, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 3. REPEAL.

All other Ordinances and parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such inconsistencies, hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.

If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or part of the Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provision not have been included in this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

The repeal provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any ending fee, assessment, litigation or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance is to be given immediate effect upon publication as required by law.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 20, BUILDING CODE, PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE BOCA NATIONAL BUILDING CODE, TWELFTH EDITION, 1993, AS PUBLISHED BY THE BUILDING OFFICIALS AND CODE ADMINISTRATORS INTERNATIONAL, INC., AS THE BUILDING CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP GOVERNING THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, REPAIR, DEMOLITION, REMOVAL, MOVING, MAINTENANCE AND USE OF ALL BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES AND TO PROVIDE FOR PRINTED COPIES OF THE BOCA NATIONAL BUILDING CODE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION BY THE PUBLIC AT THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT DURING BUSINESS HOURS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 20 of the Charter Township of Plymouth's Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

20.010 Adoption of Code. The BOCA National Building Code, Twelfth Edition, 1993, as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. is adopted by reference (with the additions, insertions, deletions and changes, if any, prescribed in Section 20.020, et seq. of this Ordinance) as the Building Code of the Township, governing the design, construction, alteration, repair, demolition, removal, moving, maintenance and use of all buildings and structures. Printed copies of the BOCA National Building Code are available for inspection by the public at the Building Department during business hours.

20.020 Changes in Code. The following sections and subsections of the BOCA National Building Code are hereby amended or deleted as set forth and additional sections and subsections are added as indicated hereafter. Subsequent section numbers used in this Chapter shall refer to like numbered sections of the BOCA National Building Code.

101.1 Title. These regulations shall be known as the Building Code of the Charter Township of Plymouth (hereinafter referred to as "the Code").

104.1 Section amended to read:

104.1 Building Official. The Township Department of Building and Code Enforcement shall administer and enforce the Code and the administrative official in charge of the department shall be known as the Building Official.

104.2 Section amended to read:

104.2 Appointment. The Building Official shall be appointed and may be removed with or without cause and with or without notice by the Township Supervisor with approval of the Township Board.

104.3 Section amended to read:

104.3 Organization. Any inspectors or other employees of the Department of Building and Code Enforcement as shall be necessary for the administration of this Code shall be appointed and may be removed with or without cause and with or without notice by the Township Supervisor with the approval of the Township Board.

104.4 Section amended to read:

104.4 Deputy. A Deputy Building Official who shall exercise all powers of the Building Official may be appointed and may be removed with or without cause and with or without notice by the Township Supervisor with the approval of the Township Board.

104.7 Section added to read:

104.7 Reports. The Building Official and members of the staff of the Department of Building and Code Enforcement shall make such reports and engage in such work as the Township Supervisor or the Township Board may from time to time direct or request. The Building Official shall report and be responsible for the administration of the Department to the Township Board through the Township Supervisor.

105.6 Section added to read:

105.6 Upon preparation of a rule or regulation by the Building Official, the proposed rule or regulation shall be posted in the Township Hall for four weeks and shall be submitted at the next regular meeting of the Township Board occurring after said four week period at which meeting the public shall be heard concerning the proposed rule or regulation. Upon approval of the proposed rule or regulation by the Township Board, the rule shall be published in the same manner as Township Ordinances and shall take effect upon publication.

112.2.1 Section amended to read:

112.2.1 Fee Schedule. A fee for each plan, examination, building permit, bond and inspection shall be established and may be changed from time to time by resolution of the Township Board. All fees shall be paid at the time of application to the Township Treasurer or in such other manner as the Township Supervisor shall direct.

— bukimi 3



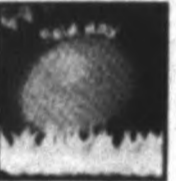
The trip through "Wonderful" by Detroit-based bukimi 3 rides like a rollercoaster. A sampled voice over heavy drum beats kicks off the CD proclaiming " . . . we're going to have a wonderful time together. Today we're going to move in rhythm to music." You might expect a hypnotic heavy dance track to follow, however, what we get is a cliché rave sample.

The rest of the release is filled with light-hearted synthesizer pop reminiscent of early Depeche Mode, Ministry and Erasure. Steve Sholtes' vocals sound so much like Depeche Mode's Martin Gore that it's hard to see what bukimi 3 itself has to offer.

This 10-song release by the Novi-based Oriental Spas is a "journey through life, loss, sin and death," according to its press materials. The "pain" that is supposed to be felt here isn't convincing though. Vocalist Laura Ruby forces her quivering, raw vocals to sound pained which strips the songs of their emotions.

The opposite is true for her band's rocked-out version of Tori Amos's song "Crucify." Ruby holds back on the vocals but they get lost in the swirling guitars.

"Pain" is by no means a bad album. The funky groove of "Big Book" is one of the highlights of the release. The guitars that kick off "My God Is Dead Now" rivals anything you'd hear on rock radio.

Pink Floyd at the Pontiac Silverdome

Pink Floyd once again proved that their ethereal classic rock is timeless. Packed with laser beams, endless hit songs, and one animated percussionist, Pink Floyd showed a new generation what their music is all about.

Primarily filled with "twentysomething" fans who weren't even born when the band released its first album, Pink Floyd's July 15 show at the Pontiac Silverdome was, ironically, a learning experience for fans. By performing in front of a young crowd, Pink Floyd reinforced its position as one of the chief influences of this generation's musicians.

Musics hits the 'super highway'

■ Gone are the days when music fans relied on magazines and cable TV for information about their favorite acts. Now, via on-line computer services, fans can get the news about bands from record companies or other users.

Since last fall music fans have been able to plug directly into record companies via on-line computer services to get whatever kind of information they wanted about their favorite bands.

As expected, the response was tremendously successful. What they didn't anticipate was the positive psychological effect it would have. When Nirvana singer Kurt Cobain committed suicide in April, distraught fans instantly linked up to form cyber-group therapy sessions.

One member of CompuServe wrote "I'm so sad about Kurt. I don't know what to say. I own just about every Nirvana song and bootleg. At least those will always live on, but I guess, I just don't understand . . . I hope he rests in peace and his family is able to carry on. You touched my life Kurt, and I appreciate it."

Others were less compassionate: "So I guess I didn't realize the profound effect on the American recording public of recycled Replacement riffs, Killing Joke copies and hokey adolescent angst. Sorry."

Nonetheless, group conferences and public postings provided an outlet for teens who may have been dealing with death for the first time. Cobain's death was a tragedy, but it helped accomplish the basic goal the record companies set when initially going on-line — to get closer to the fans.

"People have used on-line services for a long time to dial up and get information for just about anything," said Robert von Goeben, one of the managers of the Geffen section on CompuServe's Music Vendor Forum. "It only seemed natural that people dial up and get information about record companies as well."

Luke Wood, director of marketing for Geffen Records, added: "One thing is that it's a truly democratic means of communication between fans and labels."

New 'addresses'

Besides Geffen, users can receive tour schedules, facts about the South by Southwest Music Conference and musicians, their releases and lyrics from RCA and Warner Bros on CompuServe.

Labels like Rounder, Astralwerks, and PolyGram records as well as MTV have addresses on the Internet. Cyberden BBS links together fans of Cleopatra Records acts, hard rock band ChemLab and those who prefer industrial, gothic, techno, ambient, noise and experimental music. Soundbites from Astralwerks groups are also available in the Cyberden.

Sometimes, members can "talk" with artists like X, Depeche Mode and Peter Gabriel who have participated in on-line interviews. On other services, they can leave electronic

mail for staff members or bands. The technology makes sending fan letters to P.O. boxes look prehistoric.

"It's changed from where you were uncool if you have a computer to where you're uncool if you don't," said Wood, who has addresses on CompuServe and the Internet.

A few musicians have found it so intriguing that they answer mail on a regular basis. Sonic Youth's Thurston Moore signs on to CompuServe when he's not on tour. Toad the Wet Sprocket makes its address available to members of its fan club. Billy Idol had an Internet address but the volume of mail was so great that he was forced to cancel his account.

On the boards, users can talk about any genre of music from classical to punk rock, or about a specific band.

"You don't have to talk about music or alternative music (in general). You can talk about Sonic Youth — you can get that specific — or even an aspect of a specific band like Sonic Youth lyrics. You can't get more specific than that," von Goeben said.

More specific is what Gary Gilmore of Dearborn wants. A guitar technician for the English band Bad Company, he has tapped into the Internet super highway through O&E On-Line to communicate with crew members in Phoenix, Atlanta and England about scheduling and upcoming tours.

Others have used the service to download music titles and lyrics and album covers. One user has collected more than 300 music titles he's found on On-Line. A popular Internet site is MTV (mtv.com) by Adam Curry, an MTV video jockey. It has music news and Curry's daily "Cyberleaze" celebrity report. It can be accessed through O&E On-Line.

Most record companies don't have accounts with Prodigy, but the service brings in special guests like Chris Cornell of Soundgarden, Rob Zombie of White Zombies, Neil Peart of Rush, and Nick Rhodes of Duran Duran, to answer a select number of

questions sent electronically from subscribers.

Twofold benefit

It's a twofold benefit. For fans it's a dream of a lifetime to get mail from their idols. For record companies, it can be profitable, especially for up-and-coming bands like Geffen's Weezer, or RCA's Lisa Loeb and Nine Stories.

"The promotional aspects of this are considerable; it's a modern-day, electronic version of the radio call-in show or in-store record signing," said Lisa Robinson, Prodigy's Music Bulletin Board leader.

Laurie Chakel, 14, of Livonia, hasn't been lucky enough to have her questions answered from musicians, but she has learned a lot about music from other fans. Music fans from around the United States post notes about concerts they've seen, import or bootleg tapes they found, or musicians they met.

Bands like Nirvana, the Violent Femmes, and the Meat Puppets have become some of her favorite bands as a result of reading about them. Chakel said that public postings about bands from regular fans gives her a better idea of what a band is about than if she watched MTV or listened to the radio.

"With Prodigy, it's more interactive, definitely; you can type questions. With radio and TV you can call them up but it doesn't work. It's more fans talking about bands," she said.

Reaching out

Last September, PolyGram took a different angle with bulletin boards. In an effort to reach out to younger fans, Davitt Sigerson, a now former president of a division of PolyGram, created a computer bulletin board and accompanying newspaper called "Bark."

"He conceived the idea as an alternative to reach out to people who are in high school as an alternative to the usual avenues," said editor Parker Reilly who formerly worked for Cosmopolitan magazine. "If you're selling to teens which is what our company is doing, it's relevant to know a lot about them. You're supposed to know your customers so you can sell to them."

The newsletter is written and illustrated entirely by students, including contributor Christen Kinsler of Sterling Heights, and distributed to 9,000 high schools nationwide. In a recent issue, students discuss topics like the death of Cobain, music, homosexuality, African-American issues, witchcraft, fashion, fast-food restaurants and favorite hangouts.

The newspaper, which is received by about 384 Michigan high schools, sometimes picks up material written on the BBS. Most of the time, the bulletin board serves as a library containing students' works.

"It's a place where we can make available much more writing than we can fit in eight pages," Parker said about the BBS.

In the future, Parker said, soundbites from PolyGram albums will be available.

Late last month, Geffen Records took on-line information a step further when it became the first major label to enable CompuServe members to download for free a previously unreleased track from Aerosmith called "Head First." The rock band waived their royalties for the song and CompuServe waived connect-time charges.

"If our fans are out there driving down that information superhighway," Aerosmith's Steven Tyler said in a statement to the press, "then we want to be playing at the truck stop. This is the future — so let's get it going."

'Forrest Gump' falls short of a classic

"Forrest Gump," about a man with a low IQ who reaches amazing heights, is an epic treatment of an old Frank Capra aesthetic: Even the under-average Joe can make it in America, if he follows the basic Boy Scout principles of truth and stick-to-itiveness.

The sentiment almost works. Depending on your tolerance for sap, this most manipulative movie of the year may actually have you grabbing for a Kleenex box. It plays at the Main and Maple theaters among others.

Tom Hanks, fresh from winning an Academy Award for "Philadelphia," plays the title character, the kind of part that usually catches Oscar's eye. He's the Alabama-based simpleton, IQ 75, who starts his life with a spinal disorder and a very caring mother (Sally Field). She'll do anything, including sleep with the school superintendent, for her boy to get the same chances as others.

Because of the heavy metal braces on his legs, Forrest is taunted by the other boys. During one of his attempts to escape from them, the braces shatter and he runs and runs and runs, and doesn't stop. The denizens of the local barber shop call him "a running fool."

His athletic prowess lands him a football scholarship; his ability to follow orders and perform menial tasks makes him the ideal soldier in Vietnam. The movie spans the decades from the 1960s through the '80s, so Forrest is seen meeting (through special effects and archival footage) Presidents Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon along with John Lennon and George Wallace. The gimmick was handled much better in Woody Allen's "Zelig."

All the while Forrest keeps pining away for Jenny, the childhood sweetheart who becomes a folk singer, go-go dancer, hippy, political activist, disco queen and waitress. Between the two of them, Forrest and Jenny follow every conceivable path the Baby Boom generation might have taken. With the help of pop music snippets (it seems like well over 100 tunes are used in the film), the movie plays like an MTV documentary about the past three decades.

Let's put it this way: if the filmmakers could have figured a way to get Forrest out to Woodstock, they would have. In a rather ghoulish take on

nostalgia, director Robert Zemeckis focuses on assassinations to strike the proper chord of "where were you when." Strangely, while the movie tries to remain politically correct, it never even mentions Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

This isn't all that's missing. Although the movie runs well over two hours, Forrest is still nothing more than a goofy Everyman symbol by film's end. Of course, "Forrest Gump" is a comedy, though true laughs are few from the usually funny Zemeckis, who launched the "Back to the Future" movies and "Who Framed Roger Rabbit?" among others.

There are clever flights of whimsy, like the blink-and-you'll-miss-it flashback to the ancestors of Lt. Dan (Gary Sinise), Forrest's Vietnam commander, who has the dubious distinction of having relatives who died in each American-involved war. Each soldier falls back dead, identified by his uniform.

The interpolation of Forrest with now-deceased historical figures, though clever from a technical standpoint, loses any charm when words are clumsily inserted into their mouths. When Forrest and John Lennon appear together on the Dick Cavett show, there's some silly dialogue that mirrors

the words of "Imagine." The bit with Lyndon Johnson is even more embarrassing.

"Forrest Gump" does make some grand use of the wide screen, from the harrowing scenes in Vietnam to dreamy dusk-and-dawn shots of the rambling white-painted Gump home on the banks of an Alabama river. Strangely enough, an 8,000-acre plantation in South Carolina served both settings.

There's also fine acting here, not only from Hanks, but from Sally Field, who ages convincingly even when Forrest doesn't. Robin Wright's Jenny undergoes her own amazing transformation, including some unattractive turns as a prostitute.

With its epic scope and universal message about "making the best of what the good Lord gave you," "Forrest Gump" struggles hard to be recognized as a movie classic. But how clever can a movie be when, more than once, audience members vocally anticipate the next line of dialogue?

For The Offspring: Alone is way to go

Dexter Holland, vocalist and guitarist for the punk rock band The Offspring, is a little groggy having just woken up. For that reason, we'll have to forgive him for spewing the understatement of the year.

"Our tour's going really good; all the shows have been sold out. We're pretty big, huh?" he asked over the phone.

With its surf-rock guitar licks and hook-laden chorus, The Offspring's single "Come Out and Play (Keep 'Em Separated)" has become a huge radio and video hit for the Southern California-based band. Their album "Smash," positioned at No. 20 on the Billboard charts, is the top-selling album of all time for the independent label Epitaph Records, owned by Bad Religion guitarist Brett Gurewitz.

Once appealing predominately to punks and skateboarders, The Offspring is now getting the attention of major record labels. The quartet has turned down all the offers choosing to stay staunchly independent.

"We told them (major record labels) that we didn't want to do

that," he said. "Maybe we won't stay there (Epitaph) for 10 years. We may outgrow them or they might outgrow us. We started the record with Epitaph and we plan on finishing it with Epitaph."

Other than record deals, The Offspring turned down a spot opening for the Stone Temple Pilots during their summer tour of arenas.

"We didn't want to jump into arenas just because something's on the radio. We're doing what we're capable of doing alone on tour," Holland explained.

Touring with the Stone Temple Pilots and signing with a major record label means "overexposure" to The Offspring. They would rather stay relatively unknown.

"For us, it's not about having a hit, being on the radio, or being 'successful.' We're a punk rock band. For us it's about putting out music we like playing."

The Offspring and special guest Big Drill Car play an all-ages show at St. Andrew's Hall, 431 E. Congress, Detroit, at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 3. Tickets are \$7.50 in advance. For more information, call (313) 961-MELT.

Fighting the current

Wheelchair-bound no more, Morrison battles back

Bryan Morrison went to a movie in Westland last November, but was turned away at the door.

It had nothing to do with his age, rather a flight of stairs.

With no ramp or elevator for the handicapped, Morrison knew his odds of making it while sitting in a wheelchair were pretty steep.

"I had no way to get in because the show was upstairs," said Morrison, a former all-state swimmer who graduated in 1992 from Livonia Stevenson. "They told me to call before I leave home next time so they can let me know what's playing downstairs."

Morrison has been busy ever since writing his own script on how to recover from a neck injury that not only threatened his life but had doctors wondering if he'd ever walk again.

Morrison, a member of the Michigan State University swimming team in the 1992-93 school year, broke the fifth and sixth vertebrae in his neck after diving into surf off the coast of

France last summer.

For several months the wheelchair was his best transportation. Paralyzed from the neck down immediately following his injury, Morrison has slowly regained movement and is

walking with a limp on his left side.

Morrison is still considered a paraplegic because of lack of motion in his left hand. He also has trouble walking, but his progress has been nothing short of amazing.

After spending four months at a world renowned hospital for spinal chord victims in Denver, Colo., Morrison returned to work on an engineering degree at Michigan State University last semester.

He has been busier than most students this summer, starting his day at 7 a.m. and returning at 7 p.m.

Morrison swims twice a day at the Botsford Pool in Livonia, and in between works four hours as a research analyst in Southfield.

One of Morrison's companions in the Botsford Pool is his cousin Matt McCowan, who says he wins some of their races. Morrison isn't embarrassed about losing to the 9-year-old.

"I'm slower than I'd like to be, but at least I'm swimming again," Morrison said.

After his afternoon swim, Morrison heads over to the Livonia YMCA to lift weights. Morrison doesn't need the wheelchair anymore but the thought of using one will never leave

his mind. "You don't realize how much handicapped people are put down until you try to go places in wheelchairs and can't do it," he said. "I plan on walking without a limp. For the most part it's in my hands. It depends how much I want to do it."

Helpless feeling

Morrison was vacationing in France with friend Kamp Purdy of West Bloomfield, an MSU swimmer, when the accident happened around 2 a.m. June 17, 1993.

Morrison said he doesn't remember anything three to four hours before the accident and anything a week after the accident.

His mother Bonnie Morrison remembers getting the phone call about the bad news, then after the flight overseas, seeing her son lying helplessly on a hospital bed.

Morrison, 6-foot-5 and 206 pounds before the accident, had about as much control of his body as a new-born baby.

"Can you even imagine going to France and seeing the unbelievable trauma he was going through, his body shaking uncontrollably?" his mother said. "His

eyes were so red I didn't even know who he was. And today, he's so normal. Every time someone calls and asks about it I have to cry."

Doctors took a bone from Morrison's hip and fused it in surgery with his fifth and sixth vertebrae, which were shattered.

Morrison didn't suffer any lasting head injuries and he remained in the hospital 31 days before being transported home on an airplane.

The Morrison family had to pay for eight seats to fit Bryan in a horizontal position on the flight home.

Morrison spent a month at University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor before being taken to Denver for continued rehabilitation at Craig Hospital.

Morrison's weight dipped to about 160 pounds, but he's back up to 185 pounds with his ambitious regimen.

His Christmas present was being with the MSU swim team on the Christmas Training trip to Coral Springs, Fla. He'd always try to be in the stands cheering on his former teammates last season.

"Just his recovery in general surprised us," said Alec Mull, co-captain from Lansing Eastman and Morrison's former roommate. "He was so close to dying and now he's up, walking around. He was a hard worker, but bad things always seem to happen to good people. He's one of those people that will go out of his way for you."

On the job

When he returned from MSU this spring, Morrison was hired at Chrysler Service Contracts, where his mother works.

"My boss is so happy with him," Bonnie said. "The first day on the job he was able to accomplish some research that three others hired before him were unable to do."

Morrison's biggest problem has been typing with his left hand.

"I use my whole right hand and whatever I can with my left," he said. "I just peck at it."

Come to think of it, a lot of people with two healthy hands use the hunt and peck method.

Driving isn't a problem, since his right leg is near its normal strength. Morrison said he has a

handicapped sticker in his car but usually avoids parking in handicapped spots "so people who need them more can use them."

When at home in Livonia, where he stays with his uncle and aunt Jack and Carol Gatewood, Morrison does his share of chores.

He also acts as the family's personal trainer, outlining the workouts on the treadmill and stretching exercises in the basement.

"Since the injury, Bryan's become more outgoing and driven, and does lots of errands," Carol Gatewood said. "Last week, we were going out of town, going to be real busy, and Bryan took care of the pool for us. He makes my husband's lunch every day, grills chicken, eats up fresh vegetables,

because he wants to make sure everyone's eating right. He really does pitch in."

Morrison said sometimes he has to remind himself his left leg isn't moving in sync with the right at home.

"I have to remember to hold on to the hand rail (going downstairs)," he said. "My left leg forgets to go."

Almost unbelievably and just as tragically, one of Morrison's roommates last semester at MSU, Ryan O'Donnell, was injured critically earlier this month in a car accident. Morrison feels a lot like his friends felt for him a year ago.

"A lot of people just give up," Morrison said. "I'm going to make sure he doesn't."

Subdue injuries with prevention

What's a bowler to do when the aches and pains make it less than fun to go bowling? Dr. Warren Schildberg of Garden City has the answers.

He is a sports medicine specialist who has worked with many of the area's top keepers, some of whom have credited him with their ability to be competitive bowlers again after suffering various physical setbacks.

Among those are Livonia's Mary Mohaci and Bill Funke, Lee Snow of Farmington Hills and Tom Relich, an all-star from Garden City.

My name is added to the list after foolishly trying to play some softball earlier this season. According to Dr. Schildberg, "Bowlers should be aware of any possible injuries that can effect performance on the lanes."

Of utmost importance is the prevention of injuries, followed by the correct treatment should an injury occur.

The smart bowler, or person engaged in any other sports activity, would take measures to prevent injuries before they happen. According to Schildberg, pre-season conditioning is vital.

Work on strength, balance, flexibility and endurance. The training must be Sport Specific, that is, to work on those muscles that are used in bowling rather than, say, football, skating or tennis.

The key to good training is Neuro Muscular Training, also known as practice.

Be very careful not to overtrain as this could be detrimental.

"Do not use any body part in excess of its capacity," Dr. Schildberg said.

It is also known as the "SAID" Principle: Specific Adaptation to Individual Demand. When you exceed this rule, you usually get an injury.

For bowlers, each body part is involved starting with the fingers as they are most susceptible to injury from over-practice.

Blisters, abrasions, sprains, strains and tendinitis may occur if you overdo it. Next, the wrist has several tendons which can be abused or over-used, particularly by the cranks. Forearms are susceptible to muscle strains and the elbow can develop tendinitis.

Not to be confused with "tennis elbow" it is "bowler's elbow."

Shoulders are not usually effected by the bowling delivery.

Lower back pain is something else, as it can develop in all people engaged in just about any activity. Another potential trouble spot is the knee.

The non-dominant side can develop tendinitis, pulled ligaments or cartilage problems. Any of these will really mess up your game, and in many instances knee problems can be traced to previous activities from other sports, especially damaged ligaments.

So in dealing with any of these problems, proper diagnosis is important for the way to handle aches and pains from bowling or any other sport.

It is vital that an accurate diagnosis is made so the proper therapy can be applied. There are two basic forms of treatment: conservative and radical or surgical.

Conservative means getting relative rest or off-loading the effected body part.

Medication generally involves use of SAID's such as motrin or

aspirin. Therapy would include use of ice packs, compression, elevation support and modalities that include massage, acupuncture, high volts, and ultrasound treatments.

Now, you ask, "When am I ready to go back into competition?"

This is where bowlers must be sure they are ready so that he or she is not re-injured. The healing process should have been at least 90 percent prior to re-entering the game.

It all sums up to asking, "What do I do if it hurts?"

Bear in mind that 90 percent of injuries can be cared for adequately by simply using ice packs four times a day, 20 minutes at a time.

Always use a towel between ice and skin to prevent "ice burn" and then begin a slow load return to practice.

In bowling, we can have a little fun or a whole lot of fun, but overdoing it could mean risking an injury and that wouldn't be any fun at all.

Dr. Schildberg also recommends the use of mental imaging to enhance your game. It is something that top competitors do all-most automatically.

Simply draw a picture in your mind of yourself delivering a perfect strike. Do this 10 times before going to sleep and again when you wake up. It will help your bowling and result in higher scores. It may take a while to develop this technique, but it works.



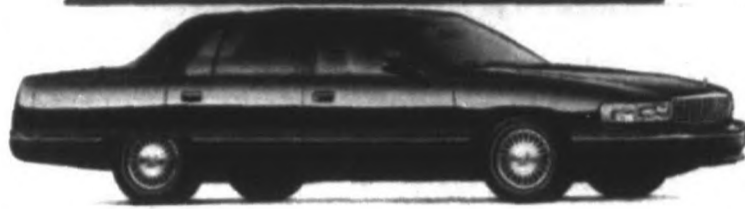

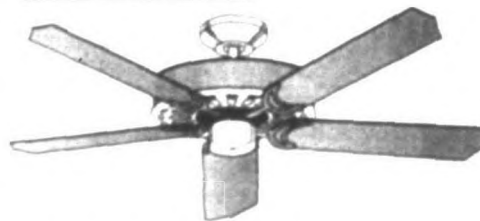

'Waikiki' draws Cheryl Ladd back to network series TV

Former "Charlie's Angels" cast member Cheryl Ladd makes her return to series television after a 13-year hiatus in "One West Waikiki," premiering Thursday, Aug. 4, on CBS.

Ladd has kept busy over the past few years working in made-for-TV movies such as "Dead Before Dawn" and "Broken Promises: Taking Emily Back," feature films such as "Lisa" and "Poison Ivy."

Her decision to return to series TV came about when her husband, producer Brian Russell, who is serving as executive producer for the show, handed her the script for the pilot of "One West Waikiki."

"It's kind of like a combination of 'Quincy,' 'Magnum P.I.' and 'Moonlighting,'" Ladd says.

She was so intrigued with the possibilities the show offered, she reversed her mind-set against doing a series.

"I had been telling (my husband) that I didn't want to do a series for the longest time," Ladd states. "He said 'I really think you should check this one out.' So I read it and was

fascinated by the character and the show's idea.

"On top of all that, I thought, 'Not only was it a great script, but it's filmed in Hawaii.' So the decision became an easy one."

In the show, Ladd portrays medical examiner Dr. Dawn "Holli" Holliday ("And I love her name, too, Doc Holliday," Ladd jokes).

Ladd admits to having more than a passing interest in the field of forensic pathology.

"With everything that's going on in the news today," she says referring to the O.J. Simpson murder case, "it's just fascinating to see the kind of role forensics plays in the solution of a crime."

Sent to Hawaii to deliver a speech at a forensics seminar, Holli encounters a homicide involving an old flame (Doug Barr).

When she goes to the local police, she encounters roughneck, renegade detective Lt. Mack Wolfe (Richard Burgi).

Mack recently came off departmental probation following an investigation where he was framed to look like he had killed

innocent people. He supplements his income as a detective by doing everything from selling toothbrushes to lounge singing.

In one scene, Mack jumps a fellow police officer who is following him and asks the bewildered officer at gunpoint:

"Have they told you some of the names they call me around the office? Like Mortuary Man and Lead Head and Trigger Mortis? Is there anybody who'll miss you if you disappeared for a long time?"

"I got a wife and three kids, man. And a dog!" his hapless victim replies.

"Well if you're as reckless with their future as you are with your own," Mack growls, "your wife's gonna be a bag lady, and your kids are gonna be eating recycled tacos. Have you even got insurance?"

"No," is the reply. "Really?" Mack croons. "How'd you like to buy some homelife? Or I can get you into a really nice term package for very little down..."

The show moves along quickly, due largely to the on-screen chemistry between Ladd and Burgi, stirring up a sexual tension between the two principal characters reminiscent of "Moonlighting."

"I'm not going to say they'll never get together," Ladd intimates. "But, for the show's sake, it's a lot more interesting if they maintain the kind of relationship they have in the pilot at least for a little while. Kind of a mutual respect and admiration, bordering on an attraction."

CBS will couple the two-hour premiere of "One West Waikiki" with the debut another "sunshine" show, "Motel Malibu." It stars Joanna Cassidy as the widowed proprietor of a hotel who would sacrifice everything to keep it in business.

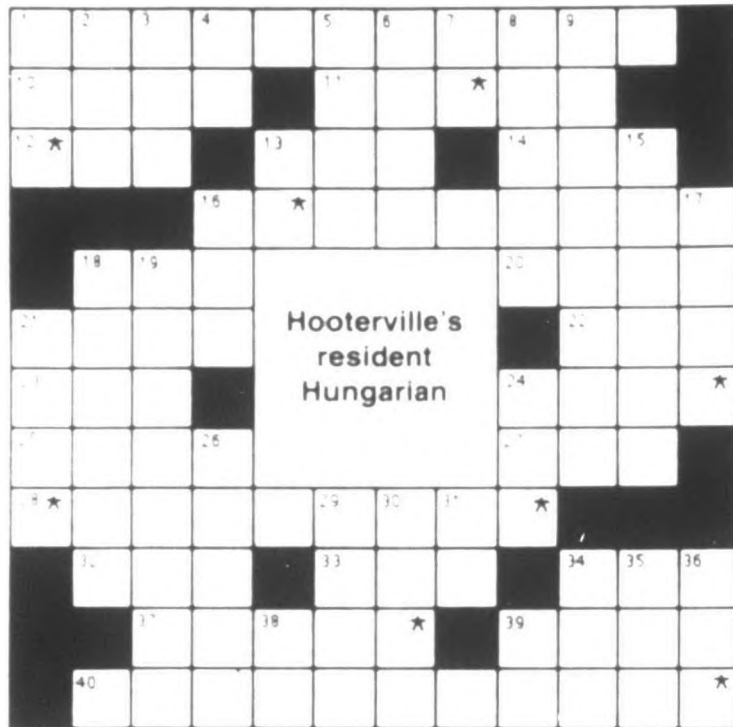
